FCC STUDENTS VIOLATE RULES; CLOSE LOUNGE

"A violation of the rules by which it was open to the students has brought about the closing of the lounge in the student center," Archie Bradshaw, the dean of students, stated at the student council meeting Tuesday noon.

He went on to say, "If the council can find some way to control discipline, the lounge will surely be re-opened, as the administration would like to see it in use."

The actions in question were playing with fire in the ash trays, throwing things around the room, such as lighted cigarettes, and damaging furniture. When the students involved were questioned, their answers to the top school official were in an insolent manner.

Shirley White, student body president, appointed Pete Farmer, Roger Dupsyk, and Barbara Warrington to make a study of the situation and report back to the council at the meeting next week. Daniel Opperman volunteered to work with the committee.

College Plans Debate Here

Fresno City College will be host to a debate with Fresno State College Monday at 3 PM in Bungalows 6 and 7.

Franz Weinschenk, speech instructor, said the topic to be debated is Resolved: That Congress should have the power to reverse supreme court decisions.

Two rounds of debate are scheduled, with each team debating on both the pro and con side. Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Boyes, Alan Hayes and Reggie Marcellino are the FCC entrants in the contest.

Weinschenk said the Forensics Club is sponsoring an all-school speech tournament on Nov. 24. All students who desire to participate in the tournament should sign up with Weinschenk.

The practice debate will be judged by the two coaches, Louis Cockrerham of FSC, and Weinschenk. They will give a critique of the debate.

Accredited Institutions Allow Transfer Units

All accredited institutions of higher learning give students full credit for all units earned in Fresno City College courses.

Archie Bradshaw, dean of students, said Fresno City College transfer courses are accredited by the Western College Association and approved by the California State Board of Education.

There is a wide choice of majors at FCC. It has a full program of freshman and sophomore courses similar to those offered by major universities and four-year colleges.

A student who is training for a profession such as law, medicine, dentistry, pharmacy, engineering, teaching, or business administration can get a good freshman and sophomore background at FCC.

The state colleges in California are California State, Polytechnic, Chico, Fresno, Humboldt, Long Beach, Los Angeles, Sacramento, San Diego, San Francisco, and San Jose.

Bradshaw said that in all these institutions, 45 units of general education are required for graduation. There is some variation among state colleges in regard to the distribution of these units within the general education pattern.

He said that student's lower division requirements in his major field of study, which would be in addition to his general requirements, also may be completed at FCC.

He mentioned that there was an increasing number of students in California attending the local junior college for two years before transferring to a four-year college or university.

The semester units required at the University of Southern California can be met at FCC in these courses: six units of English, English 1A and 1B; four units of fine arts, Art 19A and 19B or Music 11A and 11B.

In foreign languages 12 units are needed. The courses here that qualify are French 1A, 1B, 2A, 2B; Spanish 1A, 1B, 2A, 2B.

The 15 units in general studies

may be met by History 1A, 1B and 17A, 17B plus either philosophy 1A or psychology 7.

General studies 3 covers the two unit health education requirement. Four units in literature can be met in English 46A and 46B.

There are 11 units in science needed and FCC covers it with biology 1A, 1B, 20, 21, 22, 30, 31; botany 1; chemistry 1A, 1B, 6 and 8; geology 1A, 1B, 12B; physical science 10; physics 2, 2B, 4A, 4B, 4C and zoology 1A and 1B.

Staff Picks 'Ram' For New Name

The name of the Fresno City College yearbook, which has been called the Rambler until this year, has been changed to the Ram by this year's staff.

Arthur H. Margosian, the yearbook advisor, said that the name change will enable the students to prepare a more attractive makeup for the book.

Another feature this year will be the absence of advertising. Margosian said there will be no advertising this year because last year's ads only paid for the paper it was printed on.

The yearbook will have five sections this year instead of six.

Margosian said they will take pictures of all sophomores free of charge. Announcements as to when the pictures will be taken will be published in the Rampage.

All sophomores are urged by Margosian to have their pictures taken even if they aren't sure they will graduate.

More than 100 business educators, representing eight junior colleges and 35 high schools, will attend the annual fall conference of the Central California Business Education Association Saturday at FCC.

Edward Fischer, field division manager of Producers Cotton Oil Company, will speak on, "Agriculture—A Lesson in Valley Economics" at the luncheon session in the student center social hall.

Dr. John Linn, an associate professor of business education of San Francisco State College, will speak to the morning session on, "The Fund for Advancement of Business Education." Dr. Linn, the treasurer of California Business Education Association, will describe the nonprofit fund for corporations and other businesses to contribute to fellowships and scholarships in business education.

A panel discussion of "The Future of Business Education in the Secondary School in the Light of the Conant Report" will be the feature of the 10 AM session in the student center social hall.

Metal Class Offers Apprentice Course

A new class is being offered at FCC for pre-employment in the sheet metal trade, which springs into existence because of the requests of employees and employers to train people for positions in the sheet metal trade.

William Marks also said upon completion of this class a student would become an advanced apprentice in sheet metal.

Instructions are given on operating machine and hand tools dealing with sheet metal and plastics. A student also learns metal spinning, plan reading, fabrication work, and many other characteristics of the trade.

Apprentice Work

To become a journeyman an apprentice must be indentured to a shop for a period of four years.

When employed, the apprentice starts out at 40 percent of the journeyman's pay, with an increase of five percent every six months. A journeyman receives \$3.85 per hour.

Metal Instructor

William Marks, class instructor, is a journeyman sheet metal worker with eight years experience behind him. He is an FSC graduate with a BA degree in industrial arts.

The class is taught in one of the new technical and industrial division buildings. The new classroom and workshop are complete with new equipment for usage. The class hours are from 8-11 AM daily, and from 7-11 PM Monday through Thursdays.

Welk Searches For New Singers

Will an FCC coed be the new Champagne Lady?

Lawrence Welk is conducting a search for a new vocalist. In a letter to C. Lowell Spencer, FCC music instructor, he set forth his requirements for applicants, together with an invitation for interested, qualified girls to compete for a job with his band.

"The procedure we plan to use in our search is to screen candidates of your recommendation by way of tape or disc records submitted to our office. Welk said selection of applicants should be based on the following qualifications:

Nigerians Trek Leads To FCC

A Nigerian commission plans to visit Fresno City College as part of a survey for higher education in Nigeria.

Alan Pifer of the Carnegie Corporation of New York was on campus Oct. 13 to look over the college facilities and make plans with President Stuart White for receiving the commission in March.

The Nigerian commission consists of two university professors and a former Minister of Education.

The survey of higher education in Nigeria is being conducted with financial support from Carnegie Corporation by a tri-partite Nigerian-British-American Commission.

British and Nigerian educators have expressed considerable interest in two features of American higher education unknown in the British system. These are land grant university and the junior college.

Pifer said the junior college is unusual in the educational system in the eastern United States but common to educational systems in the west.

California has more junior college student enrollment than the other states. For this reason California is one of the states chosen to study the junior college type of educational institution.

British and American members of the commission will probably accompany the Nigerian educators.

Error Made In Publishing Of Music Article

Holton Fanfare, a national music magazine, published an article by FCC's band director, Marvin L. Bedford, in its latest issue, but with some deviation from the facts.

Instead of running the correct title, "Are Our Musicians Educated," and Belford's byline and picture, the article appeared under the title of an article by Robert Forman of Southern Illinois University. This was followed up with Forman's byline and picture.

In discovering the error, Holton Fanfare Editor Edward K. Renwick wrote a letter of apology to Belford. Renwick said the error would be corrected in the next issue.

Belford's article stresses the fact that most music educators get so wrapped up in contest work and other happenings that "we forget our first aim—that of music education."

He pointed out that many college students who play a musical instrument don't even know the lines and spaces.

Carty did not state whether or not this ruling would apply to both sexes.



Bradshaw said these counselors are professionally trained and use modern scientific personnel methods.

Committee Plans Three Assemblies


Doris Deakins, dean of women, stated that three assemblies have been scheduled for the remainder of the semester, and possibly a fourth one may be worked in for November.

Stop Falcons; Rams Will Try

The Fresno City College Rams, without the aid of their best backfield man, will have the dubious honor of trying to stop the only unbeaten-untied team in the Central California Junior College Athletic Association, the Coalinga College Falcons. The game will be played at McLane Stadium, Saturday night, starting at 8 P.M.

The Rams main problem for the Coalinga game will be to find a capable replacement for Harry Miller (see photo). Willie Turner is the most logical candidate. To replace Turner at halfback will be Lamont Whittle. The other halfback spot has turned into a battle between seasoned Gene Bamburg and speedy Abe Kimble. The quarterback spot might be filled by Dan Stockton.

The FCC line also presents a problem. The probable starters include Ron Leimbach and Willie Wheaton, ends; Chet Rooters and Dennis Scott, tackles; Ray Merrill and Eddie Gomes, guards, and Jerry Nimmo, center. Battling the above for the starting assignment are Joe Williams at end, Jim Markarian and Francis Ragghianti at tackles, Pete Simonian at guard and Woody Gregory at center.

The Falcons will probably be the toughest team the Rams will face this year. A fair comparison might be—San Jose CC defeated Sierra College of Auburn 8-6 and Coalinga defeated Sierra 22-8. Fresno lost to SJCC 32-0.

The Falcons are led by sophomore quarterback, Eddie Vasconcellos, groomed as the best quarterback in the league. To run with him in the backfield will be halfbacks Ronnie Lee and Gregory Baines, and fullback Fa'asaka Lutu.

Lee was the star for the county in the pre-season All City-County Benefit game. So far this year he has 40 yards or better touchdown spurts in all the Falcons' games. Lutu, a hardrunning fullback, has been on the injured list but is backed by Adolphus McGee. Baines, along with Lee furnish the Falcons with enough power and speed to keep opposing teams confused.

The Coalinga line is anchored by guard Bob Buffalo. Buffalo played for Coalinga in 1956 when the fabulous Willie Wood was at Coalinga. The other guard spot is held down by the best all-around player for the Falcons, Walt Shemik. The remainder of the line consists of ends, Jim Curtis and Joe Williams, tackles, Norval Awalt and Bob Pederson, and center Max Culp.

The San Jose City College Jaguars, playing an alert defensive game last Friday night, handed the Fresno City College Rams a sound 32-0 lacing in a non-league game at Spartan Stadium, San Jose.

San Jose had obvious difficulty getting untracked for two quarters and held only a 6-0 lead at halftime. They showed their power by scoring 20 points in the third quarter and another touchdown in the fourth.

The winners' quarterback and line appeared to be the difference between the two teams. SJCC quarterback Myron Zacchoe tossed a 17 yard pass to Bill Gregg for their first TD, completing a 58 yard drive on their first series of downs in the first quarter.

SJCC's 195 pound fullback, Ken Buran, opened the third quarter with a 61 yard run to the FCC 15 which started the landslide of touchdowns that were to follow. Two plays later he scored.

Fresno, trying to get back in the game, went to the air. Their first pass was intercepted by Zacchoe, who returned it 30 yards for a TD.

The alert Jaguars picked off another Ram pass and started a drive which ended in the end zone for another six points. Quarterback Jim Capurso tallied from the five.

Mid-way in the fourth and final quarter the San Jose team scored again. A 29 yard air shot from quarterback Capurso to end Bill Moyers score the last six points of the game. Capurso and Moyers teamed up again to pick up two points on the conversion, the only one made that night.

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
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
