## Evening Students Receive New Policy Regarding Courses

FCC President Stuart M. White's cabinet has approved a new policy regarding evening division students on probation.

Robert M. Kelly, the dean of the evening division, explained that all students on probation who attend evening classes exclusively will be restricted to enrollment in two classes.

"We feel that most night students have other responsibilities besides school," Kelly said, "and this program will not allow them to become bogged down. It will give them more time to work on the two subjects."

"We hope in the long run this will benefit students," he continued.

Kelly estimated that approximately 200 night students are on probation. This, he stated, is somewhere in the neighborhood of 12 per cent of the total evening division enrollment.

The new policy was brought about partly because many students on probation remained in that condition for too long a time, Kelly said, and also because of the precedent set by the daytime program in restricting students on probation to 13½ units.

The new policy will be put to use in the 1960-61 school year.

## Students Will Participate In Spelling Bee

Approximately 50 high school students from 10 county schools and four Fresno City schools will participate in a spelling bee at FCC.

Miss Ethel McCormack, the dean of the business division, will be in charge of the spelling contest scheduled for 9:45 AM on May 7 in Room 209, administration building.

The National Office Management Association is sponsoring the spelling bee to create a greater interest in accurate spelling on the part of secondary school students who are considering employment in the field of business.

NOMA's official spelling list, consisting of 600 words frequently misspelled by the beginning office employee, will be used.

## Field Trip Is Required

FCC geology students who are enrolled in historical geology, will take a field trip to Kettlemen Hills on Saturday.

Francis J. Leyden, the geology instructor, will take the students on this field trip. It is one of many trips planned for this semester.

On this trip the students will have a chance to review and to gather some of the fossils that were deposited some 10 million years ago.

## Three Soroyan Plays For One Year's Free Rent

Would the Fresno City College students be willing to give up the price of a lunch for three original manuscripts by William Saroyan?

William Saroyan, the Pulitzer Prize winning writer from Fresno, recently advertised that he would swap three of his original manuscripts for a year's rent in an apartment.

Right now Saroyan is broke in Paris. He had to leave the United States about a year ago because of income tax problems. His latest play, "Sam, Who Could Jump the Highest of Them All," was a flop in England.

But then he had said before the play was produced that it would be, and the critics only went along with him. But he is still a writer, a writer who has put into American literature works that will stand up with any other great American writer. And I personally think that he'll keep on writing things worthy of the name of letters.

I don't know how many students at FCC are interested in Saroyan's work, and for the most part, that isn't what matters. The important thing is that the school's library would have three original works of a writer who has written about Fresno, the city of his youth. It would be a great thing if the school could get these manuscripts.

Actually the cost for a year's rent in an apartment in France would be slight. And if the student's chipped in with 50 cents

or so, the burden wouldn't be too much on any of us, and the results could be a milestone in FCC's history.

I asked Dave Hanna, student body president, if he'd write Saroyan, asking the price of a year's rent, and Hanna said he'd be all for it. The question remains, will the students?

He has also written many short stories which have appeared in the leading American magazines.

John S. Hansen, the dean of administration, said that only one program card will have to be filled out in the future. He explained that copies will be made of the card in the office.

Hansen stated that the spring registration period has been shortened to one day because the majority of students will have been pre-registered beforehand.

Score First Victory Over COS In School's History

Under a blanket of cold wind swept rain, the Fresno City College track and field team was triumphal over the College of the Sequoias, Tuesday, in Ratcliffe Stadium with a close score of 66-56. This meet marks the first time in the history of the meeting of these two schools that FCC has been victorious over COS. The only other time that FCC has even come close to a win was in 1949, while under the coaching of Paul Starr, the Rams came within three points of the powerful COS team.

Golfers Set For League Tilt Friday

Fifteen Fresno City College women will represent FCC at the College of the Sequoias Sportsday which will begin Saturday. This group will be accompanied by women's physical fitness instructor, Cathern Irwin.

The schools that will be represented are Allan Hancock of Santa Maria, Reedley, Porterville, Taft, Coalinga, COS, Fresno City College, Bakersfield, Cal Poly of San Luis Obispo, and Fresno State College.

Running against a strong wind, Bill Hall, FCC sprint star, again showed his superior running ability by finishing first in the 100 yard dash far ahead of the cries of the pack with a time of 9.9 seconds. Hall also captured a first place in the 220 yard dash with a time of 22 seconds flat. In these two events Hall added ten points to the FCC tally.

Harry Edwards, who should be the next holder of the national junior college discus record, tossed the plate 166 feet 6 1/4 inches to take a first place honor. Edwards was 23 feet 3 inches out in front of the second place thrower, a Ram teammate, Chet Rooters, who threw the discus 143 feet 3 inches. Benney Benneyan threw the discus 141 feet 7 inches to take a third for the Rams. Edwards, on his third throw, sailed the plate well over 170 feet, but stepped out of the foul ring in doing so. Naturally this throw was not counted. The national junior college record being 168 feet 7 inches, anyone should see why Edwards is considered one of the top discus men in the country.

In second place with a league record of 6-3, the Fresno City College golf team will swing back into league action against Porterville at Muni tomorrow at 2 PM.

The Rams were responsible for setting one meet record, in the medley relay. ## Baseball Squad Needs Wins To Stay In Race

The Fresno City College baseball team, which practically eliminated themselves from winning this year's Central California Junior College Athletic Association race, will try to remedy their loss to Porterville last week, when they take on the cellar-dwelling Allan Hancock Bulldogs of Santa Maria in a league double header. The game, the first CCJCAA contest in Fresno this year, will be played on the Fresno State College diamond, starting at 1 PM, Saturday.

The Rams, who now sport a 13-9 season record and a 4-2 league record can, mathematically, stay in the race, if they win both games from Hancock. If the Rams beat COS twice next week and Reedley splits with COS Saturday the Rams and Reedley will be tied for first. If the Giants of COS beat Reedley twice and the Rams beat COS it will throw these two teams in a tie. So either way you look at it the Rams can tie for the league title for the second year in a row, but they have to beat Hancock and COS to do it.

Expected to start for the Rams in the infield will be Tom Burkman, first baseman, who has a season batting average of .250 but whose league average is a respectable .357; Pete Lango, second base, batting .294 for the season and .368 in league play, which leads the Ram batters in CCJCAA play; Jim Saunders, third base, hitting an even .300 for the season and leading the Rams in that department, and hitting the ball at a .350 clip in league. Rounding out the infield will be homerun hitting Tom Jacobsen at shortstop. His four roundtrippers lead the Rams in that department and his

13 runs batted in also lead the Ram hitters. He is hitting the ball at a .273 clip for the fading season and has a .360 average in the league.

In the outfield will be Joe Monis or Herm Dickerson in left field. Dickerson, who is hitting .364 for the season and .375 for the league action might put starter Monis out of the starting position. Monis' batting average is an even .000 in league action and has dipped from .400 a few weeks ago to .299.

Starting in center field will be either Clark Bridgeman or Glen Schmidt. Bridgeman has the better batting average, .255 to Schmidt's .182 for the season, but Schmidt has committed only three errors to Bridgeman's five.

The right field starting spot will be held down by Earl Cozart. Cozart's season average of .206 is overshadowed by his league average of .400. He will be backed by Dan Rameriz.

Catching for the Rams will be Ken Frankfort and the pitching will be divided by Bucky Hoover, Doug Atwood and Don Coulter. Hoover will play first base in one of the games.

On May 7 the Fresno City College Rams will conclude their 1960 season when they meet the College of the Sequoias at Euless Park.
