Thesis Tells About TV Education

An FCC English instructor, Mrs. Flo Brinninger, has written a thesis paper in which she analyzes and evaluates educational television for college credit entitled, "The twenty-one inch classroom at Fresno State College."

The thesis was presented as a partial fulfillment of the requirements for a master of arts degree at Fresno State College.

The ten TV courses which KMJ-TV and the FSC extension service have offered since 1956 were included in Mrs. Brinninger's paper.

Eight of the ten courses surveyed showed that 80 percent of the 700 students enrolled were regularly or provisionally credentialed teachers.

Women Outnumber Men

Men were outnumbered by women four to one and 80 percent of the 651 students who completed the ten courses were women.

"The chief complaints of the students," said Mrs. Brinninger, "were the lack of student-instructor contact and the ability to take adequate notes because of the instructor's rate of delivery and the short time the camera remained focused on visual material."

TV Student Is Older

One indication of the thesis was that the television student was about 20 years older than his college counterpart; graduating from high school between the years 1920-1940.

"One television course evidently led to another," said Mrs. Brinninger, "because about 37 percent of those enrolled in the last five courses had taken at least one other course by television."

TV Students Grades Lower

A comparison of the grade point average of the TV student and of the regular upper-division college student of 1952 and 1957 shows that the TV student's grades were slightly lower than those of the regular college student, explained the author.

The ten courses offered were upper division courses except for music appreciation and landscape gardening.

Enrollment ranged from 202, in the course on California literature, to 25, in the course on introduction to the theater.

Mrs. Brinninger is a graduate of the Iowa State Teacher's College, Fresno State College, and she has received her master's degree in speech.

Counselors Host State Dept. Personnel Officer

Several Fresno City College student counselors hosted Miss Kathryn Groot, a personnel officer of the department of state, at a luncheon this week in the Student Center committee room.

Her job is to recruit secretaries, stenographers, and clerks for positions in the United States Foreign Service.

Miss Groot, who normally works out of an office in San Francisco, is in Fresno on an "experimental trip" and will conduct interviews at the State Employment Office, 1050 "O" St. through Nov. 26.

The Department of State's requirements say that foreign service secretaries must type 50 words per minute, and take shorthand at a rate of 96 words per minute. Stenographers must type 50 words and take shorthand at 80 words per minute. Communications clerks must type 45 words a minute.

Applicants must be at least 21 years old, high school graduates with office experience, single, with no dependents, in excellent health and an American citizen for at least five years.

Miss Groot said, however, that in some cases time spent in college may be a partial substitute for office experience.

Secretaries start with an annual salary of \$4,495. Clerks and stenographers begin at \$4,010.

Students interested in a foreign service career may see Miss Groot at the Fresno employment office between 9 AM and 4:30 PM weekdays, 9 AM to noon on Saturdays, and Tuesday evenings until 7 PM. She said appointments are not necessary.

In January Miss Groot will be stationed in Manila. She will be a personnel officer there for a two year period.

Girls May Have Pick Of Male Students

Attention women students! There are almost three times as many male students attending Fresno City College as there are female students.

An official enrollment of 4,741 was reported by FCC. This is the largest enrollment in the history of the college.

There are 3,252 men and 1,489 women enrolled. The freshmen class outnumbers the sophomores class, in that there are 2,300 freshmen and 738 sophomores.

There are 1,703 adults enrolled. An adult is a student over 21 who is enrolled for less than 10 hours per week.

President Stuart M. White said the current total includes 2,043 full time students and 2,698 part time—those taking fewer than 12 units.

White said the college has had a cumulative enrollment of 5,203 during the fall semester, but 462 students have withdrawn.

Last year White predicted a registration of 4,334 students at FCC for this semester, 407 less than are here now.

Sumpter said materials needed for productions are purchased out of a budget set up for the drama department by the student council.

He stated, "I will be well-satisfied if 'Charley's Aunt' is only one half as well received and successful as it has proved to be in some of its previous world-wide presentations."

Tickets will go on sale soon. Students holding student body cards can purchase their tickets for 50 cents and the general public will be charged \$1.00 per ticket. All seats will be reserved.

Rabb Explains Nuclear Explosives To Students

Lt. Col. David A. Rabb of the Lawrence Radiation Laboratory spoke in Room 200 of McLane Hall today at 11 AM.

Miss Doris Deakins, chairman of the assembly committee, said the purpose of the lecture was to give all interested students a better understanding of nuclear explosives.

Rabb discussed the laboratory Plowshare experiments that are under consideration. According to Colonel Rabb, scientists and engineers at the University of California Lawrence Radiation Laboratory envision the landscaping of earth on a gigantic scale to create new harbors, lay bare vast areas for open pit mining and aid in recovery of minerals from the underground; to divert rivers for flood control and irrigation; to provide a source of heat, and to manufacture isotopes and unusual chemicals; to probe the upper atmosphere and outer space to provide seismic data which will lead to better understanding of our earth's structure.

There is research now being done through nuclear explosives on an inland sea in the Sahara Desert and the possibility of a harbor on the coast of Alaska.


Rabb's current assignment at LRL involves duties as adminis-

trator for the laboratory plowshare division and as consultant for metallurgical programmatic studies and engineering work particularly associated with underground nuclear test operations.

Following the war, Rabb specialized in metallurgical research on titanium, uranium and base metals and in metallurgical plant design at Battelle Memorial Institute, Columbia, Ohio, from 1946-52. He was called back to active duty as Lt. Col. Ordnance Corps, U. S. Army, from 1952-57.

A Foreign Student Expresses Friendly American Tradition

"American people are very kind. It is so easy to make friends here," stated Tayebah Susan Biuckzadeh.

Miss Biuckzadeh, a 24 year old student from Teheran, Iran, is in her second semester at FCC. She has attended college in Germany and studied medicine in Vienna for one year.

Miss Biuckzadeh finds many differences between FCC and European schools. She finds it hard to attend classes regularly. In Vienna the students attend lectures only when they wish. The students study their text and, when they feel they are ready, they go to the professor's assistant and ask for a test. All tests are taken individually and orally.

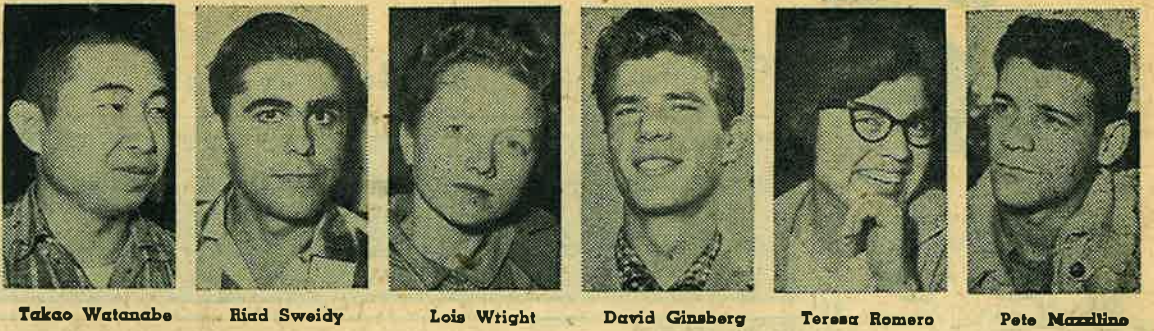
Miss Biuckzadeh said that each student studies only the classes that pertain to his major. She feels that if he changes his major after a year or more the time spent in school has been wasted.

Miss Biuckzadeh has no family

in the United States but said that she feels at home here. She lives in a boarding house with 13 other girls. "I like it very much," she said, "my landlord is like a moth-er to me."

Besides her native language Miss Biuckzadeh speaks Turkish, German, and English. She learned the English language in school in Iran, but forgot much of it while in Vienna.

Miss Biuckzadeh plans to en-ter the University of California at Berkeley when she feels com-petent in the English language. After her schooling she will re-turn to Iran.

Work On Committees

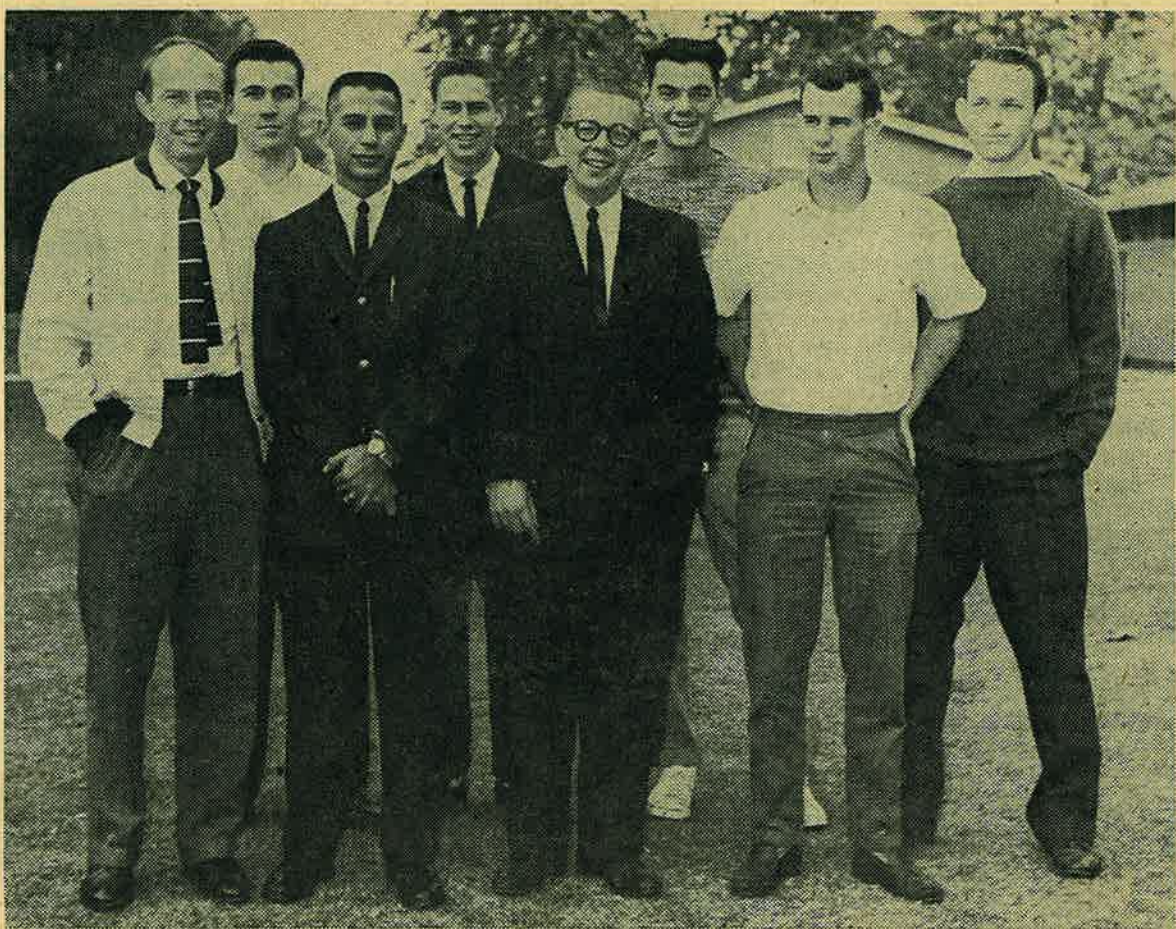

Dean Urges Early Signup

Archie Bradshaw, the dean of students, announced that those students who are counseled early for the spring semester will have a better opportunity to secure the subjects they want since class reservations will be on a first come, first serve basis.

Bradshaw said that although the spring semester at FCC will not start until Feb. 2, preregistration procedures will begin Monday. Students may start making appointments with their counselors next week for preregistration and counseling, which will start Nov. 28.

Bradshaw said spring semester schedules of day classes are expected to be available by the beginning of preregistration.

Preregistration counseling for returning day students will continue until Jan. 27. New day students will be preregistered Jan. 30 and 31. Registration for day students is set for Feb. 1.

Counseling and registration for returning night students will be from Jan. 3 to 26 and for all night students Jan. 30-31 and Feb. 1.

106 Foreign Students Attend CC

Fresno City College has the largest number of foreign students in its history, reported Stuart M. White, president of FCC.

White announced that the college has 106 students enrolled from 24 foreign countries on student visas.

By way of contrast, the Fresno State College, whose total enrollment of 6,355 is 1,300 more than the city college's, recently reported an enrollment of only 69 foreign students.

George C. Holstein, the dean of admissions and records at FCC, said the college accepted only about half of its foreign students applicants.

"We try to hold to a certain grade point average and we want them to know enough English to do college work," said Holstein.

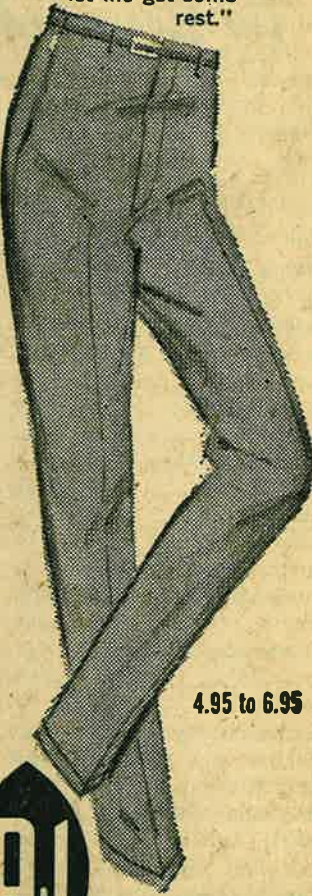
Almost one-third of the foreign students, 34 of them, are from Iran. The rest come from 23 nations. Besides Iran, the largest groups are from Japan, 11; India, 10; and Lebanon, eight.

The other countries are: Canada, two; China, four; Cyprus, one; Egypt, three; Holland, one; Iraq, one; Jordan, one; Korea, one; Kuwait, four; Malaya, one; Panama, five; Peru, two; Philippines, four; Singapore, one; Sudan, one; Syria, two; Thailand, two; Turkey, five; Venezuela, one.

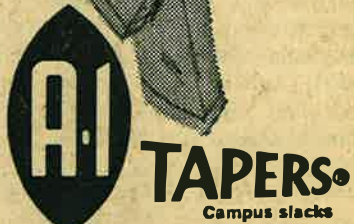


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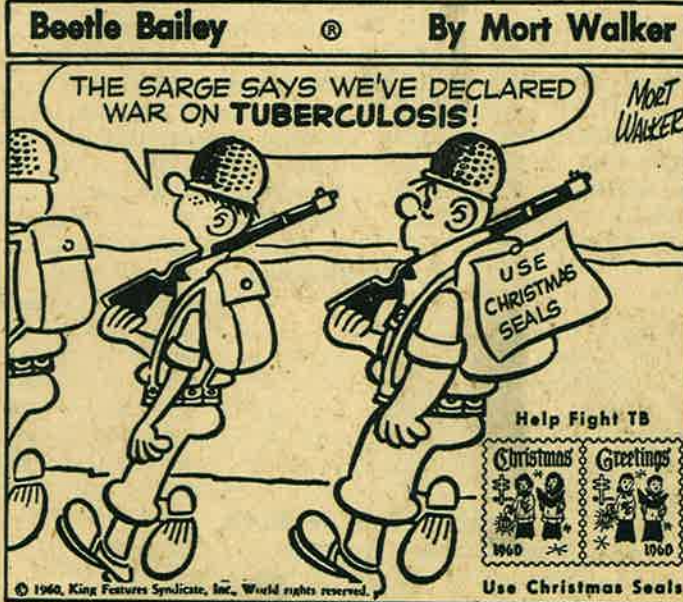
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FCC Gridders End Season Wednesday

The Fresno City College Ram football team will finish the 1960 season in Los Angeles when they battle the Los Angeles City College Cubs of the Western States Conference next Wednesday.

The Fresno team will be out to improve their current 6-2 record. LACC has a 1-5 record with its only win over Ventura, 34-26. They have suffered losses to San Francisco City College, 13-6; Phoenix, 22-18; Glendale, 20-12; Compton, 14-6, and to Pierce, 30-15.

This is the first meeting between the two teams.

Saturday, a desperation field goal, with only thirty seconds remaining in the game, gave the Allan Hancock College Bulldogs of Santa Maria a 21-20 victory over the Fresno City College Rams and the first league championship for the Bulldogs.

Rusty Hbdges, the lad who did the damage to the Rams, had never in his college football career kicked a field goal, but to the Ram fans he looked like another Lou Groza.

Much to the surprise of the fans at the muddy McLane High School Stadium, the Bulldogs scored just three plays after the opening kickoff on a 63 yard run by George Vasquez who was finally brought down from the rear by Ram end Joe Williams. Vince Antonio drove into the end zone for the score.

The Rams took the Bulldog kick and marched all the way down the field, 68 yards in 12 carries, for the first score.

FCC led at the end of the first quarter, 7-6.

Hancock came back late in the second quarter on an 11 yard run by Nat Whitmyer and an 18 yard

The conversion attempt, a run, failed, leaving the half time score at 12-7, in favor of Hancock.

A long pass from Chuck Caldera to Williams set up the next FCC score. Caldera, on a bootleg play around the left end, moved the ball to the Hancock three yard line, where George Ward scooted up the middle for the score.

The tables were turned as Hancock took to the air. The Bulldog quarterback, Milo Lizdale, passed to Ernie Miller for 38 yards and then Whitmyer ran off tackle for the score, leaving the score at 18-13, Hancock.

Caldera again passed long to Williams to the Bulldog five yard line where Ed Aubuchon scooted around left end for the final Ram touchdown.

FCC was leading 20-18 with only 30 seconds left to play; then came that final blow. Ram halfback Tom Ahajanian fumbled a poor hand-off by Caldera. Ahajanian was hit before he had completed possession. The Bulldogs recovered and moved to the FCC 28 yard line. Hodges came into the ball game to do the kicking. All the fans held their breath as Cliff Beagle dove for the ball and almost knocked it down.


