## Assembly Begins Three Days Activities

Parades, queens, floats, a coronation, an assembly, a dance, game and luncheon will be the component parts of Homecoming 1962, which begins today at Fresno City College.

The climax of the three day festivity will be the crowning of the Homecoming queen at the game with Modesto Junior College Saturday night.

FCC students will get their first glimpse of the candidates for Homecoming queen today at noon at the annual Homecoming assembly.

The candidates who will be introduced today are as follows: Annette Quintal, Patricia Wright, Maryhelen Orosco, Kathy Kochergen, Kathy Klepper, Janet Clemans, and Diane Benbrook.

Coach Clare Slaughter and David St. Louis, former student president at FCC, will speak at the assembly in the auditorium and the pep girls, yell leaders and majorettes will perform. They will be backed by the Fresno City College band.

Fred Faleta is the master of ceremonies.

A luncheon will be held at 1

PM today to honor FCC alumni. Mrs. Shirley White Bell will be the speaker. It will be held in the committee room of the cafeteria.

Tomorrow's features will be the election of the Homecoming queen and the Presentation Parade with the candidates atop the floats of their sponsoring clubs.

The parade will form at noon on San Pablo Ave. and will proceed west on Weldon Ave. and will travel twice through the circle driveway in front of the student center.

The Fresno City College band and majorettes will lead the parade.

Voting for queen will take place from 8 AM to 2 PM tomorrow. Election booths will be set up in the student center foyer and in front of the library. They will be manned by Circle K Club members.

### Coronation

The results of the balloting will not be known until the coronation at the halftime of the game Saturday night when FCC hosts the Modesto College Pirates in McLane Stadium.

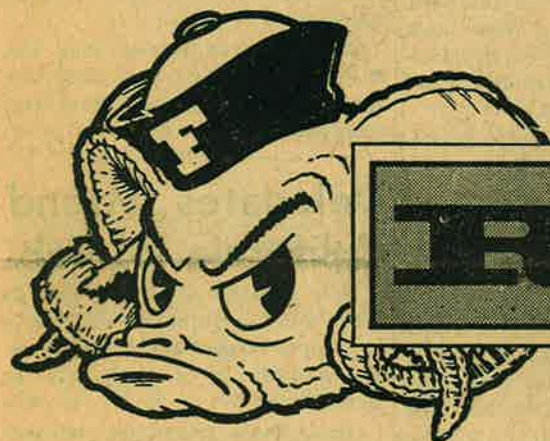
The Homecoming queen will be crowned Saturday night during the halftime activities.

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## Graduation Petitions Available

Students expecting to graduate after the spring semester should file for the petition for the associate in arts degree as soon as possible so that they may have time to plan their spring program and sign up for the required classes that they may not have fulfilled.

In order to file for the AA degree, one must first go to the admission office, pick up the petition on the front counter and fill it out.

The office will keep the copy and send a copy to the student's counselor.

### Petition By Mail

The student should receive the petition in the mail in a reasonably short period of time.

If it is not obtained through the mail, the student should contact the office to see if any mistakes have been made.

### Must Attend Exercises

The petition states that those students who are in attendance on campus this semester are expected to be present at the commencement exercises in order to have the associate in arts degree conferred upon them.

Students who qualify for the Associate in Arts degree must have completed 60 units as prescribed in the Fresno City College handbook. The handbook may be obtained in the Administration Building.

## FCC Students Obtain 4. Averages

Four Fresno City College students made straight A grades during the '62 spring semester.

Two of these full-time students are among 62 others now enrolled in the fall semester whose names are listed on the honor roll. These students are qualifying for membership in the state junior college scholastic honorary society, Alpha Gamma Sigma.

### Dudley, Moberly

The two are Miss Jean L. Dudley and Fred Moberly, both of Fresno. Miss Dudley, an education major, graduated from Euclid High School in Ohio. Moberly, who is majoring in dentistry, is a graduate of Bishop Manogue High School, Reno, Nevada.

The other two students, Gary Leslie of Clovis and Ray Poston of Fresno have completed their studies at city college.

### 3.3 For Honor List

In order to be a member of Alpha Gamma Sigma and to qualify for the honor roll, a student must have taken at least 12 units last spring and made at least a 3.3 grade point average. A 3 average would be a B record.

Students on the honor list include 54 who live in Fresno and eight who live in other communities of the Central San Joaquin Valley. They include two each from Madera and Selma and one each from Clovis, Chowchilla, Sanger and Malaga.

# ELECTIONS—ROOM FOR IMPROVEMENT

There have been a number of complaints aired during the past week about the manner in which the recent campus elections were handled. It is not uncommon for complaints to be heard after an election of this type because invariably there are some poor losers.

In this instance, however, there seems to be some justification for the dissatisfaction. Some of the more frequently heard complaints are:

1. Candidates using gifts and other material means to impress voters.
2. Candidates were present and campaigning at the voting tables.
3. The rules of ballot secrecy were not strictly enforced.
4. Persons working at the voting tables were in some cases closely associated with the candidates. Some were campaign managers.
5. The vote counting procedure was "sloppy" and inconsistent.

It is realized that the organization and management of elections at FCC is not an easy job, and the question of whether campus elections are actually worthwhile is another subject open to debate. If, however, elections are to be held, they should be well planned and should be operated with proper organization and discipline. This is a must if respect for student government at FCC is to be maintained.

# Students Save Fortune By Attending Fresno CC

How much money do you save per year by attending Fresno City College rather than going away to school?

Dr. Paul Nielsen, FCC vice president, held up one thousand dollars in cash at the recent freshman assembly to answer that question.

The \$1,000 estimate is based upon figures released by the United States Office of Education statistics, as reported by Dr. Fredrick W. Giles of Seattle. Giles is one of the nation's foremost authorities on junior colleges.

His statement indicates that FCC students, who spend about \$88 per year out of their own pocket, actually receive the equivalent of several million dollars in "scholarships" during the school year. The large local enrollment,

therefore, represents a large boost to local spending power.

Students who take advantage of the "scholarships" need not fear that they are receiving an inferior education, since FCC has served the community for over half a century, and has never failed to receive the maximum five year accreditation. This means that all units earned at FCC are transferable to any college in the nation.

# Attendance Regulations Explained

Absences, including those due to illness, shall be computed in determining excessive absences.

The basic procedure for computing excessive absences this year is that after a student has missed a class the number of times the class meets in a week, any additional absences are considered in excess. When this occurs, a letter from the dean of men or women is sent to the student. He is given a period of time to explain the absences, or be dropped with a WF, if not satisfactory explanation is given by the date in the letter.

## Tardiness Unexcused

"Absences caused by home engagements, personal transportation delays and business affairs will not be excused, and no absence slip is required," states the College's attendance regulations.

"Students are expected to be in the classroom at the time the class begins. When a student has been tardy three times in a given class it shall be considered as one unexcused absence."

A student who needs a short time off may generally take a week's leave of absence if he is maintaining a "C" average and files a petition which is obtainable in the Attendance office. If the leave is for work, a written verification must be provided.

## Must Make Up Work

Make-up of missed work must be completed to the satisfaction of the instructor, and an excused absence does not mean the work does not have to be completed.

The students are reminded that it is their responsibility to inform the Attendance office, Room 128 of the Administration Building, of the reason for an absence if it is due to illness.

# Norman is Co-Author Of New Nursing Book

Mrs. Mabelclaire Norman, the director of Fresno City College's new professional nursing program, is a co-author of the second edition of "The Drug, The Nurse, The Patient," a textbook on drugs for nurses. The book was published by the W. B. Saunders Company in Philadelphia and London in June, 1962.

Mrs. Norman, a former assistant professor in the Department of Nursing at San Jose State College, wrote in conjunction with Dr. H. Robert Patterson, a professor of bacteriology and biology at San Jose State and a pharmacist for San Jose's O'Connor Hospital, and Mary W. Falconer, an instructor of pharmacology at the O'Connor Hospital School of Nursing. At the same time she was writing this book, Mrs. Norman was studying for her master's degree at UCLA.

According to Mrs. Norman, the book has a new approach to the study of pharmacology and drugs by nursing students in that it is

based on the patient and his recovery. The book discusses the various clinical conditions and drug therapies used. The roles of the nurse and the patient are also considered.

Mrs. Norman stated that she enjoys writing and that since she specialized in drugs it gave her real pleasure to write this book.

Maul attended FCC last year and was a member of the student council and the band.

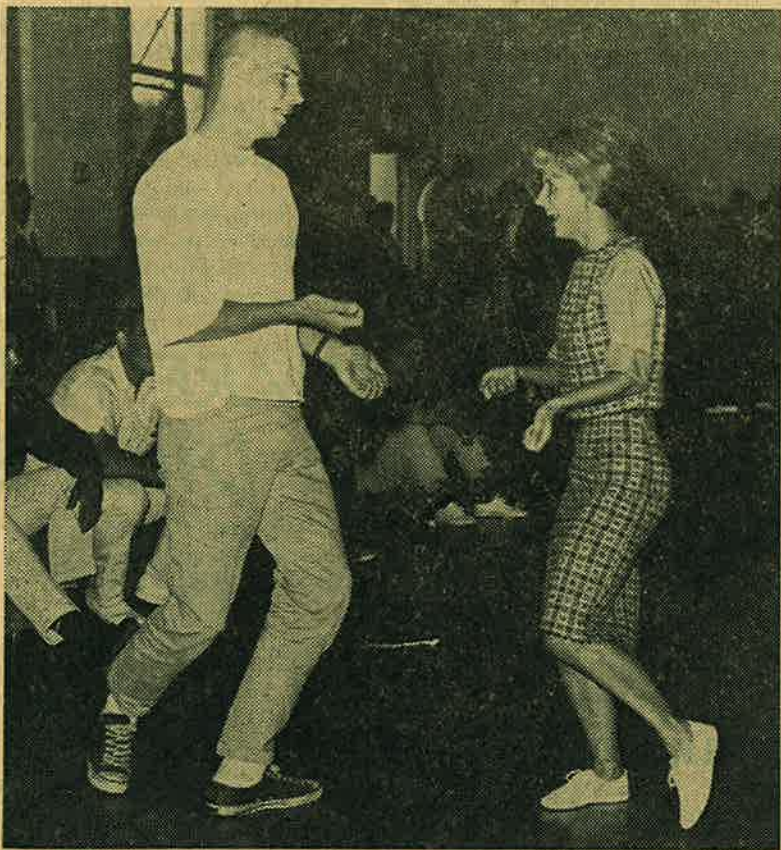
He will receive six weeks of training at the University of Washington beginning in November and will return to Fresno for the Christmas holidays.

Maul applied for the Peace Corps last May when a representative took sign-ups in the student center.

He was notified his position by telegram this summer while vacationing in Europe.

### Schiffman: Corps Troops Are Healthy

Dr. Edward Schiffman, regional director of Near East and South Asian programs for the Peace Corps, said at an assembly last Monday night that the overseas volunteers have been remarkably free of any health problems.

He said that about one percent of the volunteers have been forced to return home because of ill health. He added that perhaps half this number resulted from health reasons.

#### Some Dropped Early

Dr. Schiffman said many were eliminated from the program before they go overseas.

He said that some don't make it because they can't learn the language. Some have personality traits which would prevent them from making necessary adjustments.

"We need people who can adjust to a variety of cultures," he explained.

#### Qualifiers Found Easily

Dr. Schiffman said that generally the Peace Corps has little difficulty finding qualified volunteers, but there has been some difficulty obtaining the necessary number in certain fields such as agriculture, mathematics and science.

Leland G. Turner, a former FCC student, was recently accepted by the Corps and is now a teacher in Peru.

### State Board Picks White For Council

Stuart M. White, president of Fresno City College has been appointed by the California Board of Education, to the state's coordinating council for higher education as the representative of the junior colleges.

The coordinating council is a 15 man group responsible for overseeing the development of the University of California, the state college system and the junior colleges under the 1961 master plan for education.

Its primary job is to set up an orderly pattern of selection of new campus sites and to prevent duplication of educational functions.

White's appointment was made after five other junior college presidents were considered. His alternate is Dr. John Lombardi, president of Los Angeles City College.

White came back Tuesday from Kenya, Africa after going on an educational survey. The four man team of which White was a member, made a study for the Kenyan government.

### Evening Percentage Higher

## College Dropout Five Percent Less Than State JC Average

"FCC's student dropout is far less than the state average." This is the statement given by George C. Holstein, dean of admissions and records. The dropout average is between 20 and 22 percent for all junior colleges in the state while only 13 to 16 percent for Fresno City College. He said the percentage of dropout in the 1962 spring semester was 14 percent, while in

the previous semester it was 13 percent. The rate has ranged between 13 and 16 since the fall of 1961.

The evening division rate dropped from 23 percent in the fall of 1959 to 17 percent last spring.

"An even better record has been achieved by the day program. The rate among day students has dropped from 14 in the fall of 1959 to 8 percent in the spring of 1962 and the fall of 1961," Holstein added.

"We must have better holding power," he declared, attempting to explain the differences between FCC's dropout average and that of the state average.

"Maybe we're doing a better job of counseling," he added.

#### Arts Club Hosts Dr. Lee Roy Just

Dr. Lee Roy Just will speak on art and philosophy at the Fine Arts Club meeting Tuesday at noon in Room 230 of the administration building. He is an instructor of philosophy and sociology at Fresno City College.

The club meets every other Tuesday, under the direction of sponsor Mr. Dean Draper and president Roger Derryberry. The other officers are Clarence Maus, vice president; Harold Knight, secretary-treasurer and Linda Wright, ICC representative.

### UCSB Offers Three-Year College Instructor Course

University of California at Santa Barbara officials have announced their university's program for FCC students planning to attend UCSB to become college instructors.

The Experimental Program for Colleges (EPIC) is only at the Santa Barbara branch of the University of California. EPIC is sponsored by a Ford foundation grant.

#### Three Year Program

Students must have a B or better in all their classes to be eligible. Last year 150 applications were made for the 55 positions in the three year program.

Persons who plan to enter Santa Barbara as juniors in Sept., 1963 are eligible, either if they attended the school for the first two years, or if they are junior college transfers. In either case the closing date for application is Feb. 12, 1963.

BILL SHARP

Bill Sharp represents a sizable amount of Clare Slaughter's football beef at a solid 205 pounds spread over his 6-3 frame.

He made his bid for a starting center position during early practice drills and handled extra duty due to Bill Fortenberry's leg injury. Sharp proved himself more than capable of handling the job and his ability prompted a shift moving Fortenberry to a tackle slot.

Sharp, a liberal arts major, was a three year letterman at Fresno High and also excels in track and gymnastics.

Ralph Salazar is the "cream of the crop" among the veteran line crew and is one of the few Rams that double on the offensive and defensive units.

The 197 pound sophomore came to Fresno as a fullback, but was quickly converted to a guard last year. Salazar's forte appears to be defense, as he has done a steady job at the linebacker position for the past two years.

The 6-2 Salazar is a physical education major from Central Union High School.

FCC hopes took a quick jump this year with the news that Chuck Caldera had returned to the gridiron after a stint in the service.

The pint sized Caldera, the Rams' top quarterback two years ago, is noted for his passing, leading the Rams to an 8-2 record and a win in the Sequoia Bowl in 1960. His consistency and stamina have remained a chief factor in Ram success this year.

The physical education major is from Sanger High School, where he starred in football, basketball and baseball.



LEVI OWENS

There wasn't much doubt that Levi Owens would be a top backfield candidate when he came to Fresno City College. The 190 pound sophomore was named the most valuable player as a senior at Barstow High School.

Owens, who returned to FCC after a year's layoff, quickly showed Fresno fans why he was selected with his slashing running.

The 20-year-old education major has, as expected, carried a major load of the Ram ground game.

## Modesto — Homecoming Foe

Homecoming for 1962 sends the Fresno City College gridders after their third win of the season and gets the Valley Conference season into swing against Modesto.

However, mingled with the joyous festivities of Homecoming is a bleak realization that the Rams may not be at full strength when attention focuses on McLane field Saturday night.

### Book Problems?

A possible loss of several first string players due to class room problems has Coach Clare Slaughter scrambling for replacements against the thrice victorious Pirates.

Modesto Coach Stan Pavko's gridders have looked impressive in their early season games and

have only one loss, a 20-12 defeat to Contra Costa College, on their record.

Pirate wins were against Cabrillo, a team that beat FCC 6-2 last week, Diablo Valley and Monterey. The win over Monterey was a 36-0 shelacking.

The Rams haven't played Modesto since 1954 when they beat the Bucs 33-7, but three scouting missions give FCC an idea of what to look for.

### Pretty Hefty

The Pirate offensive line sports an average weight of 208 pounds and has some of the best talent in the Valley Conference.

All-American prospect John Zentner, a 235 pound right tackle, is the cream of the crop and

running-mate Gary Standifer adds another 240 pounds at left tackle.

The Modesto split-T formation features the bulldozing of fullback John Holbrook, who is little as fullbacks go at 168 pounds and 5'4".

The history of Modesto vs. FCC football is a short one and dates back to 1952. The two schools played a series of three football games splitting two and tying 12-12 in 1953.

### Get Ahead!

Saturday's game will give the Rams a chance to get ahead in the series, get ahead of the 2-2 season record, and get ahead in the Valley Conference.

Game time is 8:00 p.m. at McLane Stadium.

## HARRIERS SNARE THIRD PLACE; POLO TEAM DROPS PAIR

Fresno City College suffered its first cross country setback Saturday, taking third place in the junior college division of the Sacramento State Invitational.

The Rams battled winds and

rain along with Harriers competing in the collegiate open, junior college, and high school classes.

### Martinez Tops

Frank Martinez was the top Ram runner once again as FCC finished behind San Jose City College and City College of San Francisco.

Martinez, a frosh surprise whom Coach Erwin Ginsburg voiced confidence in before the season started, added a fifth place to a pair of early season wins.

The former Fresno High runner came in behind three San Jose aces and a COS harrier. Veteran Lyal Carlton was the next best man for the Rams with a 10th place finish.

Other scorers for Fresno were Rupert Snetzing, twelfth; Ed Cox, 26th; and Curtis Craig, 33rd.

### Duel Sequoias

The Rams will travel to College of Sequoias tomorrow in a dual meet at 4:00 PM in Mooney Grove Park. Coach Ginsburg's harriers have lost only one dual in the last two years, getting tripped by the University of California freshmen last year.

### Depth Hurts

Lack of depth again proved fatal for Franz Kools' Fresno City College water polo team, resulting in its third and fourth Valley Conference losses of the season.

The Ram water Specialists were handed defeats Friday and Saturday in games with Sacramento City College and American River on an overnight trip to Sacramento.

Norm Brooks sparked FCC to a 13-11 third quarter lead over Sacramento but the Rams took gas when they lost the service of starters, Karl Klavon, Pete Chavira, and Vern Klavon via the foul route in the fourth canto.

### Norm Tallies

Brooks had 10 goals in the 19-

16 loss and added another four in a 19-10 loss to American River Friday, sharing honors with Bill Filipini in the latter.

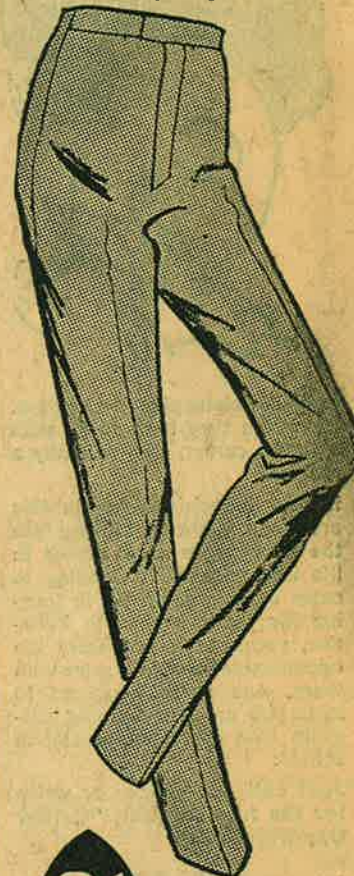
Fresno has a record of 0-4 going into today's game with College of Sequoias at the Fresno High School pool. Game time is 4 PM.

Cabrillo took advantage of a single second quarter touchdown last Saturday by holding the Fresno City College offense on several attempts to penetrate the end zone for a 6-2 win.

It was the Rams' last non-conference test before the opening of the 1962 Valley Conference season. The Valley Conference is a newly formed league including Modesto JC, American River, Sacramento City College, Stockton, and College of Sequoias.

Dismal weather kept fans away as Cabrillo scored on a dive from one yard by quarterback Tex McKeown after a 56 yard offensive move.

Fresno penetrated deep into Sea Hawk territory on two different occasions but both times a slippery football proved disaster for the Rams.

Halfback Levi Owens fumbled once on the twelve yard line and once again on the five to give Cabrillo the break it needed.

Fresno's only score came after another drive to the 27 yard line put the Sea Hawks with their backs to the wall. Cabrillo punter Bill Mathson fumbled in an attempted boot from the end zone and fell on the ball for two Ram pointers.

The loss gives Fresno a 2-2 record going into conference play.
