Christmas Assembly Will Feature Choir Groups

The Fresno City College's annual Christmas Assembly will be held at 11 AM Tuesday in the auditorium.

The program will consist of a two-part ensemble featuring a cantata, "The Christmas Story," by Ron Nelson. Written only two years ago, it features a contemporary style and is characterized by modern and irregular music.

State Changes JC Transfer Requirements

Effective Sept. 1, 1961, two important changes in the state's education code are to be made in conjunction with transfer requirements.

A maximum of 70 semester units earned in a junior college towards a college degree is allowed. Previously, only 64 units were transferable.

Fresno State's Dean of Admissions, Dr. Harry Jones, said that all students ineligible for state college as a freshman must complete 60 units in a junior college with a "C" or better average before being allowed admittance to a state college. This does not count remedial courses.

Dr. Jones also stated that maintenance of a "B" or better average during the student's first year at a junior college makes him eligible to transfer even though 60 units are not accumulated.

"Twenty four semester units or more with a "B" or better average must be earned before transferring," added Dr. Jones.

Traditional Christmas

Highlighting the more traditional side of Christmas the second section will include "Ave Maria" by Dickinson, featuring Margaret Reta, soprano. "All Hail" will be recreated by Leonard Hoskins, tenor, and Karen Pronze at the piano.

"Sing and Rejoice" by Tschesnokov will further add to the holiday program.

John Assadorian, tenor, Walter Friesen, baritone, and LaVerne Thompson, soprano, will be highlighted in the presentation of Dickinson's "Shepherd Story."

The traditional Christmas song, "Silent Night," will be sung by tenor Richard Nunes.

The brass choir, consisting of eight instrumentalists, will accompany the 52 voice choir in singing the cantata.

Nutritional Home Campaign

A portion of the program will also be conducted as part of the campaign for the Fresno Nutritional Home at Christmas time. Those attending the assembly will be asked to contribute canned foods to a Christmas tree furnished by the music classes.

Monday noon, a group of 20 voices will assemble to bring a Christmas program to the North Fresno Lions Club.

Dance Theme Fetes Hawaiian Yuletide

"Christmas in Hawaii" is the theme of the annual Christmas formal to be held tomorrow night in the Yosemite Room of the Hacienda Motel, from 8:30 PM to 12:30 AM.

Bids for the formal are obtainable in the foyer of the Student Center by showing a student body card.

The dance is to be formal, but tuxedos are not essential for the men.

Hawaiian Entertainment

Entertainment from Hawaii will help carry out the theme. Prince Maaka Nua and his Hawaiian Revue will provide authentic Polynesian music, dances and songs.

The prince and his son will perform knife and fire ritual dances. Comedian Princess Papuli will give hula lessons.

AWS-AMS Are Sponsors

The dance is sponsored by the Associated Women Students and the Associated Men Students. Jacqueline Riley, the AWS president, and Clark Bridgeman, the AMS president, are the co-chairmen in charge of planning.

Music will be provided by Bruce Davis and his orchestra.

FCC Students And Instructor View "Threat Of Air Attack"

One of the biggest and most dangerous problems facing the American people is the threat of an attack by a foreign power through the air.

Four Fresno City College students and one instructor were asked the question: "What would you do if we had an air raid here at school?"

Here are the answers of the five people who were picked at random as they strolled through the FCC campus.

After a long pause, Mike Christopher, a physical education major, answered: "There's no place



you can go around here, but if I had time I would take the evacuation route. I know where it is and where it goes. I've made a point of knowing."

Christopher also said that he would not go home first and said, "I certainly believe that an air raid could occur."

Roger Wilhelm, a mathematics major, said: "I don't know. I've never thought about it. I guess I would run to my car and listen for instructions over the radio." When asked whether he would go home first, he replied, "I'm not sure whether I would go home first or not. I most likely would take the escape route, however, I'm not sure." In summing up Wilhelm said that he believed that an air raid is possible and could happen at any time.

"I would stay here." This is the answer given by Peter Christian, an English instructor at FCC. "If I didn't have much time I would lay down on the ground, low, next to the building." (At the time, he was standing outside Bungalow 6.) "If I had time I would go home. I live only a few blocks away. However, if I lived some distance I wouldn't even try to get home. I would never make it. The streets would be so jammed. You would never find me out there." Christian went on to say that he has

a circular basement below his house where he could survive with the proper supplies and be fairly safe from a blast. But he strongly believes that "people should stay where they are, and to get low to the ground if time is limited. "Traveling by car would be impossible." When asked if he believed that such a situation would ever occur, he answered: "I don't think that it will happen." He believes that the "sneak attack is out."

Connie Hardell, a nursing major, gave the familiar answer: "I don't really know." After a moment of hesitation she said: "I wouldn't leave the campus. The safest place is where you are at the time. I certainly won't go to my car and try to leave. That's where everyone else would be going." She strongly believes that this matter is very important and that everyone should know what to do.

"I would do what I did before," says Ron Turner, a psychology major. "One time last year we had an unscheduled air raid alarm (a practice warning), and at the time I was in the administration building. I ran to one of the conference rooms, shut the windows, pulled the shades,

crawled under a table and waited there for 20 minutes while the rest of the students were still walking around in the halls." However Turner said that if he had some time he would go to the cafeteria and get some water to last a few days. "I certainly believe that it could happen. But if I had time to leave Fresno, I would go to Dinky Creek. I wouldn't stay here." Turner pointed out that he believes that the CONALRAD system is outdated because "missiles don't zone in on radio."

FCC Student Will Head Polio Drive

Sally Fox, an FCC student, has been chosen the teenage program chairman of the new March of Dimes for Fresno County.

Miss Fox appealed to all students for help in this drive.

"We have 100,000 envelopes to stamp and 75,000 to fill with data. I urge all students to come down to the Polio Chapter at 165 Fulton St. and help. Refreshments will be served."

Scholarships Available

The main duty of the program chairman is to interest students in health scholarships.

Recruits to help with the drive are high school and junior college students who will be eligible for college scholarships in such fields as medical technicians, occupational therapists, physiotherapists, nurses and social workers.

Robert Roe has been appointed to the chairmanship of the FCC March of Dimes drive. Mary Baker and Doyle Martin will be his co-chairmen.

Two chairmen were chosen from each high school and also from Fresno State College.

Organize Polio Clean-up

One of the responsibilities of the program chairman is to organize operation polio clean-up under which teenagers will go from house to house in Fresno asking citizens to get their polio shots and telling them where they can get the free inoculations.

A tri-county meeting will take place on Dec. 17 at the Hacienda. This meeting will discuss the future plans of the foundation. Two top chairmen from Santa Cruz and representatives from all Fresno County schools will be there.

Need Volunteers

Girls are asked to volunteer for hospital work in January.

"The girls do not have to be majors in nursing," stated Miss Fox. "They can run elevators or take care of children."

A dance will be given in January to celebrate the beginning of the polio campaign. The dance will be at the Rainbow Ballroom and will feature acts from several Fresno nightclubs. Everyone is invited to attend.

Rally Committee Plans Support

Plans are being made by the rally committee to make this year's support of the basketball team better than ever before.

A pep band, directed by Marvin Belford, is being used to promote greater interest in giving the team support.


Robert Roe, a member of the rally committee, said 200 basketball schedules have been placed in the windows of many local stores in order to get more city-wide attention.

Plans are being made to display Fresno City College banners in the sporting goods stores.

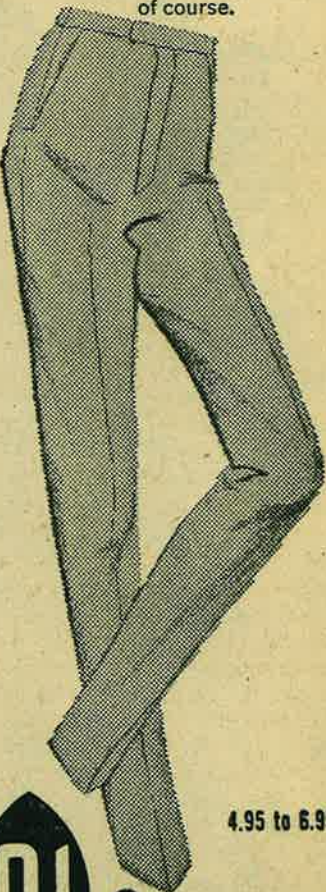

Three Games, Two Tourneys On Tap

The Fresno City College Rams will have their hands full during the Christmas holidays with games with the University of Southern California Frosh, Bakersfield College, Stockton College, the Glendale Tournament and the Modesto Tournament.

The Rams will invade Los Angeles tomorrow with five wins and two losses to meet the USC Frosh at 3 PM in the USC gymnasium.

The strong Rams have posted wins over Bakersfield College, Stockton College, Mt. San Antonio Junior College, Sacramento City College and San Bernardino Valley College and have lost only to Bakersfield College and Phoenix Junior College in the Bakersfield Tournament.

Coach Joe Kelley's Rams will be out for revenge Saturday when they again meet Bakersfield for the third time, with each team boasting a win over the other. Bakersfield will have the edge as the game will be played in their gymnasium at 7 PM.

The Rams will play another grudge game in Stockton Dec. 22 when they meet Stockton College, a team that the Rams defeated earlier in the season.

The Rams will travel to Glendale Dec. 26 to compete in the Glendale Tournament. This basketball feature will host some of the best junior college teams in California.

The southern California critics have rated Los Angeles City College for first place, San Diego City College for second, Glendale College for third and Long Beach City College for fourth place honors, but the Rampage sports staff has picked FCC to upset at least one of these teams.

The Rams will have further action as they travel to Modesto to participate in the Modesto Tournament Jan. 5-7. The competition will not be as stiff in this tournament

and the Rams are one of the favorites.

Friday, the Rams defeated Sacramento City College 59-38 in Sacramento, with Russ O'Leary in the high point saddle with 13 points.

O'Leary was high point man the following night, scoring 31 points as the Rams rolled over San Bernardino, 79-72.

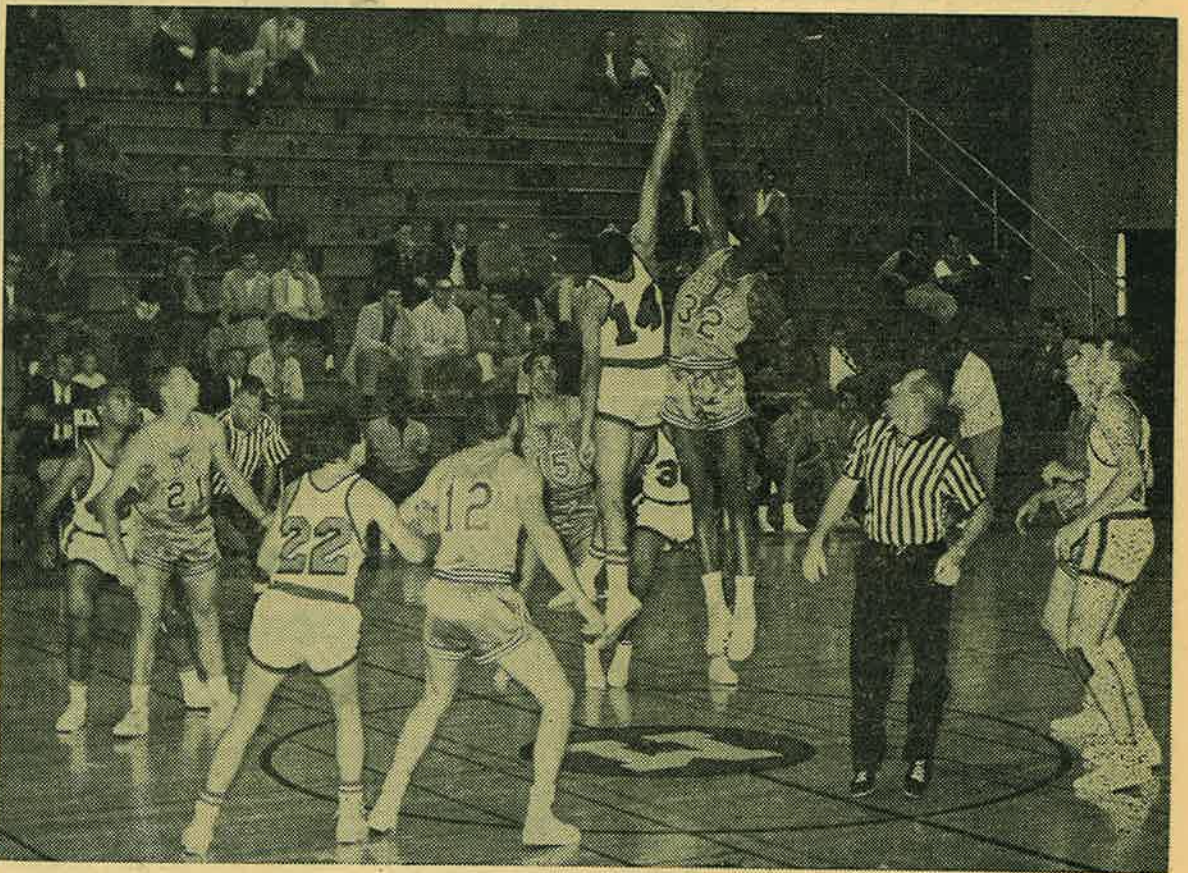

The banquet featured USC line coach Mel Hein as its principal speaker.

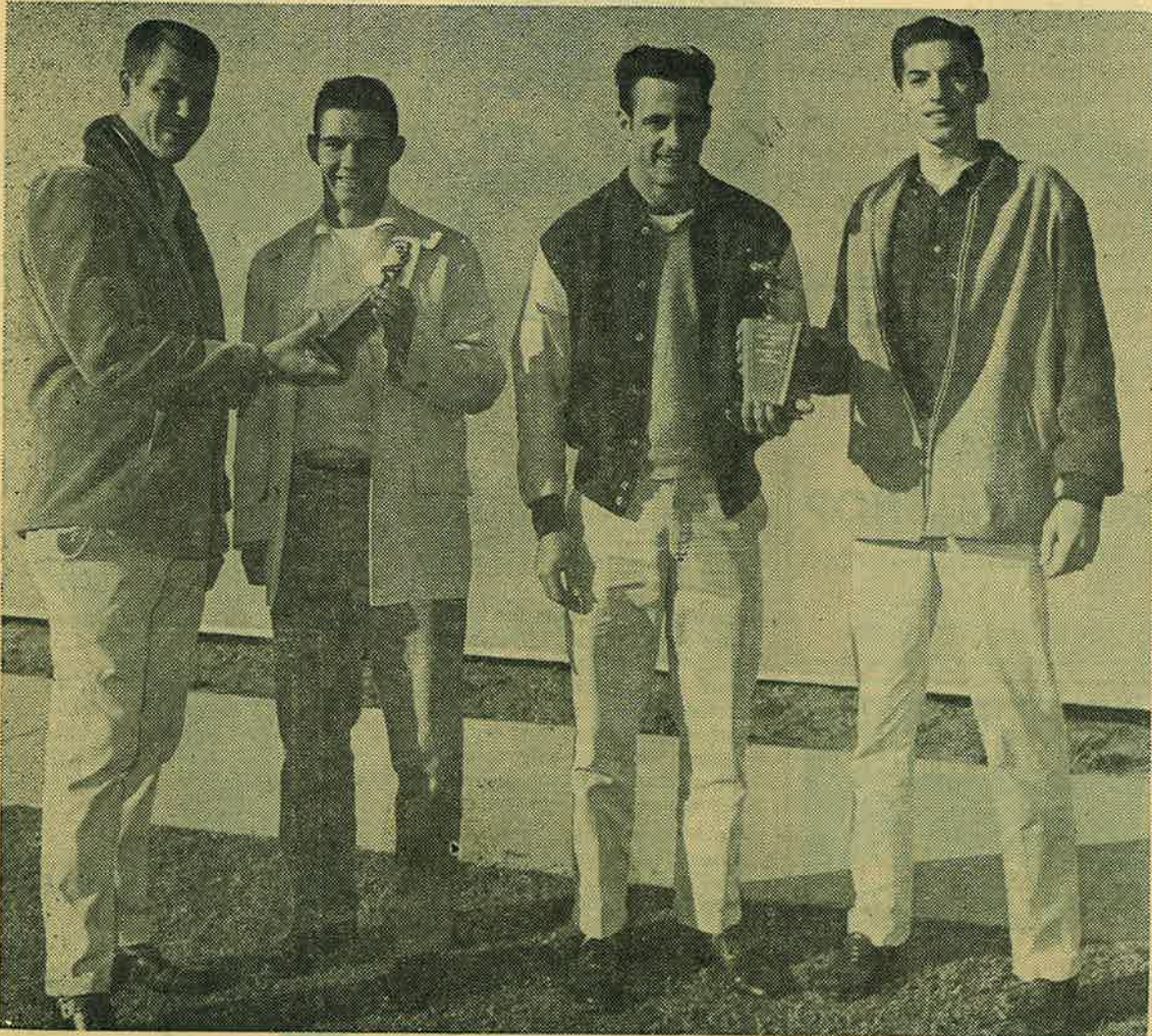
