## Classes Closed

## Enrollment Drops

Even though the enrollment is down over 900 students from last year, there has been a substantial increase in full time student applications for Fresno City College this year.

Most classes have been closed by the first few days of registration. It has been a common sight at the campus to see students walking from class to class in attempt to get in.

"Placing a student in a class has been difficult since both the amount of teachers and classes has been reduced due to financial cutbacks," said Allyn K. Gerard, registration officer at FCC. "After Proposition 13 passed all the schools have been tightening their belts. Now we are at the point where there are no more holes left in the belt."

An increase of \$75 in the student fees at Fresno State University has compounded enrollment pressures at FCC. Applications increased 21 percent from last year and this combined with 30 fewer instructors causing classes to fill up quickly. Many students were still looking for classes during the first week of school. Most biology, physical science, English, speech and foreign language classes were closed two weeks before new student registration even started.

The situation at FCC is better than in many other colleges. So far FCC has been able to pay its employees. Yet, some signs of a breakdown are visible. There is a shortage of custodial and maintenance personnel which causes inability to perform preventive

maintenance on the equipment used in teaching. In the long run this is going to cost much more than the apparent savings gotten from the reduced number of personnel.

## Registration Deadline

Despite full classrooms and crowded walkways, enrollment at Fresno City College is down by almost 900 students from August 1981.

The reason is the admission's office strict adherence to the August 13 registration deadline, according to Dr. I.W. Lasher, Associate Dean of Students, Admissions and Records.

"This is the first time we have had to comply with the deadline," said Lasher. "There has always been enough money to add new sections, hire additional instructors, custodians, and office help."

The main reason for the cutbacks is the lack of financial support from state and local sources, Lasher said.

In 1980, Governor Brown put a 2 percent growth lid on all community colleges. In 1981 FCC grew almost nine percent—a six percent increase in unfunded classes. Money was taken from the reserve fund which is now empty, Lasher said.

In August 1981, 13,969 students had completed registration by the deadline.

## ASB Cards Sold Despite Economy

The overall tight economical situation has not affected the sale of the Associated Student Body cards. By August 20th, the 13,695 students who were registered, purchased cards worth \$14,000—a sum that equals over 2,800 full time student memberships.

"Considering the rising cost of studying, the sale of ASB cards has been satisfactory," said Dennis Balakian, executive vice president of the Associated Student Body. ASB cards sell for \$5 for full time students and \$2 for part-time students.

"The membership fee has been same for several semesters and I do believe the price still is right," Balakian continued.

What are the benefits the card holder gets?

ASB acts as a liaison with the faculty and school administration to discuss curriculum, student life and other matters which are of interest to the students.

Student loans is one of the services provided by ASB. This fall 86 students have been accepted for loans which total up to \$4,348. The \$50 loan collects no interest and is due by the end of each semester.

Most ASB sponsored events, such as dances, concerts, lectures, movies and sports events are free for the members. ASB members are also entitled to certain scholarships.

The major drawback from previous years is that ASB members do not get a discount on parking permits anymore.

"Earlier, many students purchased ASB cards just for the parking discount," Balakian said. "Now that this service does not exist anymore, it means that the membership cards are bought because of the student activities. Therefore, the student government has even greater responsibility than before to take care of all the matters concerning City College Student Body."

The ASB card itself has been a disappointment for at least the new students who were expecting to get an impressive membership card with a photograph and proper information of the bearer. Instead they got a piece of white paper with their name and signature on it. However, Balakian is promising improvements. "Motions for a better card have been made. We are trying to get new photo-ID cards, hopefully by the next semester," he says.

## New Advisor And Editor Named

An Associated Student Body (ASB) meeting was held in the Senate Chambers on Thursday, August 19, at 1:00 p.m. In addition to internal maintenance issues and other routine business that was conducted, several guests were there to make various presentations in regard to future activities and projects.

Janice Emerzian, who represented the Handicapped Services, suggested an idea for a Handicapped Awareness Day on campus. She suggested by local handicapped artists, and handicapped simulation setups for the public. Emerzian requested co-sponsorship and funds from the ASB, which was granted. The possibility of a fund-raising was discussed, and the tentative date for Handicapped Awareness Day was set at October 20.

Another presentation concerned the installation of video games in the student lounge. Carl Kemp, an arcade technician, stated that the video games could bring in more funds and improve the general facility setup of the lounge. A private sponsor has offered to assist with the costs of installing and maintaining the games. Kemp himself requested exclusive repair rights if the idea is accepted. The ASB requested time to consider the matter before giving a definitive reply.

Various other ideas were discussed, including an ASB sponsored logo contest, a Fun-Run on campus, and the rejuvenation of the Mars Recycling Program. There were also two ASB appointments by Chairperson Shirley Squire. Ron Harris was appointed as Parliamentarian, and Karin Tengstedt was appointed President Pro Tempore.

## Students Squeezed Out of Classes

Large numbers of potential students are being turned away because classes are now closed or cancelled for the fall semester. Open access to an education at Fresno City College has become a thing of the past. Now the students and administration should do everything possible to correct this problem and reverse it.

The State Center Community College District Board of Trustees should impose the Instructional Materials fee.

Last semester students waged a successful fight against the proposed fee. The students, led by then ASB president Grant Marcus, argued the \$30 per semester fee would make FCC too expensive for minority and low-income students.

The administration wanted the fee to insure continuing the offerings of the college without reduction.

Now those cuts are reality.

According to FCC Registration Officer Allyn Gerard "a substantial number of classes have been cancelled." Gerard said 74 classes were closed by the end of July.

As of Friday, Gerard said "somewhere around 100" classes have been cancelled. He estimates 25 of these were recreational physical education classes no longer funded by the state.

Enrollment figures released by the college last week show enrollment has been declining steadily since the end of July.

On July 27 enrollment was up more than 30 percent from the same day last year. By the end of regular registration the figure had plunged to 9.31 percent less than the year before. At the end of the first week of classes enrollment was off 6.31 percent from the year before.

Gerard said the eventual enrollment should be down four to five percent from last year.

While many students are opposed to the fee there is no clear student opposition to the fee this semester.

Student trustee John Simmons said he was in favor of the fee. "We need it," said Simmons.

Last semester's student leaders are unsure if they will lead the opposition of the fee this semester. Many students who participated last semester also are unsure. Some, faced with these cuts, are now in favor of the fee.

The most important thing students can do to help insure open access is to be serious students.

Decide that your education is important and then act accordingly.

Most importantly, don't take classes and then drop them. The class you drop may be just the class another student needs to complete his schedule.

And to insure your own open access, make sure you meet all deadlines and register as early as possible.

The free ride is over. Don't take your education for granted.

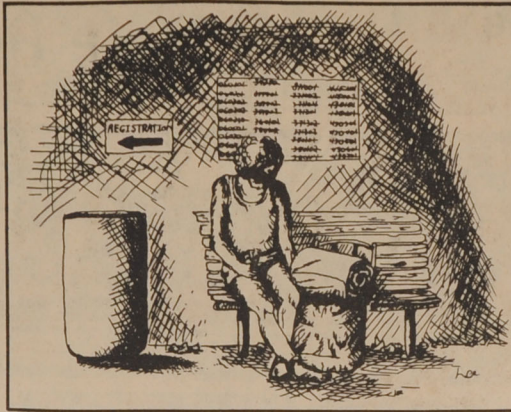
### EOP&S EMERGENCY BOOK LOANS AVAILABLE

There was no cheering crowd. There was no band. There were no pompoms and no hotdogs. There was only a hot summer afternoon of full pads and full-contact football. When the hitting started, it was the symbolic opening of the Fresno City College Ram's 1982 football season. It looks as if the Rams will have a great season. With the bad breaks behind them the Rams are hoping to better their 1981 record of 5-4-1. Some Ram fans are looking for a Central Valley Conference title. Some are even looking for an unbeaten record. And some will remind you that a Valley team won the 1980 National Championships (Modesto). Everything is looking up for the Rams. The college will gain some badly needed public recognition.

All the games will be broadcast by station KTED-FM (97.7) While some games have been broadcast in the past, this is the first full-time coverage of the entire schedule. FCC's own RamNet television will again be broadcasting the games on Fresno Cable and also plans to extend broadcasts to include Channel 53. If this team is as exciting as last year's, the fans can expect to see college football at its finest. Again leading the Ram offense is returning Sophomore quarterback Doug Gaynor. He was the CVC's most valuable player last year, leading the state in passing percentages. Gaynor completed 160 of 271

passes (59%) or 2,494 yards and 22 touchdowns. But Gaynor can do more than pass. He can scramble and run with the best of them. His teammates say he will sometimes bump with the linemen—just for fun. And other Rams can run. Huck Williams, a 6'2" 220 pound transfer from College of the Sequoias, will spearhead the running game. Largely because of Williams, COS won the CVC championship. He was the state's seventh leading rusher gaining 1,239 yards in 214 carries. He averaged 5.8 yards per carry and scored 13 touchdowns. He is a strong addition to the Rams 1982 squad. There are 22 returning lettermen and 10 All Metro first team selections highlight the incoming freshman. If you enjoy football don't miss the Ram's 1982 season.

Ram's Season Game-by-Game

Saturday, Sept. 18—at Bakersfield College—It looked like the Rams had their second win over the Renegades wrapped up after a 48-yard TD run by Don Antonetti last fall. Unfortunately, a long pass play and a questionable safety call kept the Rams snakebit in Memorial Stadium, BC winning 18-13. Renegades now lead the series 13-1-0 although the games have been closer recently. A win here could get the Rams rolling to big things. Saturday, Sept. 25—College of San Mateo—This could be a wild one. FCC has scored a total of 86 points in the past two games against the Bulldogs and lead the series between the schools 5-0. San Mateo always has a strong offensive club and finished the 1981 season with a 10-2 record. Saturday, Oct. 2—City College of San Francisco—The FCC and CCSF Rams battled to a 24-24 tie last year and if Coach Music had it to do over again he would go for the fieldgoal in the waning moments instead of trying for another pass. CCSF had a massive defensive front four last year (averaging 6-5, 250), and that's the kind of thing we can expect again. This will be the second meeting between the schools. Saturday, Oct. 9—at Monterey Peninsula College—Don't tell anyone at FCC that Division II teams are easy to beat. The Rams were behind 20-0 after only 5 minutes of last year's game but scrambled to win a shootout 42-41. The Lobos are always formidable and will have the Rams on their home turf this time. FCC leads the series between the schools 3-1. Saturday, Oct. 16—at West Hills College—The Falcons have a new head coach in Carl Ferrill and the Coalinga-based club will have a definite Texas flavor this season. One thing's for sure. Ferrill's first team can't do any worse against the Rams than last year's 52-0 shellacking. A year before the Falcons eked out a 3-0 win in Fresno. Saturday, Oct. 23—Modesto Junior College—The Pirates are still living in the shadow of the 1980 season when they won the national championship with an unbeaten record. Last year's 4-6 record was certainly no indication of how good their program has become. Music and company will certainly corroborate that fact. It took some heavy-duty Gaynor heroics to pull out a 32-28 Ram win in Modesto. Saturday, Oct. 30—at Merced College—After successive beatings in Fresno (38-13, 38-9), the past two seasons, the Blue Devils get game three in the series at Stadium '76. Don Odishoo's defenses have had no luck in stopping FCC in either game. MC's offense made just enough mistakes to stop itself. This could be a real barn burner. Saturday, Nov. 13—Kings River Community College—The Tigers have given up 48 points in each of the last two games against the Rams, both of those poundings coming in Reedley. After three straight years on the Kings River the battle for the Pump trophy shifts to Ratcliffe Stadium this fall. The Rams lead the series 25-3 and appear in good shape to make it 26-3. Saturday, Nov. 20—at College of the Sequoias—Last year's 35-19 debacle at the hands of the Giants is definitely one the Ram coaches would rather forget. COS had only one long drive on the afternoon as the Rams played giveaway. The other four Giant scores accrued a total of 23 offensive yards. FCC had lead 16-0 at halftime. With tailback Williams in the Rams' camp now, the usually high-spirited game should get a little more flavoring. Saturday, Nov. 27—Porterville College—The Rams will probably be pointing to this one. After the shattering loss to COS, FCC collapsed completely to a fired-up Pirates crew in the rain 25-19, PC's first win in 14 tries. Coach Stephen Peck enters his third season at the Pirate helm and has done a very respectable job building the team with district athletes.
