# Talent Gets State's JC's Get **Enrollment High**

"Over 100,000 students are enrolled in junior colleges in graded classes for the first time in California's history, stated Hugh G. Price, the chief of the Bureau of Junior College Education.

As of Oct. 3, 1960, there are 103,331 students enrolled in public junior colleges. A contrast

of 89,596 enrolled on Oct. 31, 1959. Fresno City College has 3,047 part-time students enrolled. Los Angeles City College leads with FCC choir, and the Campus 9,106. Pasadena City College with 5,083 and City College of San Fran-

cisco with 4,464 students follow

second and third, respectively. The total enrollment for FCC is 4,989. Long Beach City College has the most full and part-time enrollment of 23,094. LACC comes second with 18,524 and 11,506 brings San Diego Junior College in third.

A total of 183,833 part-time students are enrolled as of Oct. 3, sored the "Balliders" singing 1960. A grand total of 286,164 is the enrollment for full and parttime classes.

> "The decreases from last year have halted and a great 'tidal wave' of students have begun to engulf the junior colleges," said Price.

## Aviation Class Builds Sound Proof Cell To Test Engines

The students in the aviation class at FCC have just about completed their sound proof cell. This cell is actually a booth that will enable the students to test airplane engines.

Harmon Allen, the instructor, said the cell is equipped with an instrument called a consol. It has all the airplane instruments on it. The students

instruments on it. The students will put the engines outside the cell and test them with the consol. The shop has engines ranging from 65 to 1000 horsepower and also has two jet engines.

Students Check For Defects

The apprentices completely overhaul these engines. They have an instrument called a magniflux. This instrument enables them to test the defects in airplane parts. It magnifies the metal of the engine making it possible for the students to check for defective parts.

Allen said with the vast amount of equipment the shop has they can run checks on all the planes in the shop, everything from landing gear on up. The students can completely remanufacture the lighter airplanes. At present they are manufacturing a Taylor Aircraft. The students start from blue prints, and build the plane from scratch.

Two Phases of Building

There are two phases of building an airplane. The first phase of building a plane is to learn electricity and instruments, wood and fabric working, hydraulics,

sheet metal and welding, and assembly methods.

The second is the engine phase; it includes engine over-haul, carburetion, electricity, ignition, fuels and lubrication, and propellers.

In regard to the painting equipment the class has a spray booth in which the entire fuse-lage can be placed. Allen said, "It is probably the only paint booth in Fresno in which doping can be carried out in the rainy weather."



"Research in science and math during the last fifty years has resulted in demands for re-evaluating and reorganizing the teaching of geometry."


"Satellite Mathematics," Morgan's topic, developed three formulas for satellites.

## '60-'61 Basketball Team Fresno Throws Much Mud; Porterville Players Are Selected Buried 32-0 As Rams Win Number Six

Under a heavy blanket of cold, wind-swept rain, the Fresno City College Rams slashed their way to a 32 to 0 victory over the Porterville Pirates in McLane Stadium, Saturday. The Rams ran, skidded and slipped their way for 345 yards on the ground and 19 yards Five returning lettermen and 11 newcomers were picked in the air, while holding the hapless Pirates to a net yardage of 63 yards.

Capitalizing on a Porterville fumble, the Rams moved the ball to the Pirate 31 yard line where George Ward slid around

left end for the score.

Ward also got the two extra points by crashing through the middle of the line.

FCC scored in the second quarter on a 46 yard drive, with halfback Levi Owens setting up the touchdown on a 22 yard gallop. Ward then carried it over from the two yard line.

The high point of the game came on a 67 yard run around left end by Owens, who plowed his way through the Pirate defenders for the score. Three plays later, Tom Ahajanian cut across right tackle, picked up blockers and raced 86 yards for another score.

The Rams added the final two points of the game by pushing the Pirates back to their own two yard line, where the Pirates tried to go around the end, only to be met in the end zone by Ray Farmer for a safety.
