Council Sets New Budget

The student body of Fresno City College has grown in number this year and the school budget, approved by the Student Council Tuesday, Sept. 27, reflects this growth.

The total budget for this semester is \$30.275

Robert Roe, student body treasurer, said money for this budget is obtained strictly through sales of student body cards; therefore this year's increased enrollment and the increase in price of student body cards has made this larger budget possible and will result in more advantages for the students.

Roe released the following breakdown of accounts: assemblies, \$350; Associated Men Students, \$550; Associated Women Students, \$575; athletic awards reserve, \$1,500; water polo, \$790; basketball, \$2,005; conference, \$500: California Junior College Student Government Association, \$225; cross country, \$480; football, \$4,175; guest fund, \$125; honor and leadership awards, \$450; insurance, \$1,500; laundry and cleaning, \$1,200.

The four groups classified as oral arts include: band, \$350; choir, \$555; debate, \$300; and drama, \$805.

Milewski teaches the basics of plastics first, in order that the class will have a working knowledge of it and so the student will know enough about it so he would be able to talk intelligently on the subject, and to know the background of plastic. Without this basic knowledge, no person can really work with the

FCC Offers

Asked whether there are other classes of this type in the San Joaquin Valley, Milewski said, "To my knowledge, no."

The instructor has been approached to produce special materials for certain companies around the Fresno area.

The class will cover the process of plastics in the industries. Milewski said that industries today, big or small, have plastic. He also gave an illustration if the plastic was taken out of radio tubes in a radio, you would have a radio that would not play.

Plastic In Industry

Student and sheet metal worker Jimmy Baker said, "The reason I am taking this class is that the sheet metal industry is going all plastic."

The class has students who are sheet metal workers, a geologist, a highway worker, and two men who are employed by a local sprinkler company.

FCC Instructor Climbs Summit Of Mount Whitney

The west face of the peak of Mt. Whitney was the obstacle that confronted instructor William A. Reynolds this past August.

Reynolds and a sculptor friend took six days to climb to the top of Mt. Whitney carrying back-packs.

Reynolds stated the reason was that they just wanted to. They did take some short-cuts to save time because it is approximately 40 miles one way.

They left from Mineral Kingwhich is 7,800 feet-and hiked to Sawtooth Pass - 11,500 feet in the Sierras.

They proceeded to the upper reaches of the Kern River -6,500 feet — and farther up the river they stopped at the Kern Hot Springs. Here they enjoyed a hot bath.

A day and a half later they climbed the west peak to the summit of Mt. Whitney — 14,495

Their journey down the mountain was by the trail. They stopped again at the Kern Hot Spring, enjoying another bath.

From the spring they went down Kern River to Rattlesnake Creek, then to Franklin Pass -11,700 feet - and finally back to Mineral King.

The men carried back-packs containing their mattresses, sleeping bags, and food. Part of

their food consisted of condensed soup and packaged and boxed foods.

Reynolds said that in the daytime it was hot enough for shorts, and that it was cold and windy at night. Because of the cold and the high altitude, sleeping was difficult.

The fishing was very good, but they caught only enough fish to eat, Reynolds said.

Reynolds is a sponsor of the FCC International Club. He claims riding a bicycle aids in keeping physically fit and is a good way to beat the parking and traffic problem.

Air-Minded Rams Sock Mustangs; COS Next

The College of the Sequoias Giants will invade Ratcliffe Stadium Saturday night to open the 1960 Central California Junior College Athletic Association season against the unbeaten Fresno City College Rams.

The Giants, who have beaten Monterey Peninsula, 34-26,

tand lost last week to Mt. San Antonio College, 20-6, will be out to end the Rams' winning streak of two games. The league title may be decided in this opener, as both teams are rated as the top teams in the league this season. The Rams were dumped 20-12 last year in Visalia by the Giants.

Rams Roll On

Chuck Caldera, with his eagle eye and magic passing arm, sparked the Fresno City College Rams to a smashing 33-6 aerial victory over the Stockton College Mustangs in McLane Stadium, Saturday.

Stockton was unable to cope with this tremendous passing attack put out by Caldera and his shifty receivers. FCC scored three touchdowns and set up two others on a series of passes.

From the very start of the game, FCC found it almost impossible to penetrate and move the ball on the ground against the powerful forward wall of the Stockton defenders.

Caldera Moves Team

Caldera caught the Mustangs totally off guard when, on his own 32 yard line, tossed the pigskin to his favorite end, Dewey Belli. Belli outran the Stockton defenders to the goal line for the first FCC touchdown.

George Ward, FCC fullback, scored the second touchdown on a three yard plunge off tackle. Caldera, with passes to Joe Williams and Belli provided the set-up yardage that enabled Ward to score.

Mike Martin, Ram place-kicker, added one point to each touchdown, leaving the halftime score at

Second Half

In the beginning of the second half of play, FCC again found it difficult to move the ball through the Stockton line. Once again the Rams took to the air with Caldera at the pilot seat.

After connecting passes to halfbacks Bill Knocke and Levi Owens for needed yardage, Caldera flipped a 15 yard pass to Williams for the Ram third touchdown. Martin failed to put the ball brough the unrights on the conversion attempt.

Stockton Scores


The Mustangs finally countered with long runs by halfbacks Carl Agbulos and George Cohen to move the ball to the Fresno nine yard line. Mustang end Tom Parker scored on a nine yard pass from quarterback Bob Mattos. The conversion attempt, an end run, failed.


