



Enrollment Is Highest Ever

Fresno City College celebrates its 50th anniversary this year.

It was established in 1910, and began with an enrollment of 28 students and a faculty of three. Today the figures include 2,937 day students and 2,241 night students, and the faculty numbers 112, both full-time and part time instructors.

First Junior College

After public junior colleges were authorized in 1907 by the state legislature, Fresno was the first community to establish a post high school institution. Fresno City College began its history in the old Fresno High School building at 1430 O St. This, the old campus, has had a long and colorful history. It was also the first home of the Fresno Normal School, the forerunner of the Fresno State College, in 1911.

In 1921 state legislation made it permissive for a school district maintaining a junior college to contract with a teachers' college for the maintenance of the junior college courses of instruction. As a result, the Fresno City College was combined with the Fresno Normal School, forerunner of Fresno State College.

After a survey predicting that Fresno County would sustain a junior college potential of 2,000 students by 1960, Fresno City College was refounded as a separate school from Fresno State College in the fall of 1948 at the site of its birth.

O St. campus was the home of the Fresno High School from 1895 to 1921, was the Fresno Technical High School from 1921 to 1950, and was headquarters for the Fresno Adult School and the E. R. Snyder Continuation High School. Last fall with the opening of the

new shop building on our campus, the O St. campus was evacuated.

Earthquake Damages Rooms In the fall of 1952, the campus began losing its ability to house the Fresno City College. The earthquake in the San Joaquin Valley damaged two of the three wings of the main building, and these wings were condemned by the board. Classes were suspended for a week, and then reopened in other sites.

Fourteen portable bungalows were constructed on the campus and shop buildings for junior college students were completed behind the Edison High School.

Gets New Campus

After purchasing the present campus from the state the general education division moved from the O St. campus to the University St. campus. As Fresno State moved out to their new campus on Shaw Ave., the administrative offices and the business division moved onto the new site.

Fresno City College made its switch from the O St. campus complete last year when its newly constructed shop buildings were ready

Fresno's Community Theater Opens With 'Pajama Game'

On Sept. 30-Oct. 1, and Oct. 7 and 8 the Fresno Community Theater will present "The Pajama Game" to open the 1960-61 season. After a thousand performances on Broadway the show was forced to close because of advance booking for "Li'l Abner."

The play originated from a Book of the Month Club selection, "71/2 Cents" by Richard Bissell. This is the story of a pajama factory's union battle for a 71/2 cent per hour raise. Included in the plot is superintendent Sorokin's courtship of Babe Williams, head of the union's Grievance Committee.

Heading the cast are Lindy Cope, a FSC freshman, as Babe Williams, Jack Hall as Sid Sorokin, Lee Burger as Gladys, and Martin Ryerson as Hines.

Such songs as "Hey There!", "Hernando's Hideaway," and "Steam Heat" were first introduced in this musical comedy.

"A New Town Is A Blue Town." "There Once Was A Man," and "I Am Not At All In Love" are also included in the show. The music director, Paul Vermel, is also director of the Fresno Philharmonic Orchestra.

The director, Miss Frances Quinn, is familiar to the television viewers of the Fran Quinn Show of a few years ago. Miss Quinn has worked in radio as well as TV and is a member of the California Association of Press Women and of the National Federation of Press Women. Miss Quinn is also the vice-president in charge of production for the Fresno Community Theater.

Dean Emeritus James M. Malloch on the Fresno City Board of Ed-


Meux will replace Paul G. Wasemiller, who has filled Dean Malloch's position on the board since last February.

Classrooms At FCC Get New Alterations

You step into the classroom; it looks new. The room has been repainted, the tack boards are as good as new, and the lighting has been improved.

The new atmosphere gives you the feeling of studying and making this school year the best, so far.

Rooms 124, 127, 224 are lecture rooms which have been altered for the better. Also repaired is the remedial reading classroom,

Rooms 230 and 222 have been completely remodeled. The lockers, offices, and rooms of 150 and 152 used for ceramics have been repaired to make the art classes more enticing to students.

From the northeast corner, we can hear the band playing, as the music department is located there. Rooms 133, 135, 137, 139, and 142 have been acoustically treated. These rooms are used for large groups: a capella choir and band; storage room; a practice room, respectively.

Special features have been added to certain rooms. The changes on the rooms have been in its third summer and two or three classes more are expected to elapse before it will be completed. The health center has been completely remodeled.

After all fixtures have been

completed, the art and music class will hold its open house.

Future plans for the school will include lighting fixtures in McLane Hall. A complete remodeling job will be done on the administration rooms and all rooms so far not remodeled.


School district employees are doing the work gradually improving the grounds and buildings around the FCC campus.

John S. Hansen, vice president said that 11 new faculty members have been added to the FCC teaching staff.



CARS MUST SHOW PERMITS

Paul Starr, dean of men, announced that all students driving cars to school must display their parking permits on the lower right hand corner of their windshield by Monday.

The Fresno City Police Department will issue a citation to any car parked in an unauthorized area. Cars parked within five blocks of the college campus will be affected by the new parking registration rule.

"The issuing of parking permits, enables the police to notify a student when his car has been impounded for blocking a campus or residential driveway, Starr stated.

Parking areas where student cars will be prohibited are as follows: all school and residential driveways; parking areas behind student center; behind the library; and behind the college garden on Poplar Ave. The two parking lots adjacent to the college on Weldon Ave. and shop parking lots are also restricted to students. All restricted parking lots are reserved for college personnel.

Seven hundred fifty student parking stalls are available for the 2,200 students who have already registered their cars. Students are warned that parking in prohibited areas will cost them two dollars.

Blocking a driveway will cost the offender twelve dollars. This fine includes towing the car to a local garage and storing it for a day.

Starr urges all students to cooperate with the new parking rules. Residents near the college have been complaining about their driveways being blocked by student cars.

iring the policy term, protecting the student 24 hours a day,
whether on or off the campus,
participating in any activity not
specifically excluded. The student
is covered during vacation periods
at home if the vacation occurs
during the policy term. Coverage
for the entire college year will
cost \$15 and for a calendar year
\$20. According to Bradshaw, this
insurance rate would be less than
half the cost of the teachers plan
or many others.

The purpose of the policy is to give adequate financial protection to students in case they are ever confronted with unexpected medical expenses. Bradshaw said such sudden medical expenses can make the difference between continuing with a college education and having to quit college.

Health facilities and local medical costs were taken into consideration when the policy was written. The policy offers, among other things, partial coverage for ambulance service.

Other benefits include hospital confined or non-confined miscellaneous expense, medical attention, surgical treatment, and out patient expense.

Approximately 200 students have signed up for this policy so far. Bradshaw stated that he would like to see at least 500 students sign up for this policy. Application forms are available either from Bradshaw's office or from Nora Simpson, the college nurse.



FCC Rams Win, Open Against Stockton

Throws Two TD Passes

Hornets Dumped By Caldera's Shots

The 1960 football season was opened with a big bang, as the Fresno City College fighting eleven stung the Fullerton Junior College Hornets with a 15-0 defeat on the home

grounds of the Hornets Saturday, Sept. 17. Following the opening kickoff by the Rams, Fullerton

got a look at the power of the Ram defense and was unable to penetrate the strong forward wall of the Fresno team. FCC took possession of the ball on downs and off-sides. In the first four plays, FCC received two five yard penalties and was unable to make up for the losses, so Fullerton again got the ball.

Knocke Moves

Bill Knocke, speedy Ram halfback, took the Fullerton punt and ran it back thirty yards. From this point on, Fullerton was completely outclassed. The Rams out-ran, outpassed and out-foxed Fullerton to the final gun.

FCC, in a series of fourteen plays with the fine hard charging of halfback Lamont Whittle and fullback George Ward, moved the ball to the Fullerton six yard line, where eagle eyed quarterback Chuck Caldera completed a pass to Knocke in the end zone for the first Ram touchdown. Mike Martin put his toe to the ball for the conversion. FCC lead at the end of the first quarter, 7 to 0.

Rams Threaten

FCC threatened again late in the second quarter after a long drive with Caldera and Dan Stockton tossing completion after completion to ends Mike Christopher and Joe Williams, but the Rams never got further than the Fullerton fourteen yard line.

The only Fullerton threat in the entire game came in the second quarter when Fullerton halfback Leo Ott received a punt from Fresno's Tom Ahajanian and returned it forty-four yards. Ott was the spark plug of the Fullerton team both offensively and defensively.

Fumbles Surprise

Fresno's second touchdown came early in the third quarter. After marching ninety-five yards, the Rams fumbled on the Fullerton five with Fullerton recovering the ball. The situation looked grave, but on the first play Fullerton fumbled and after a hard fought scramble, Fresno tackle, Don Ratliff, came up with the ball on the six yard line of Fullerton. Caldera flipped the ball to hard running halfback Levi Owens who charged into the end zone for the second FCC tally. The conversion attempt, a pass from Caldera to Christopher, failed, leaving the score at

Hornet Chased

FCC scored two more points in the fourth quarter when Christopher, aided by guards Ralph York and Joe Capone, chased Fullerton's quarterback, Dalton O'Neal, into his own end zone for a safety.
