Fresno City College is issuing new student ID cards that are digitized. Why now? Gurdeep Sihota, Interim Director of College Activities, explained "We needed an updated system...that (previous procedure) was an older way of making cards. A lot of the colleges are updating"

Donald Curtis Caples Jr.

Funeral services for Fresno City College Rams offensive lineman Donald Caples Curtis Jr. were held Friday, January 14, 2000 at the First Galilee Missionary Baptist Church in Fresno, California. He died January 6 at the University Medical Center, in Fresno from unexplained medical complications. Friends, family and well wishers attended the services.

At 6'6", 330 pounds offensive lineman Caples was a ten game starter. His outstanding blocking helped All-American running back Maurice Morris break the State and National rushing record 1,623 yards and helped lead the Rams to a 9-2 season, culminating in a bowl game appearance in the Third Annual Kiwanis Silicon Valley Bowl Game against Foothill College 9-2. "

Caples was a good player a nice kid and were really going to miss him," Head Coach Tony

Caviglia said about Donald.

Caples a McLane high school graduate, was born in Fresno June 19, 1980. The family moved to Texas in 1984 where he began his Christian education. Growing up, he was not only active in football, but played soccer, wrestled, enjoyed swimming and basketball as a past time. He was a devoted Christian, and an excellent student with a 3.5 GPA. Caples is survived by his parents, Linda and Donald Sr., brother Russel Daryl Caples, numerous relatives, Grandmother Alicene Caples and loving friends.

A memorial fund for Donald Caples Jr. is being formed, from which funds generated will be used to buy gloves, blocking pads and sleds for the offensive linemen playing the game.

With help from the FCC family, Coach Caviglia and staff are hoping to contribute towards the Caples funeral expenses and memorial fund. Oth-

On the final drive of the game, Titan QB Steve McNair was stellar as he completed nearly every pass and rushed for several yards as well. Down to the Rams' 10-yard line with six seconds left, the Titans made a completion to hot shor rookie Kevin Dyson who ran the ball to the one yard line as he was tackled and time expired. The Rams had won the best Super Bowl in recent memory by the tip of their horns.

Magnolia out-blooms the competition

Tom Cruise's character, Frank T. J. Mackey perfectly personifies the extraordinary film, Magnolia. From the first glance, Frank is cocky and confident, strutting across a stage like a magnificent peacock showing off its plumage. Inside, however, Frank is unsure, scared and running from and trying to forget his past. These characteristics, as well as other surprising connections, are common with all the many, many characters in Magnolia.

Writer-director Paul Thomas Anderson, who also brought to the screen Hard Eight and Boogie Nights, infuses so much energy and honesty into Magnolia that it is hard not to get wrapped up in its story. With more than eight stories to tell, P. T. Anderson never has a dull moment within the threehour-plus Los Angeles epic. Like any master storyteller, Anderson knows that the

key to drawing in an audience is to get them to identify with at least one char-

P. T. Anderson moves the plot of the film from one emotionally whacked-out character to another, like a ringmaster navigating the audience's attention. He moves from a lonely cop, a hauntingly beautiful cokehead, a former child prodigy who is now a loser, a guiltfeeling gold-digger and a dying rich man to a rising child prodigy, a controlling father, a remorseful game show host, and a repressed male nurse. All these characters are perfectly portrayed by one of the finest acting ensembles to ever grace the screen.

Then, of course, there's Frank T. J. Mackey. In a role that finally allows Tom Cruise to play a character unlike any he has portrayed in the past, Cruise gets a chance to display his considerable acting chops. As a self-help guru, Cruise lights up the screen as he motiva-

tionally-speaks toward his relationship-wary male audience. In an interview during an intermission of his character's seminar, he gets to show his character slowly, but surely, breaking down as he is confronted by his past and lies. Seeing Cruise's best performance of his career alone is worth the price of admission.

The problems of the characters in Magnolia makes those of the characters in the television series Party of Five seem to be the most healthy group of people in fictional life. This isn't the happiest film ever, but the whole point of the film is that we all have problems. What we take from those obstacles is what life is all about. To say that Magnolia is about life is an understatement; it is about characters who must face their fears and learn to forgive not only themselves, but the people who have hurt them the most.

Y2K IN SPORTS FCC Rams Men's Basketball Team **Enjoying Much-Deserved Success**




