Shaver also wants to remind students that today is the deadline for them to submit material for the magazine.


A uniting of the . . . ologies has provided readers of this month's Sunset Magazine with an interesting article about the Great Valley: the San Joaquin and the Sacramento valleys.

Kenneth Hald, a biology instructor at FCC, wrote the article entitled, "The Great Central Valley." Hald, an amateur geologist, asked Francis Leyden, the geology instructor at FCC, to help him with information concerning some of the geological aspects of the valley.

With Leyden's help, Hald wrote the 18 page article, which covers the valley's history from geological time to the present.

The article is highlighted with pictures and maps. It includes interesting sidelights of the history of man in the valley.

Hald's grandparents emigrated from Denmark to Fresno in 1875. His mother was born in a small cabin near the present town of Coalinga. The family moved to Fresno while Hald was just a

Hald Writes Story Three Soroyan Plays For Of Central Valley One Year's Free Rent

Would the Fresno City College students be willing to give up the price of a lunch for three original manuscripts by William Saroyan?

William Saroyan, the Pulitzer Prize winning writer from Fresno, recently advertised that he would swap three of his original manuscripts for a year's rent in an apartment.

Right now Saroyan is broke in aris. He had to leave the United States about a year ago because of income tax problems. His latest play, "Sam, Who Could Jump the Highest of Them All," was a flop in England.

But then he had said before the play was produced that it would be, and the critics only went along with him. But he is still a writer, a writer who has put into American literature works that will stand up with any other great American writer. And I personally think that he'll keep on writing things worthy of the name of letters.

I don't know how many students at FCC are interested in Saroyan's work, and for the most part, that isn't what matters. The important thing is that the school's library would have three original works of a writer who has written about Fresno, the city of his youth. It would be a great thing if the school could get these manuscripts.

Actually the cost for a year's rent in an apartment in France would be slight. And if the student's chipped in with 50 cents

or so, the burden wouldn't be too much on any of us, and the results could be a milestone in FCC's history.

I asked Dave Hanna, student body president, if he'd write Saroyan, asking the price of a year's rent, and Hanna said he'd be all for it. The question remains, will the students?

Some of the things that Saroyan has written are the Pulitzer Prize winning play, "The Time of Your Life," "My Hearts in the Highlands," "Hello Out There," the novels, "Human Comedy," "Adventures of Wesley Jackson," and "Rock Wagram." He has also written many short stories which have appeared in the leading American magazines.

Student Teachers Substitute For Schools' Program



FCC Splits Score First Victory Over Swim Team Games With COS In School's History

Under a blanket of cold wind swept rain, the Fresno City College track and field team was triumphal over the College of the Sequoias, Tuesday, in Ratcliffe Stadium with a close score of 66-56. This meet marks the first time in the history of the meeting of these two schools that FCC has been victorious over COS. The only other time that FCC has even come close to a win was in 1949, while under the coaching of Paul Starr, the Rams came

within three points of the powerful COS team.

FCC was considered the underdog going into the meet, and much to the surprise of many self ordained critics, the FCC Rams mustered an all-around tremendous team effort to smash the COS Giants in many events in which COS was considered to be


