

UC Engineering College Sets Higher Math Requirements

Pre-engineering students who plan to attend the University of California's College of Engineering will have a new requirement to meet beginning next year.

John S. Hansen, the vice-president of FCC, said 16 units of lower division mathematics will be needed in the future instead of 12 units, the present requirement.

Hansen said the lower division mathematics requirements will include analytical geometry, calculus and advanced calculus.

Previously these two courses have been taught separately with analytical geometry preceeding calculus, but Hansen said next year the two will be woven together.

Hansen said instructors from Fresno State College, with whom FCC consulted before making the change, came to the conclusion that the new integrated teaching program would be beneficial to pre-engineering students.

The new system resulted from a fight between a student and a professor who allegedly failed him because of "political disagreements," and destroyed his examination paper to prevent

In the new grading system, numbers are assigned to final exam papers and professors have no access to students' names. Grading is by number only. Not until grades are entered and distributed can a professor find out a student's number, but he can add or subtract three points from a student's grade for class participation and attendance before seeing the

"This gives a student complete freedom to say what he wants in class, and it discourages the kind of student that curries favor," says the DAILY

When the tour crosses the English Channel at Dover and returns to London, the class will fly back to the United States. Mrs. Handy, however, and a friend, Mrs. Orean Taylor also taking the tour, plan to leave the group for a side trip through England to Edinburgh and Glasgow, Scotland. They will include Belfast, Ireland on their itinerary if they are able to arrange transportation.

Dr. Theodore Grivas and Dr. Robert G. Comegys, associate professors of history at Fresno State College, will accompany the group — lecturing as they travel. The students are expected to take lecture notes and to keep notebooks of the trip. These notebooks will be turned over to the professors at the end of the journey, and then returned to the students to form the basis for the term paper each student is required to write to conclude the course.

Mrs. Handy said the course will emphasize the growth of western culture. She said the tour is open to anyone who can register as a state college student. The total tour fee of \$1,295 includes the college reg-

First Inning

Oakland appeared ready to chase the Rams out of the park in the first inning, as they parlayed four solid singles, and a ringing double into four big runs. It appeared at this point the Rams wouldn't even come close to winning much less have the good chance they had.

The Rams came right back in their half of the first inning with some fireworks of their own. Clark Bridgman, who was a standout all day, caught the Oakland infield sleeping and laid down a perfect drag bunt down the third base line.

Blasquez then aided the Ram cause by throwing a potential double play ball off the bat of Sanders into centerfield, with Bridgman legging it to third.

Hoover then sent Bridgman home with a solid single, and Pete Lango beat out an infield chopper to load the bases. Dan Ramirez unloaded a long fly ball which the T-Bird leftfielder pulled down with his back to the wall. Sanders scored after the catch, making the score read 4-2 after one inning.

The Rams added another tally in the fourth on a long triple to right-center by Monis and a single by Ken Frankfort.

Oakland threatened again in the fifth inning, but Bridgman pulled down a long drive next to the 407 foot marker in center. and Ramirez backed to the right field to pull down another long drive.

Rams Lead

Frankfort and Burkman walked, forcing in one run, Jacobsen singled in another, and the final run scored on a wild pitch by Blasquez.

The fielding play of the game, and there were many on both sides, was turned in by Lango in the seventh inning. The hustling infielder dove and trapped a hard grounder on the infield grass, picked himself up, and threw the runner out at first base.
