## 84 Persons Qualify For Honor Roll

Eighty-four Fresno City College students made a B average or better during the fall semester.


Archie Bradshaw, the dean of students, said they comprise the college's honor roll and eligible for membership in Alpha Gamma Sigma, the state junior college scholastic society. Only 59 qualified during the spring semester of 1959.

## Bakersfield High School Wins Sweepstakes In Debate Tourney

Judith Thomas and David Bowen of Clovis High School won first place in the high school debate tournament on the FCC campus last Friday and Saturday.

Bakersfield High School's forensic team placed first as a team and will be awarded a trophy provided by FCC. The team is coached by Mendal Overholt.

Teams from Bullard and Fresno High Schools tied for second place. The annual tournament and

Congress of the Central California district of the National Forensics League were preliminary to the national tournament in San Diego the week of June 21 and the state tournament in Santa Barbara April 29-30.

First place winners in debate and several individual speaking events qualified for the national meet. They include Richard Hicks of Fresno High School, who won the boys' extemporaneous event.

Second place winners in these events and first place qualifiers in humorous and oratorical interpretation qualified for the state tourney. They include Sammy Ganimian of Bullard High School, first in oratorical interpretation.

The second place winners include Donna Johnson, Fresno High School, girls' extemporaneous.

During the sessions of the congress Friday, the house and senate voted for resolutions favoring Communist China's admission to the United Nations and against resolutions favoring euthanasia, ending life painlessly for victims of incurable diseases.

The senate elected Hicks to represent the San Joaquin Valley in the senate at the national congress in San Diego. The house chose Jim Milam of Modesto's Downey High School as its national representative.

At one point in the tournament the mighty debaters were felled not with swords, but by a little wild bird which had gained admittance to one of the rooms being used for the contests.

A strenuous effort was made to evict the bird, but it was a futile effort. In the end the debaters were forced to yield to the invader. The bird retained possession of the room and the speakers were forced to move to another.

More than 300 speakers from 20 high schools participated in the congress and tournament. Overholt is the Central California chairman of the league and was in charge of scheduling events. He

## Only 12 Show Up

"Mr. Roberts" has been cancelled.

Clyde G. Sumpter, drama instructor, made this announcement after tryouts for the play's one female and 30 male parts proved to be fruitless.

"It has been necessary to cancel the spring production," Sumpter said, "because of the lack of interest of the student body."

"Mr. Roberts," a two act comedy written by Thomas Heggin and Joshua Logan, was to have been presented in the FCC auditorium May 6 and 7.

Sumpter reported that only 12 people showed up for the final tryouts for "Mr. Roberts."

Sumpter has not yet decided whether there will be another production at FCC this spring.

This isn't the first time Sumpter has had casting problems. This year's fall production, "Bus Stop," was momentarily jeopardized until Shirley White, fall semester student body president, appeared to take the part of Cherie, the female lead portrayed by Marilyn Monroe in the Hollywood version of the play.

Sumpter also had trouble filling three of the male roles in "Bus Stop."

## College Test Applications Are Available

Applications for the Apr. 28, 1960 administration of the College Qualification Test are now available at the Selective Service System local board here in Fresno.

Students who intend to take this test should apply at once to Selective Service local board for an application and a bulletin of information.

Following instructions in the bulletin, the student should fill out his application and mail it immediately in the envelope provided to Selective Service Examining Section, Educational Testing Service, P. O. Box 586, Princeton, New Jersey.

H. L. Crane, director of test administration, said that applications for the Apr. 28 test must be postmarked no later than midnight, Apr. 7, 1960.

According to Educational Testing Service, which prepares and administers the College Qualification Test for the Selective Service System, it will be greatly to the student's advantage to file his application at once.

The results will be reported to the student's Selective Service local board of jurisdiction for use in considering his deferment as a student.

## Twenty-First Annual Music Festival Begins Tomorrow

The 21st annual music festival of the California Music Educators Association will open tomorrow morning at 8:30 in the FCC auditorium.

At the same time festivals will be staged also at the Arvin, Hanford, Tulare and Sanger High Schools.

More than 3,000 students from 15 high schools and 22 elementary and junior high schools throughout the central valley area are expected to participate in the FCC section of the festival.

The public is invited to all sessions which begin at 8 AM and continue until 6 PM both days. There will be no admission charge. Bands and orchestras will play in the FCC auditorium; vocal groups will sing in the student center social hall.

Members of the FCC band will

be excused from their Friday classes to assist in hosting the event. Marvin L. Belford and C. Lowell Spencer, music instructors, are the co-chairmen on the FCC campus.

Instrumental judges will include Forrest Baird, San Jose State College; Arthur Corra, College of the Pacific; Norman Hunt, Sacramento State College, and Justin Burston, Keynote Music Service.

Vocal judges will include Edward C. Tritt, University of Redlands; Floy Potter, Sacramento, and Erwin Ruff, University of Redlands. A sight reading judge is still to be selected.

Bands will compete from the following high schools: McLane, Madera, LeGrand, Merced, Sierra Union, Livingston, Edison, Gustine, Fresno, Los Banos, Chowchilla, Central Union, Washington,

Roosevelt, and Bullard. Orchestras will be from Roosevelt, Fresno and Edison High Schools. Fresno High School also has a studio band.

### Elementary Division

In the junior high and elementary school division orchestras will be from seven junior high schools, Sierra, Cooper, Kings Canyon, Fort Miller, Yosemite, Hamilton, Wawona and Teague Elementary School. Bands will be from five junior high schools, Cooper, Sierra, Kings Canyon, Wawona and Sequoia, and 12 elementary schools, Madera, Chowchilla, Placerville, Winton, Gustine, Livingston, Atwater, Coalinga, Los Banos, Delhi, Mitchell of Atwater and Mendota.

## Students Lack Interest In Drama Participation

Usually a play is at least given a chance to prove itself before it's discontinued. However, lack of enthusiasm by Fresno City College students has caused the curtain to fall on the planned spring production, "Mr. Roberts," before opening night.

There has been a lack of student enthusiasm in past semesters at FCC, but this semester it seems to have hit an all time low. Only 12 male students actually tried out for the spring play which requires a cast of 30 males. This is not enough to fill the speaking roles.

Clyde G. Sumpter, the drama instructor, had problems casting the fall production, "Bus Stop," which contained only eight characters.

Sumpter said he started the drama department in the fall of 1958 with "Teahouse of the August Moon" which had 27 characters. The second production, "Thieves Carnival," was also successfully cast with 25 characters but all of a sudden he has been faced with casting problems.

Sumpter's professional standards will not permit the drama department to put on a mediocre production. He said a production isn't worth doing if it can't be done properly with the adequate talent and facilities. He commented that it is possible to work around inadequate facilities, but not lack of enthusiasm.

Most of the students in the drama department never had previous drama experience before coming to FCC. After participating they enjoyed it and most of them have stayed about four semesters. There are approximately 20 students in the drama department.

Sumpter stated he didn't know what could be done about this situation as lack of enthusiasm seems to be predominant in most campus activities.

The people who are the busiest, Sumpter commented, are the ones who participate in the majority of activities and surprisingly they are also the best students.

Needless to say, it is discouraging for the instructor when he expends such effort for the school in attempting to create a drama department and to have the curtains close before opening.

## 93 Foreign Students Attend City College

Ninety-three foreign students are attending classes on student visas at FCC this semester.

There are nine nations represented from the Middle East, eight from the Far East and seven from the Western Hemisphere.

Students from the Middle East include one from Cyprus, four from Egypt, four from Iraq, 25 from Iran, three from Jordan, three from Kuwait, eight from Lebanon, three from Syria and four from Turkey.

The Far Eastern countries include three students from China, five from India, eight from Japan, two from Korea, one from Malaysia, one from Pakistan, two from the Philippine Islands and one from Thailand.

Nations in the Western Hemisphere are represented by two students from Brazil, four from Canada, one from Jamaica, one from Mexico, four from Panama, two from Peru and one from Venezuela.

FCC had 83 foreign students registered for the fall semester. Registrations for the past four semesters show a continued increase in foreign student enrollment.

The International Club invites foreign and American students to join their club.

## Class Takes Field Trip

Pine Flat Dam on the Kings River was the destination of a recent field trip undertaken by an FCC economics class.

Gilbert M. Peart, the instructor, conducted a group of 18 students from his class on the economic problems of the San Joaquin Valley through the site.

Peart commented that many people have seen the dam from the outside, but not too many people have the opportunity to actually tour the inside galleries, as his class members did.

The interior of the dam consists of two galleries, an upper layer and a lower. These chambers extend the entire length of the dam and contain instruments for determining the sway of the dam — horizontally, as well as vertically. The dam also contains a means of measuring the temperature of the dam itself.

The class also visited the main office in the dam to see equipment designed to measure the flow of water at the dam and a new electronic device which measures the snow in the high Sierras without the necessity of traveling to the snow.

Many speakers from business firms have lectured to the class. Speakers have come from the Bureau of Reclamation and PG&E.

Speakers from the Agricultural Extension, Ranchers Cotton Oil, Fresno City Schools, Department of Public Welfare, Chamber of Commerce and the State Department of Employment are scheduled for future class meetings.

## Carpentry Students Build Boats

Some of the carpentry students at FCC are building boats this semester. The students under the supervision of Merle Sons have undertaken boat building projects, and at present there are seven boats under construction. This semester there are three cabin cruisers, two inboards, one outboard and one hydroplane. These boats range in size from 16-22 feet.

The cost of building these projects is determined by the kind of boat and its size. The cost of building a cabin cruiser which is a luxury boat is around \$900, and for an outboard or an inboard, or a hydroplane the cost is relatively lower. In such cases all of these boats can be built for more or less, depending on the desire of the builder.

The building time for these boats is two semesters for the cabin cruiser, and one semester for the smaller boats. These factors both depend on the time and the money each builder allots for his project.

In the workshop there is great enthusiasm among the builders, and when problems arise, they are handled by all other fellow builders, therefore, if a newcomer has the desire to build a boat, he is well allotted with help.

## Foreign Students Learn English

English classes for foreign speaking students are being held at the McLane High School and the International Institute, Monday and Wednesday nights from 7 to 9:30 PM.

Speaking, reading and writing English for the immediate needs of non-English speaking adults and lessons in English based upon daily experiences are being taught.

Mrs. Furn Coe said that many foreign students might find it to their advantage to attend these classes. Students can learn or improve their mode of speech through practice.

There will be no transferable grades from the Adult Education class to FCC, but it will help foreign students to understand English better. It might also help to make class lectures clearer.

The current budget includes Associated Women Students, \$442; Associated Men Students, \$595; assemblies, \$105; baseball, \$2,750; basketball, \$1,230; conference, \$616; golf, \$628; guest funds, \$207; honor and leadership awards, \$325; insurance, \$1,400; track, \$2,314; laundering and cleaning service, \$530 and publicity, \$870.

Other allotments are Ram, \$1,900; Rampage, \$2,500; secretarial help, \$26; social affairs, \$549; student welfare, \$40; swimming, \$600; tennis, \$702; transportation, \$1,000; wrestling, \$450; undistributed reserve, \$1,000, and oral arts which is divided into four allotments band, \$633; choir, \$250; debate, \$311, and drama \$605.


## Student Wins Top Rating





# FCC Team Drops Two Contests

The Fresno City College baseball team dropped both ends of an error-filled doubleheader Saturday to the Sacramento Junior College Panthers by scores of 7-3 and 5-4.

The Rams made 10 errors in the two games and looked especially inept in handling bunts. Only three of the 12 runs scored by Sacramento were earned.

The Panthers broke open a tie game in the opener by scoring two runs in each of the last two innings.

The Rams tallied first in their half of the second inning when leftfielder Joe Monis reached third base on an error by the Panther rightfielder. Brian Ross, the Panther pitcher then hit a wild streak, walking three consecutive batters, forcing in Monis. Centerfielder Clark Bridgeman grounded into a fielder's choice to end the rally.

Fresno will attempt to get on the winning side of the ledger Saturday when they host the Stockton College Mustangs at the FSC diamond. Game time is 2 PM.

The Rams will travel to Stockton Tuesday for a return game with the Mustangs.

The Rams now have a season record of 2 wins and four losses.

Sacramento tied the game in the third inning on a pair of infield hits and jumped to a 3-1 lead in the fifth inning on a walk, two errors and two infield outs.

## Rams Rally

Fresno rallied to tie the game in their half of the sixth inning on a walk to Monis, an error and singles by Ken Frankfort and Jim Sanders.

Bucky Hoover went the route for the Rams, giving up seven runs on eight hits. Only three of the runs scored against him were earned. Hoover walked six and struck out four.

The games were played at the Fresno State College diamond, as John Eulless park was being used by FSC.


