Fall Ram arrives

Senate 'joins' Johnson

Drama budget dropped

Student Senate voted unanimously this week not to consider drama's 1972-72 budget request because of a memo from drama chief Fred Johnson to ASB President Ron Gray.

The memo indicated that Johnson and other teachers in the field do not feel that drama should be funded with student body monies in as much as drama is now more of an instructional class than just a simple activity.

In fact, the memo pointed out, the FCC Faculty Senate has passed a motion urging the State Center Community College District's Board of Trustees to pick up drama's tab in 1972-73 as a test year.

Johnson asked that Senate fund drama again next year, but he also assured Senate that if by "some remote chance" the district agreed to underwrite any degree of the department's spending he would adjust his Student Senate budget accordingly.

Senate, however, went one step further by cutting drama off completely, thereby either forcing the district to deal with drama or forcing Johnson to persuade next semester's Senate to reinstate drama in its budget.

In an economy move, Senate decided to forego the traditional formal installation banquet in favor of a steak barbecue at Senate adviser Doris Deakin's home.

Senate rejected a \$400 bid from the Carousel and a \$300 bid from the new Catillo's for the June 8 ceremony, at which this and next semesters' senators and commissioners will be feted.

In other business, Senate decided to allocate \$50 from its undistributed reserves to finance the second Big Brothers Mix 'n' Match set for May 20, and called a special meeting for Thursday, May 18 to study budget requests for next semester.



Free concert shapes up

The contract has been signed, sealed and delivered for Tower of Power's performance at FCC's second free rock concert.

The concert will be held on Friday night, May 26 in the Convention Center Exhibit Hall, Tickets for the event will be available to FCC student body cardholders only beginning Monday, May 22 on a firstcome, first-served basis, as the Exhibit Hall is legally limited to 2,700 people.

Student Senate's assemblies

committee decided on Tower of Power, with a price tag of \$2,600, as the headliner of the concert after a last-minute cancellation by Curtis Mayfield last week forced the committee to change its plans in a hurry.

Tower of Power, composed of members from Fresno and Oakland, already has two-millionselling albums to its credit and has just released a third album.

The committee also approved signing the Modern Furbearing Band, a local group, for \$200

and is trying to add the Bobby Logan group to the concert.

FCC's first free concert featured Elvin Bishop at the Rainbow Ballroom about two months ago and attracted an overflow crowd.

Revised procedures for handing out tickets should make them more easily available to both day and night students and should reduce illegitimate ticket claims, according to Vice President Andy Schroeder.

The synthetic caps and gowns

may be purchased in the Bookstore for \$5,50 through June 8. Announcements are also available for 25 cents each.

icipate in the June 9 commencement exercises should report to A-112 to insure themselves a seat. Three tickets will be available to each graduate at that time.

The exercises, which will begin at 8 p.m. in the Convention Center theatre, will be followed by a reception in the lower lobby of the theatre.

Senate feasts

(ED NOTE: It seems that this week, Student Senate finally came to its senses and cancelled its expensive banquet plans. Instead, they decided on a steak barbecue that will cost about \$200 to \$300. I congratulate the senators who voted for this. However, it does not totally erase last week's near-unanimous move to add \$150 to its \$350 banquet budget, about which this editorial is written.)

One way or another, Student Senate seems bound and determined to eat well before departing for summer vacation.

Early in the semester, they budgeted \$200 for four Senate luncheons. But faced with heavy criticism from various sources, including the Rampage, the Senate wisely decided to halt the practice after the initial \$50 lunch.

Then, last week, our gracious leaders proceeded to add the unspent \$150 to the Senate's \$350 banquet budget, bringing it to \$500.

If no emergencies arise during the remainder of the semester, then I certainly don't object to the senators spending the \$150 to satisfy their surprisingly large appetites.

The money should not, as ASB President Ron Gray has stated, be "left to gather dust" in a general fund controlled by the administration.

But, since the banquet is not until June 8, would it not have been wise to wait until the Senate's final meeting to determine the fate of the money? It would seem so.

It's a shame this semester's Senate insists on devaluing their admirable list of achievements with questionable allocations.

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Scientifically sound

A team of psychiatric researchers reported recently that a two-year study has established a "scientifically sound relationship" between phases of the moon and the murder rate in the Miami, Fla. area.

Missle mission

Pentagon officials say that the Air Force is rushing to develop an air-to-air missile capable of knocking down the highflying Soviet Mig-23 jet.

"We don't like the idea of allowing the Russians a free reconnaisance ride over our units, as they have had over Israeli positions, if we can do something about it," one Pentagon officer said.

The modification and tests of the new missile should be completed in about a year at a cost of \$1.3 million, defense department sources said.

Backward beat

The blood in two-year-old Sandra La Fontsee's heart flows backward as the result of one of the rarest operations ever performed.

The Grand Rapids, Mich. girl was to leave the hospital sometime this week after she fully recovers from a five-hour operation April 21 that corrected a heart birth defect that occurs only once in every million births.

As a rsult of the surgery, her heart now works efficiently, although in reverse of the normal heart; the right side does the left side's work and vice versa.

IQ P's and Q's

IQ tests would no longer be required for sixth and 12th graders in California public schools under a new testing proposal endorsed by the Assembly Ways and Means Committee.

Under the new proposal, schools would be required to give new first graders tests intended to find out what they already know, so what they learn can be measured more fairly later, said Assemblyman Leroy Greene.

Kidney problems

According to a recent survey, nearly half of 73 families faced with the problem of finding a kidney donor did not contain an individual willing to donate his own.

Instead these families go through a long period of awkward avoidance of th issue with potential donors, who would face a small degree of risk, rarely volunteering and the dying victim of kidney disease is seldom willing to come out and ask for a donor.

4 RAMPAGE May II, 1972 Cinco de Mayo Students entertained, informed by festivities

Last week, FCC students were treated to a two-day festival celebrating Mexican Independence Day.

Cinco de Mayo (May 5) was honored on campus Thursday and Friday by MECHA and te La Raza classes and faculty, who put together a program including music, dancing, theater, food and history.

Due to the efforts of about 40 organizers and workers, more than 1,000 FCC students were

able to join in the celebration of the battle of Puebla in 1862, during which some 4,000 illequipped Mexican peasants de-feated 6,000 well - armed Frenchmen who were trying to occupy Mexico for Napoleon III, then Emperor of France.

The activities capped a week proclaimed "Semana de la Raza" by the State Legisature, the Fresno City Council, and Student Senate.

The state's proclamation said, in part, "Whereas the soldiers of Mexico through their great courage and self-sacrifice defeated an invading European army at Guadalupe Hill near the City of Puebla on the fifth day of May, 1862, be it resolved that the people of this state extended their congratulations and felicitous greetings to our Mexican-American citizens and our neighbors to the south in the Republic of Mexico on the anniversary of this battle, and convey to them our warmest expression of friendship."

The event was funded by Student Senate, which allocated \$1,500 for the festivities from its cultural affairs budget. Jose Torres and Leticia Contreras served as student co-chairmen.

"This was the best Cinco de Mayo FCC has ever had," said Torres. "The cross-section of students participating and the rapport everyone reached made the event worth much more than all the money and effort that went into it."

Vets confab creates statewide coalition

Veterans in California's colleges and universities now have a new means to deal with their problems on a wide scale--the California Collegiate Veterans Coalition.

The Coalition was created here by a two-day conference of 120 delegates representing more than 50 colleges and universities in the state.

FCC Veterans Club President Wayne Miles and Commissioner of Veterans Affairs John Purtell co-chaired the event, which was sponsored by the Vets Club and Student Senate.

The Coalition was designed to be a clearing house of information on legislation, guidance and programs relating to veterans, and to provide a vehicle for immediate and wide-spread communication among veterans.

"Because of varied interests, it was evident the first day that one veterans group could not represent all the veterans in California," said ASB President Ron Gray, who also was instrumental in bringing off the conference. Because of this, he said, the Coalition will preserve the autonomy of local groups and will steer clear of partisan, non-veterans issues. The conference, held Saturday

and Sunday in the Student Lounge featured workshops on national and state legislation, campus problems, and bureaucracy in the Veterans Administration. Student Senate last semester set aside \$1,000 for the conference, which broke even financially chiefly because the four meals served were cooked by the Vets Club on school barbecues. Another conference has been scheduled for June 23.
