Insurance Plan Available For FCC Students

Archie Bradshaw, dean of students, announced that a medical insurance plan, designed especially for students of Fresno City College, has been made available this year.

Insurance Costs

The policy, which will cost each student \$6 a semester, gives the student twenty-four hour protection on or off campus. Coverage for the entire college year will cost \$12 and for a calendar year \$16. According to Bradshaw, members of the faculty wishing the same type of coverage would have to pay approximately seven times this amount.

The purpose of the plan is to give adequate financial protection to students confronted with unexpected medical expenses. Dean Bradshaw wishes to point out to students that such sudden medical expenses can make the difference between continuing with a college education and having to quit college.

Such things as existing health facilities and local medical costs were taken into consideration policy gives, among other things, partial coverage for hospital daily room and board benefits. A check College. with local hospitals shows that this cost averages between \$23 a day, for a semi-private room, to \$32 a day.

Other Benefits

Other benefits include hospital pense, and ambulance expense.

The technical and industrial division serves hundreds of students in many day and evening classes in the six new buildings.

German Is Offered At **City College**

dean, announced that FCC is providing a class in beginning German for the first time.

Three years ago only one foreign language, Spanish, was offered. Since then, French, Russian, and German have been added to the curriculum in that respective order. Hansen speculated that if the demand for foreign languages continues, more languages will be added. The next one will probably be a Slavic language

Four Languages Offered

Another addition, second year Russian is being offered for day students. Both beginning Spanish and Russian are being taught in the extended day classes this

Hansen said the foreign language courses are becoming increasingly popular with students, indicating an increasing awareness of their importance. Another incentive, he said, is a state law enacted in 1958 allowing state colleges to require foreign languages in certain majors.

German Taught

A new member of the faculty is teaching German and Russian classes this year. G. Alex Kalistratov, a native of Latvia, was graduated from the University of Pennsylvania and taught in the army language school in Monterey for four years.

The Spanish instructor, D. Lee Ross, has studied or taught in Mexico, Cuba, and the Phillipines. William A. Reynolds, Jr., who studied at the Sorbonne in Paris and who has both a bachelor and a master degree in French from Stanford University, is the French instructor.
