FCC Participates In Bank Awards Program

Fresno City College will participate in the Bank of America junior college business awards program for the fourth consecutive year.

Miss Ethel McCormack, the FCC business division dean, said students who have completed at least 24 units with a B or better average are eligible. Applications were due in her office yesterday afternoon.

The program provides \$100 to each of two outstanding students in business courses in more than 60 California junior colleges. Winners will be chosen by a faculty committee of each college.

One award will go to a major in banking or business administration and one to a major in the secretarial or clerical fields.

Each of 30 junior colleges in northern and central California must submit the names of its two winners to the bank's headquarters in San Francisco by March 8. The \$100 checks will be awarded in San Francisco April 28 during a business awards dinner.

John H. Becker, the program's director, said the awards program has three purposes. They are to encourage students to consider business as a career, to recognize opportunities in the business world, and to emphasize the importance of the business curriculum in the junior colleges.

Sumpter Picks Spring Drama Production

Drama instructor Clyde G. Sumpter has announced that this year's spring production will be "Mr. Roberts."

The two act play, written by Thomas Heggins and Joshua Logan, starred Henry Fonda in the movie version.

Sumpter said "Mr. Roberts" is a comedy which takes place on a cargo ship in the South Pacific near the end of World War II.

Sumpter said the play has a cast of 30 men and one woman. There are five male leads and 15 other speaking parts. He said there will be nine or 10 walk-on parts, and explained this meant the characters would take part in the action of the play, but would not have speaking parts.

The production will be presented in the FCC auditorium May 6 and 7.

Sumpter reported that tryouts will begin the week of Feb. 24. Rehearsals will start Feb. 29 and will be held Monday, Tuesday, and Thursday nights from 7 PM to 10 PM until the play is presented.

All male students interested in taking part in the production are urged to contact Sumpter. The instructor explained that if not enough men students are interested, the presentation will have to be cancelled.

He'll even go on to tell of how his feat got him into Ripley's "Believe It Or Not" column.

As usual the drinking becomes heavy, the talk loud, and the smoke hangs around as if it were trying to smother the whole scene out. Everyone in the bar decides to toast a fellow who three days before had had a birthday. Then they all toast the bartender because of his discharge; they toast Miss America and Playboy magazine, and they keep on toasting until the biggest drunk in town walks in, waves a sweat-stained hat over his head, and says:

"How 'bout a toast for me?"

Everybody laughs.

"Don't laugh," the drunk says. "I got my name in the newspaper today."

"What for?" someone says.

"I wrote a book," the drunk replies.

The crowd laughs even louder than before, and then one of them asks what the book was about.

"The last scene," the drunk says, "is a deserted street in Melbourne, Australia. The wind is blowing at a helpless banner that was put up by the Salvation Army which reads: 'It's still not too late — brother.' In the background there's the music of the old song, 'Waltzing Matilda,' the drunk stops, and in a shaky voice starts to sing the song.

"Hey," someone in the crowd shouts, "I saw that movie, it's called 'On The Beach', and the fellow who wrote it died a few months ago in Australia."

"That's a lie," the drunk says, with emphasis. "I wrote that story when they exploded the first atomic bomb. That fellow from the newspaper, he believed me."

The drunk takes out a newspaper and reads aloud a headline for one of its stories:

"EVERYBODY HELPED TO WRITE ON THE BEACH."

The drunk goes on to read the reporter's story.

"Clarence G. Weatherbee, transient, that's me," the drunk says, proudly looking up at the crowd; then he continues to read, "'caused a near riot in downtown Fresno today as he went through the street shouting that he wrote the current novel, and motion picture, 'On The Beach!' And Mr. Weatherbee might just not be too far wrong because even though Nevil Shute is the original writer, it does seem like a story that has been written by the entire world's population....."

He goes on reading, and when he is finished someone brings him a beer. Then they all drink with him quietly.

The scene is a beer bar in Fresno. The shuffle board is motionless; there isn't any more laughing, talking, toasting — there is nothing. Somehow, from somewhere, there is the background music of the old song, "Waltzing Matilda," and it is too late now — brother.

Freshman's Election Displays Poor Spirit

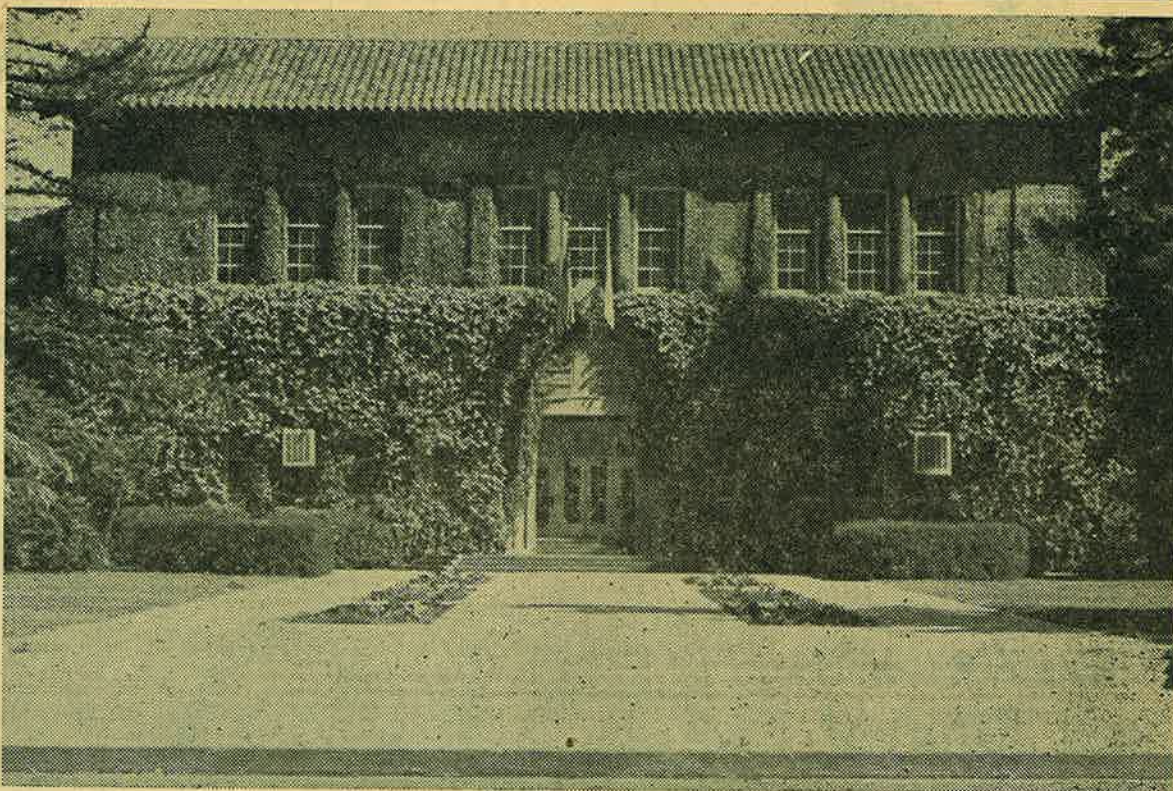

FCC Students Attend Government Confabs

Twenty-eight student council members and two advisors will attend the Central California Junior College Student Government Association Conference in Taft Feb. 27.

The regional conference is a preliminary to the state conference which will be in San Diego March 31 through April 2.

Carrol Jacobsen, the student body treasurer, was elected at the Tuesday meeting of the student council to attend the California Junior College Student Government Association convention as state student coordinator.

Each semester FCC fills the state office position of student coordinator. Last semester Eric Radanovich served in this capacity.

Only five delegates can attend the state convention because of the expense and the space necessary to house delegates from California's 65 junior colleges.

David Hanna, the student body president, said the student council will elect the other delegates to the state convention March 1.

Charles Overs, Jr., representative at large, is in charge of arrangements for the regional conference.

Each FCC student attending

the conference will attend a workshop in one of the following fields: publications, student government, campus activities, finance, secretarial duties, associated women students, or associated men students activities.

Robert Roe, the FCC parliamentarian, is leading the student government workshop. Usually each school is assigned to lead a certain discussion group. Last semester Allen Graves was in charge of the publications workshop at Allan Hancock College in Santa Maria.

The speakers will be Michael Loring of the Beth Israel Temple who will speak on the Jewish faith. Father Arthur Pappos of St. George's Greek Eastern Orthodox Church representing the Greek Orthodox faith and George Tereoka of Fowler, who will speak on Buddhism.

Miss Nixon is president of ICC this semester. Other offices will be filled at the meeting today.

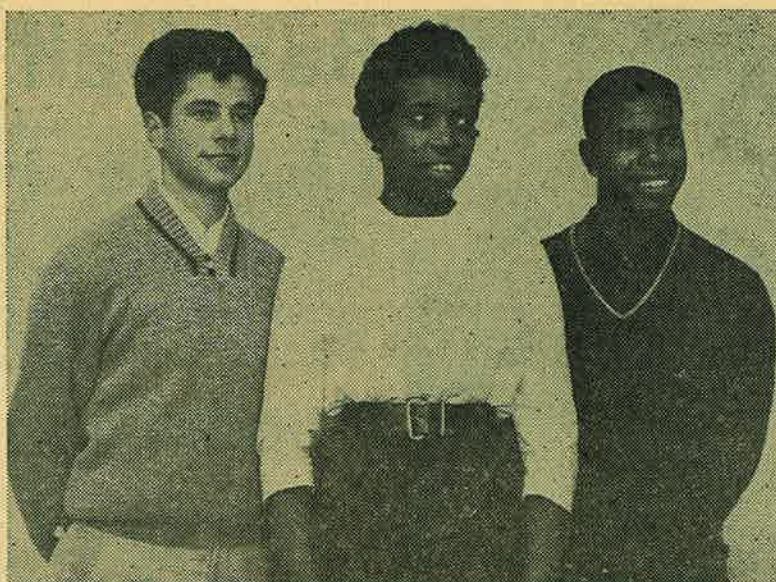
Delta Psi Omega

Airplane Hostess Class Trains Stewardesses

The Fresno City College is offering 15 spring semester classes of particular interest to women. They include airplane hostess training, two vocational nursing courses, and 12 physical education classes.

John S. Hansen, the administrative dean, said the airline hostess training course helps young women learn opportunities and qualifications of the occupation and aids them in developing qualities necessary to become a stewardess or hostess for an airline.

The class is taught by Charles King, a former training director of the North American Aircraft Corporation. Students are instructed in personality development, etiquette, and dress and appearance. They also learn airline procedures, employment information, flight and weather elements, and Federal Aviation Agency regulations.

Vocational nursing students are studying at the city college and in local hospitals under Mrs. Josephine Hostetler and Mrs. Mildred Bosteder. The students take a three semester program preparing

them for state board examinations to become licensed vocational nurses.

The spring courses include nursing principles and skills, meeting at the college, and clinical experience in the hospitals. Sixteen graduates completed the program last semester. The next class will graduate in January, 1961.

The physical education classes include beginning and intermediate courses in modern dance taught by Mrs. Sara Dougherty. They students learn variations in body movements, and they also study rhythm, design, dramatics, and composition. They do body conditioning exercises to improve their posture and poise and their gracefulness and muscle tone.

Margaret Tylor is teaching two sections of group games for women. The main activities are swimming and volleyball. Beginning golf for women is taught by Doris Deakins, and competitive golf is coached by Miss Tylor. Miss Irwin instructs two beginning and one intermediate archery courses.

The visits will include Bullard, Mar. 1; Roosevelt, Mar. 3; Fresno High, Mar. 9; McLane, Mar. 14; San Joaquin, Mar. 15; Edison, Mar. 23, and Clovis High School, Mar. 30.

STUDENTS PARTICIPATE IN DEMOCRATIC CONFERENCE

Several FCC students saw grassroots government in action when they participated in the California Democratic Council's second annual issues conference in Fresno over the week-end.

Nearly 3,000 CDC members went home loaded with 1960 campaign ammunition and impressions of four potential Democratic presidential nominees.

Convention Speakers

The delegates heard Governor Edmund G. Brown, a favorite son candidate; United States Senator John F. Kennedy of Massachusetts and Hubert H. Humphrey of Minnesota, avowed candidates; and United States Senator Stuart Symington of Missouri, an available but unannounced candidate.

The delegates adopted policy statements on subjects ranging from agriculture to our atomic future.

Agriculture: The efficient family size farm must have a fair share of the nation's income. The consumer must have an abundant food supply at reasonable cost. A minimum wage law is needed for farm workers.

Human Rights: A California human rights commission should be established to end discrimination in housing, public accommodations and services and education.

Consumer Problems: For inflation and consumer problems legislation is needed to increase social

security benefits and to provide income needed for such services as schools, roads and health. The base tax should be readjusted by avoiding additional consumer taxes, increasing personal income tax exemptions, and plugging tax loopholes.

Atomic Future

Atomic Future: A state agency is needed to monitor all radiation sources to improve safety measures. The United States must work toward worldwide cessation of nuclear weapons tests, and not distribute nuclear weapons among its allies. The US must explore every possibility of peace agreements with all nations.

Underdeveloped Nations: This nation's aid program should be expanded. The needs of the people of underdeveloped countries, and not the character of their government, must be considered in offering aid.

Roy F. Greenaway of Fresno, a CDC vice-president and the convention manager, said the convention's views on national and international issues will be presented to the Democratic Party's platform committee at the convention in July.

College of the Sequoias will be the scene of the 1960 conference wrestling tournament which will close out the regular wrestling season for Fresno City College.

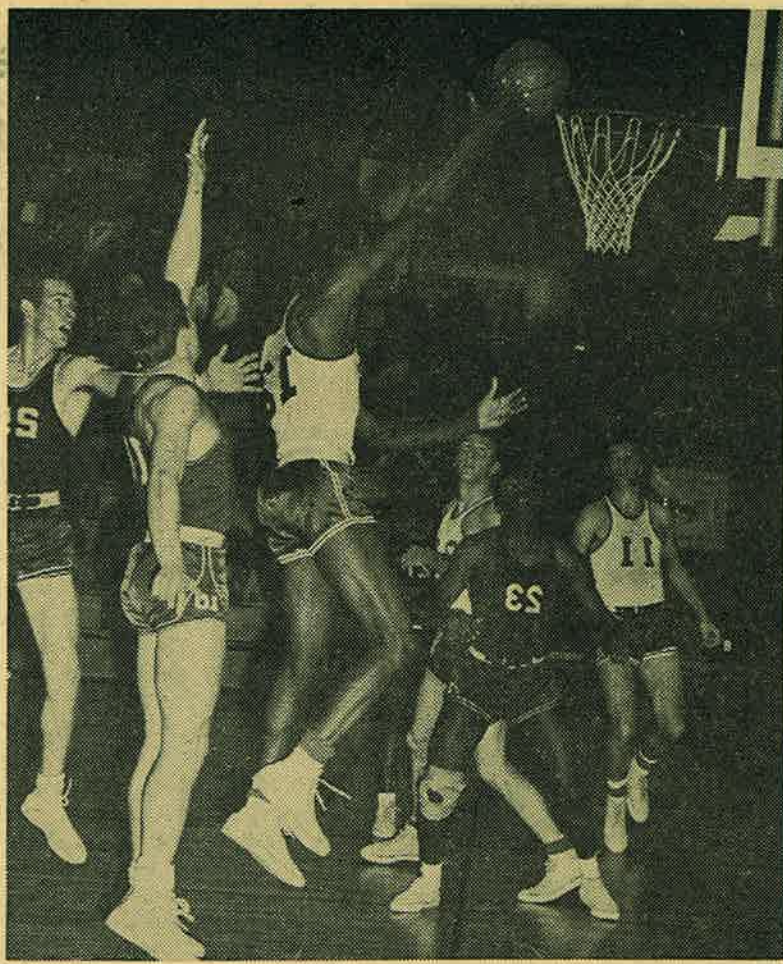
The undefeated Rams will have a tune up meet with San Jose State here today at 4 PM before they travel to Visalia for the Feb. 24 championship meet.
