A nominations assembly will be held Dec. 15 at 11 AM in the auditorium. The election will be held on Jan. 11.

Miss Deakins said the new officers will be installed at the student council conference at the Sierra Sky Ranch Jan. 30 and 31.

School Begins Speaker File

Archie Bradshaw, dean of students, is now organizing a foreign student speakers file. The purpose of this file is to have a ready reference to foreign students who are interested in speaking before community organizations.

Foreign students are now beginning to complete file cards and Bradshaw said that those not already registered may obtain a file card from him. The student is asked to list three topics he wishes to speak on and the day or nights he will be available to speak.

Requests for speakers were formerly referred to Williams Reynolds, International Club sponsor. The attendance at International Club meetings has dwindled while requests for foreign speakers has grown, making it necessary to employ another method of obtaining speakers. It is hoped that this new file system will supply a greater variety of foreign speakers to interested clubs.

Preliminary Plans For New Gym Are Ready

Preliminary plans for the new Fresno City College athletic plant have been completed and approved. Stuart M. White, the FCC president, said the \$844,000 that was appropriated for the building of this plant is beginning to go to work. Property north of the campus is now being bought and cleared.

Included in the preliminary plans are a gymnasium with a seating capacity of 2600, a men's dressing room capable of handling 225 men at one time (one hour of PE) and a women's dressing room capable of handling 125 women at a time (one hour of PE).

Physical Therapy Room

A varsity dressing room, a laundry and drying room and a physical therapy room equipped with heat lamps, whirl pools and rub-down tables are being planned.

Also called for in the plans are two separate swimming pools. The size of these pools, estimated by White, are 42 feet by 40 feet, and 40 feet by 75 feet.

The smaller pool will be designed for diving purposes and will be very deep. The longer pool will be regulation competition length designed for racing.

In the outside area nine tennis courts and six basketball-volleyball courts are being planned.

A football practice field, a softball field and an archery range are also included in the outdoor athletic area plans.

Ready In 1962

White said this athletic plant will be completed and ready for use in September, 1962. He continued in saying that "these are only approved preliminary plans." He said that there is plenty of room for change.

Production To Run Two Nights Only

Tomorrow night "Charley's Aunt" will open for a two-night run. It will be held in the FCC auditorium at 8:30 PM.

Clyde Sumpter, the director, said the forthcoming production of "Charley's Aunt" serves to recall the fascinating history of this durable farce, certainly one of the few authentic comedy classics of our time.

It has been called the most frequently produced play in all stage annals and it has been a tremendous money maker for its author, the late Brandon Thomas and for his heirs. Yet — it very nearly didn't get produced at all!

It was turned down by the top managements in the London theaters of that day. Brandon Thomas and a friend finally produced it themselves.

Opening Night

On opening night it seemed that everyone but the critics thought the play "the funniest one they had ever seen."

Since that December evening in 1892 until the present day, there has hardly been a single week when some group hasn't been giving a performance of "Charley's Aunt" somewhere around the globe.

It is the story of two young Oxford men who invited two young ladies to their rooms to meet Charley's wealthy aunt from Brazil.

Charley's aunt is unable to keep the appointment so an Oxford un-

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Rampage Being Used As Propaganda Device

In a recent report from Noel D. Frodsham, FCC instructor, he said the Rampage is being used to undercut a lot of Communist propaganda throughout the Danish students in Denmark.

Frodsham, who is teaching on a Fulbright scholarship in Denmark, recently commented upon receiving all of the previous issues of this year's Rampage.

Frodsham stated, "I must say a million thanks for the Rampages for these papers had quite an effect on Danish students, especially when they saw pictures of whites and negroes together."

In consequence Frodsham noted the suspicious outlook the Danish students had on anything the American Embassy sent out, but he stated, the Rampage opened their eyes.

He noted in particular that the circulation of just a few copies of the Rampage among his students undercut a lot of Communist propaganda.

The total effect which the Rampage brought about to these different students complies with the all out task of the United States today in its future battle with Communism.

I feel that this Rampage incident was just a coincidence, but the whole matter lies in future American publications which should be used as "eye-openers" to all other people who are not aware of the American customs and traditions, but influenced by this Communist propaganda.

Do You Know Your Fire Warnings, Procedures?

Toot, toot, toot, toot — four blasts of the horn repeated regularly at intervals — yipes, it's the warning for a fire drill!

The fire drill procedure is a very serious undertaking and both the instructor and the student are expected to accept their designated responsibilities.

The instructor will announce "fire drill," the monitors will close the windows and follow other students out of the room, all marching in single file to the assigned station. The instructor will turn off the lights, close the door and follow the students.

Everyone Leave Buildings

Students will walk briskly without talking and crowding. They will keep the line intact when meeting other lines. Students will go directly to the station assigned and line up in double file. Everyone must leave the building without exception. Do not cross the streets.

Instructors nearest the exits will see that the exit doors are propped open, and they will check the number of groups coming out.

Students Use Caution

In case the regular exit is blocked by fire and debris, take the nearest exit, then follow those using that exit to the station. Go slowly so that the exits do not become jammed.

In case an instructor, administrator, fire official or peace officer issues orders contrary to this plan, all students concerned should immediately obey such orders and without question.

After remaining outside at the assigned station for three minutes, instructors and students should return to classes if there is no indication of fire.

A fire drill procedures list is posted in each classroom. These lists will tell you the assigned exits and assigned stations for each classroom.

Every student should check the

list and be sure they know their responsibility as a student. Also, so they can find out the fire drill procedure for each of their classes.

Only the students and faculty can make this fire drill procedure operate properly for the safety of all in case a major disaster should strike the FCC campus.

Girl Tells Of Christmas In Holland; Grief Of War Camp

An early December day in Fresno bathed in sunshine and autumn hued leaves is a far cry from the immigrant crowd of Ellis Island and the crowded quarters of a war time concentration camp.

Anjes Morris, accent fading from her four year stay in the United States, has experienced all of these events and more.

Born in Indonesia, Miss Morris spent her years traveling between her homeland and Holland, mostly due to the population of Holland.

Readjusts To New Life

When arriving at Ellis Island, Miss Morris had to readjust to many customs and even the landscape.

The experience that impressed her most was the train ride across the country to her family's sponsor in Visalla.

Miss Morris stated, "Holland is probably the most overcrowded and smallest country in Europe. So when I came across the country I was amazed at the mountains and the bigness of the land."

Customs also presented a change of element. Christmas is an example of custom change.

Celebrates Dec. 5

Miss Morris explained the Christmas known to us by Santa Claus is celebrated on Dec. 5. Instead of Santa Claus and his jolly stomach there is Sinter Klass and his dark servant, Sinter Klass, a holy man, is from Spain instead of the land of igloos and elves Americans are accustomed to. The holy man accompanied by his servant walks across the country and puts the bad children in a knap sack that he carries over his shoulder. He presents goodies to the ones who have been good all year.

Dutch Christian Christmas is observed in a two-day ceremony of a religious celebration.

One move that was not made by train or bicycle was made in an ox cart from the mountains of Indonesia to the confines of a Japanese concentration camp. Miss Morris's mother, after the outbreak of war in Indonesia, felt it was safer to survive in a concentration camp than to meet the wrath of the roaming guerrilla packs.

Death Rates Rise

As time went on the camp became harder and harder for the imprisoned to survive. Miss Morris states that it was due to the Japanese losing ground in the war. The losing factor caused a depletion of supplies and a downfall of health and a rise in death rates among the prisoners.

"Often," Miss Morris stated, "We had to stand in the afternoon sun for two hours at a time. This was because of the burial of the prisoners that died daily in the camps."

Close calls can also be remem-

bered by Miss Morris. After the war the prisoners were taken to various camps to meet the rest of their families. At the last minute her mother decided not to take this one truck. Later news was received that the truck they were to take was burned by a roving group of irregulars.

All of this is behind Miss Morris as she looks forward to her eventual job in teaching and raising her own 8 month old daughter in America.

Humboldt State College Tells Of Blind Student

An interesting story was written in the Humboldt State College newspaper, the Lumberjack, about a devoted wife and mother of three children, who is Mrs. Marilyn Beckwith. She is HSC's first blind student.

A Vocational Rehabilitation scholarship is sending Mrs. Beckwith through college. Her major is sociology and she plans to get her masters degree in education.

You might have asked yourself by now, how does she do her assignments? Well, she has two student readers who record most of the material from her books. She also takes notes in Braille and types her assignments.

Although legally blind, Mrs. Beckwith has three per cent vision which means she can perceive form, color and color contrast and recognize people by their voices.

Her "eyes" are her guide dog Robin. Robin is with her at school and guides her to classes.

For fun and enjoyment Mrs. Beckwith likes to swim, square dance with her husband and play the accordian, the uke and sing calypso.

Concerning her blindness, Mrs. Beckwith said, "I'm not handicapped, I'm just inconvenienced."

High School Transfers Are On Increase

Fresno High School and Roosevelt High School graduates could each form a large club on the FCC campus.

According to a recent survey 739 FCC students come from Fresno High School while 663 come from Roosevelt High School.

The Fresno Unified School District is represented by 1,866 students from the seven schools in the district. Graduates of the other five schools include Edison High, 187; Bullard High, 96; the Fresno Adult School, 86; McLane High, 71; and Continuation School, 24.

Increase Of 440

Last year only 1,426 students came from this district.

There are 531 students from California high schools outside the Central San Joaquin Valley and states other than California have 572 students at FCC.

Attending FCC are 519 students who did not graduate from high school, two less than last year. Most of these students are enrolled in technical and vocational training programs.

Other High Schools.

Graduates from other high schools in the Fresno area include Clovis, 262; Madera, 144; San Joaquin Memorial, 131; Washington Union, 127; Central Union, 188, and Sanger, 106.

Thirty-one other high schools make up the remainder of FCC's high school transfer enrollment.

Debate Team Goes To LA

A Western Speech Association Forensic Tournament, sponsored by the Southern California Collegiate Forensic Association, will be held Friday and Saturday on the campus of the University of Southern California.

"Resolved that the United States should adopt a program of compulsory health insurance for all citizens" is the National Collegiate debate topic for this year.

Neil Nutio and Dave St. Louis, William Smith and Dennis Rogers and Gordon Berg and Eugene Salazar make up the three teams from FCC. They will also participate in individual events.

The events will be rounds of extemporaneous, oratory, impromptu, debate and interpretation.

Trophies will be given for first places and certificates for places and excellent and superior performances.


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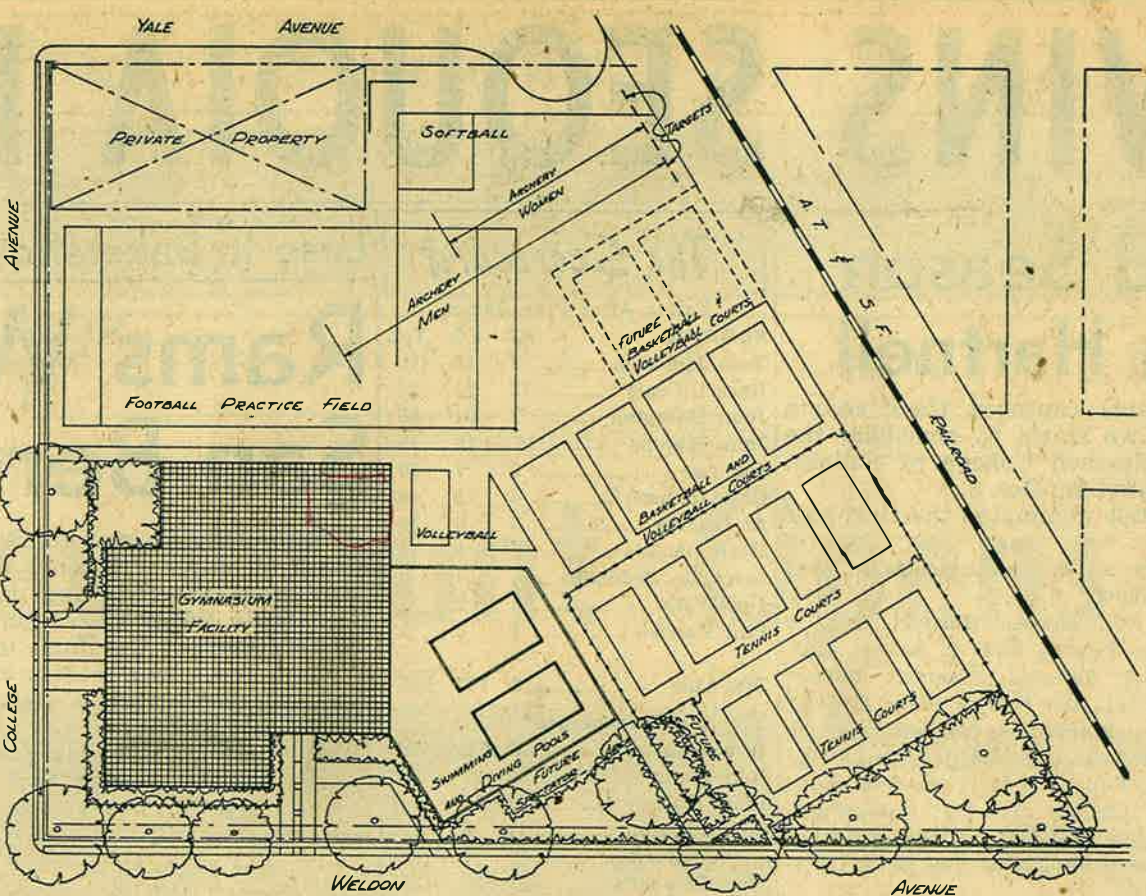

Evening Students' Registration Will Begin On Jan. 3

Currently enrolled students have the first choice of classes in the evening division as well as in the day classes, according to Robert Kelly, dean of the evening division.

Spring registration for currently enrolled students will be held Jan. 3 to Jan. 26. New students will register Jan. 30 and 31.

Night students who plan to enroll for the first time should file high school or college transcripts and an application for admission as soon as possible.

Exams Needed To Graduate

Kelly said new night students who will be candidates for graduation should make arrangements to take the aptitude and placement examinations. The examinations will be given at 8 AM Jan. 24, 30; 7 PM Jan. 31 and 1 PM Feb. 2.

Currently enrolled apprentices do not have to register but will make out their program cards in class under the supervision of their teachers.

Kelly pointed out that if apprentices wish to enroll in other classes, they must go through regular registration.

Expects 2,000 Students

Approximately 2,000 students are expected to enroll in the 138 night classes, Kelly stated.

Eight of the 138 classes are tentative, depending upon demand. These include second classes of English 1A, History 17A, basic English, English fundamentals, intermediate algebra, trigonometry, plane geometry and elementary algebra.

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Zoning Of Old Fresno JC Site May Be Changed

A majority of the city council has instructed Fresno City Attorney John H. Lauten to write an ordinance giving special treatment to the Fresno City Unified School District in connection with the old FJC site.

The school board has been trying to dispose of the site bounded by Stanislaus, Tuolumne, O and P Streets. They have tried numerous times to get the city to waive the provision of the zoning ordinance which would limit any future building to six stories, or 75 feet in height unless a conditional use permit was obtained.

Because of the height limitations the board has been unable to sell the property. Lewis S. Eaton, the president of the school board, appeared before the council to ask for "some relief from the zoning restrictions which is hurting our sale."

The ordinance which Lauten is to prepare must be introduced and adopted by the council before there is any final waiver of the height limitation on the site. The ordinance will probably be ready for introduction at today's regular council meeting.

The band will be playing a variety of music. Music will include tunes from Bach to LeRoy Anderson.

As an activity for the band this year, there will be a pep band at all basketball games. The band will be under the direction of Wesley McElroy.

Dance Bids Can Be Had

The "Christmas in Hawaii" theme will dominate this year's annual Christmas formal dance in the Hacienda's Yosemite Room Dec. 16 from 8:30 to 12:30.

Bids for the dance will be handed out in the foyer of the Student Center.

Committee chairmen for the dance include Brenda Daum and Jon Johnson, decorations; Delores Dickson and Gene Johnson, invitations and bids; Jacqueline Riley and Clark Bridgemann, publicity, and Mike Mowry, properties.

The dance is to be formal, but tuxedos are not essential for the men.

Poster paint and India Ink images conjured by commercial art students bring visions of gaiety, fun and dancing of the Christmas formal.

About 20 posters were made advertising the dance. Two of the posters are banners and the others are of poster board.

The posters were assigned as an art project for Curtis Draper's beginning commercial art class.

Study Shows PE Growth Until 1970

Fresno City College will have an enrollment of 4407 students in physical education classes in 1970.

A study shows that 2818 men and 1589 women will be taking part in physical education classes with an average of 201 men an hour and 113 women an hour 10 years from now. This study was based on figures of the previous 5 years.

These figures can be compared with the present enrollment of 1238 men and 689 women for a total of 1927.

In 1955 FCC had an enrollment of 685 in PE classes. Since then it has been increased by 1242 students. Next year's enrollment will have 1396 men as compared with 1238 now enrolled, an increase of 158 men; and 179 women as compared with 689 now enrolled, an increase of 90 women; and will have a total of 2175 as compared with a present total of 1927, an increase of 248 students.

According to the figures there has been, an average increase of 158 men a year and an average of 90 women a year enrolled in the physical education classes.

Council Starts Food Drive

Students at FCC are being asked to bring canned foods for the Fresno Nutritional Home.

The Nutritional Home is a non-sectarian residence for children with severe health problems which cannot be met by their own families. The Home is supported largely by private contributions.

The student council and the inter-club council are in charge of this drive. There will be barrels in the student center and the auditorium foyers to put these canned goods in.

The FCC Christmas assembly is being held Dec. 20. Students can bring their donation at that time if they haven't already done so.

Miss Doris Deakins, a council advisor, urged "Let's make this a 'white Christmas' for these children."




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FCC WINS SEQUOIA BOWL

Gridders End Season By Dumping Hartnell

The Fresno City College Rams captured their second Sequoia Bowl championship in two starts by smashing the Coast Conference champions, Hartnell College of Salinas, 22-16 in the Sanger High School stadium Dec. 3.

The Hartnell Panthers completely dominated the first half behind the hard running of fullback Henry Kalama. This six foot four inch, 205 pound freshman accounted for 86 yards of the total Panther yardage of 176.

The Rams' hard hitting fullback, George Ward, made 124 of the total 139 yards the Rams chalked up on the ground against the bigger Panther forward wall.

Ward Stars

Ward averaged 4.3 yards a carry in 28 tries and scored two touchdowns to bring his season total to 14.

Although the Panthers outplayed the Rams in the first half, the tables were turned in the second half with the Rams scoring 16 of their total 22 points.

Chuck Caldera broke up the Hartnell defense by completing five quick passes to end Joe Williams, enabling Levi Owens and Ward to skirt around the ends and Glen Schmidt up the middle for the Ram yardage.

Tom Ahajanian, Ram halfback, maintained his fine punting average with five boots for a 42 yard average.

Season Review

The powerful Rams, under the coaching of Clare Slaughter, finished the season with eight wins and two defeats, placing second in league competition behind the undefeated Allan Hancock College of Santa Maria.

The Central California Junior College Association proved to be one of the strongest junior college leagues in the state by placing

four of the seven teams in bowl games.

FCC downed Hartnell 22-16 in the Sequoia Bowl in Sanger, Hancock defeated Riverside College 12-7 in the Orange Show Bowl in San Bernardino, the College of the Sequoias trounced Palo Verde Junior College 39-12 in the Olive Bowl in Lindsey and Taft College suffered a defeat at the hands of Oceanside Junior College in Carlsbad.

FCC posted wins over Fullerton College, Stockton College, The College of the Sequoias, Coalinga College, Reedley College, Porterville College, Los Angeles City College and Hartnell College.

The only blemishes on their record were defeats by Taft College and the CCJCA champions, Allan Hancock College.

George Ward led the Ram offense with 575 yards gained and a 4.6 average. His longest run was 24 yards.

Ward also led in the scoring with 94 points and 14 touchdowns.

Levi Owens tied for second in total yards gained with 382 yards, averaging 5.8 yards and with 54 yards being his longest run.

Joe Williams also picked up 382 yards in the season. This end had a total of 32 points with four touchdowns and a 13.4 average.

Ahajanian, Ram halfback, maintained a 43.8 punting average throughout the season. This average is one of the best JC punt averages in the United States.

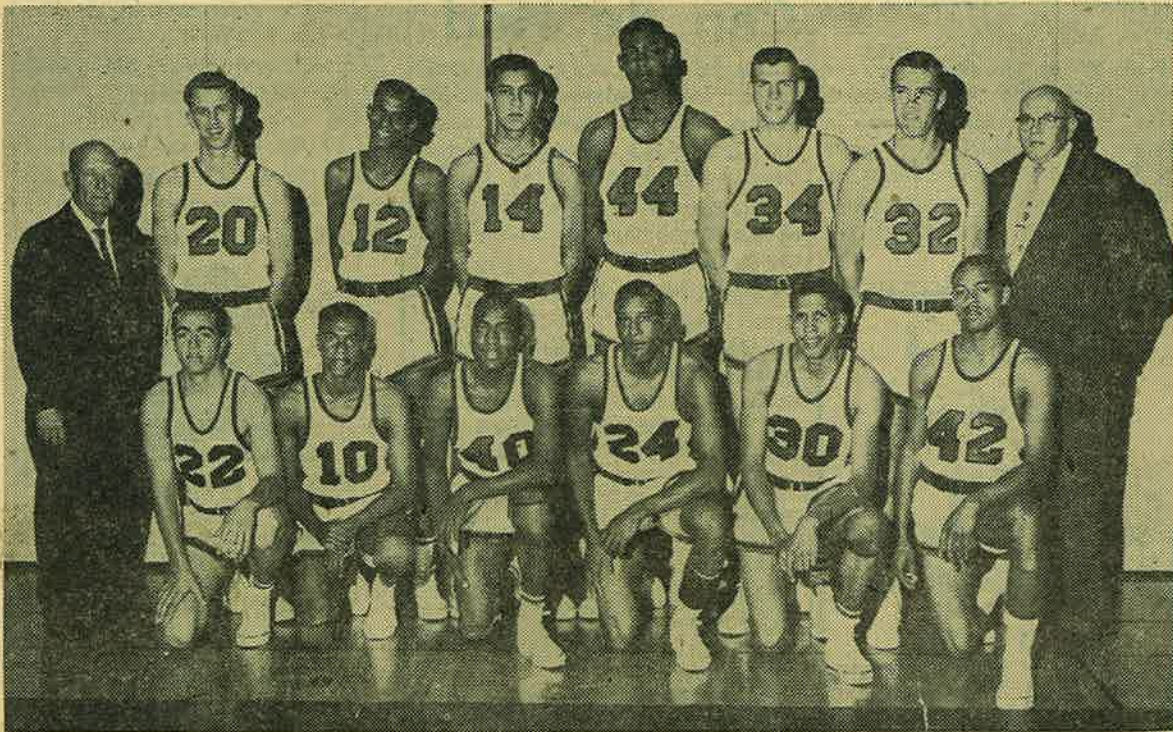
