Elections

A strike is averted

Board approves contract

A strike by the Fresno City College and Kings River Community College teachers was averted when the State Center Community College District Board of trustees approved the contract during its meeting held last Tuesday, May 3.

The Board of Trustees action came just in time to avoid a strike called for by members of the State Center Federation of Teachers, who voted in favor of strike action last April 22 if the deadlocked negotiations is not resolved.

Last week the ASB Senate passed a resolution standing behind the teachers' demands. At the same time, the resolution, called on both parties to settle the issue without resorting to a strike.

The negotiations between the SCCCD Board of Trustees and the teachers union had been going on for more than 12 months.

Among the teachers demands were salary increases, improvement of retiree insurance coverage, increase in the number of sabbatical leaves and other fringe benefits.

The contract agreement as approved provided for a five percent salary increase, retroactive to April 1, for most teachers. The wage increase will be reflected in the salary schedule effective July 1.

The district will also increase its contribution towards health insurance premiums for members retiring after May 3, 1983 from the present \$350 to \$800 a year until the retiree reaches the age of 70. For active employees, the district will contribute a maximum of \$160.20 per month for each employee's health insurance.

Beginning in the 1984-85 school year, the district will increase the number of sabbatical leaves from eight to 12 per year, paying 50 percent salary for teachers on sabbatical for a full year and 100 percent for one semester.

However, all contract disputes have not been settled. Now that the 1982-83 contract is settled, the two sides will begin renegotiating certain points for 1983-84.

Fresno City College Associated Student Body President Pro Tempore, Steve Steuart, has been appointed to serve on the statewide California Community College Chancellor's Advisory Committee for Academic Quality.

Steuart was one of only two student members appointed to serve on the committee.

The committee serves to evaluate the state community college educational programs and degree requirements, plus review student services, and specially funded programs.

Breakfast cancelled

The Associated Student Body has cancelled the breakfast scheduled for Saturday, May 14, from 6 to 11 a.m.

"Due to the time factor of finals, we didn't feel that we could carry the project," said Associated Student Body Vice President Dennis Balakian.

To date, the project has not been rescheduled.

The committee is comprised of students, faculty members, and administrators, each sharing an equal vote in decision

Steuart will travel to meetings throughout California while serving on the academic quality committee.

Steuart sees his appointment as giving FCC greater representation on the state level.

"I'll be more or less representing FCC, being as I am from here," said Steuart.

FCC's Enabler program is also honoring Steuart for his efforts in organizing the "Handicapped Awareness Day" last October.

The event, sponsored by the Enabler program, and the ASB was held to introduce services available to handicapped students.

Other students honored by the Enabler program were Dan Betancur, Ken Forbes, Mark Riley, Refugio Montoya, and David Sepulveda.

Residents must pay fees to park

Homeowners in the vicinity of Fresno City College who desire restricted parking on their block must pay a \$60 fee for the first year.

The amount represents what it will cost the city to provide the parking service. Fees will be set annually.

In his recommendation to the Fresno City Council last week, Traffic Engineer James O. Whitmer said that in order for a street to be classified for restricted parking, each homeowner will have to pay \$5 for administration and issuance of permits, \$35 for installation of parking signs, and \$20 for enforcement.

Last March, residents around FCC petitioned the City Council to classify the streets in the area of restricted parking. Property owners were upset about vehicle overcrowding and their inability to park their own cars near their homes.

Students of FCC had protested the move due to inadequate campus parking facilities. The students contend that FCC sells 7000 permits when the parking lots have only 2.500 spaces.

2,500 spaces.

"Homeowners have private driveways for their vehicles. Public streets should be open to the public," the students argued.

But the homeowners prevailed and the City Council passed the measure allowing streets around FCC to be classified for restricted parking provided that three-fourths of the residents on the block agree to pay the necessary parking permits

Whitmer assured the city council that his staff will canvas the neighborhood to ensure that 75 per cent of the homeowners approve of restricted parking on their block before any fees are collected or parking permits issued.


Equipment awarded

Student project ready

The house that FCC built

Carpentry instructor Ken Walls and his class have been building a two story house for the last two semesters. The completion date has been set for May 25.

According to Walls, this house equals any custom built home and is of much higher quality than most tract or economy homes.

The house is located on the corner of Sierra and Villa in Clovis.
"This is an excellent area for

the house because it's not an urban atmosphere. There is still space," commented Walls.

The front of the house is cedar siding while the sides and back are of stucco.

This two story house covers 2,074 square feet. There is a two door, three car garage with electrical doors, with the doors set up by the electrical wiring class.

The front lawn is not landscaped and according to Walls will be the responsibility of the

The front room has a large window facing the street, as well as a red brick chimney.

The family room and the den are not divided. Carpeting throughout the house will be brown plush, except for the kitchen and three bathrooms, which are covered in vinyl.

The kitchen cabinets are built by the mill cabinet class and will be of oak wood.

There is one bathroom house. downstairs and two upstairs. The master bedroom, which is upstairs, has its own bathroom while the other is in the hall.

There are three bedrooms upstairs and one downstairs.

The downstairs room can be used as an office," said

The staircase and other wooden parts of the house will be made from oak wood. "I often exceed the (building) requirements because I want the students to learn how to build a high quality house," said

Students in the carpentry, electrical wiring, mill cabinet, air conditioning, sheet and metal classes all contributed their skills in building this

By June 28, the house will be up for public auction. The minimum bid will be \$92,000.

Last year's house was sold for \$57,500 but it was only a 1,700 square feet one story

'Last year's house was a typical tract house and the location wasn't as good as this year's," said Walls.

Next year's house will also be built in Clovis on Willow and

Low student turnout and poor weather affected the debates held last week by candidates for the Associated Student Body Senate.

ASB elections were held May 10-11.

A strong MEChA slate led by Larry "Bear" Rivera, Pat Andrews and Mark Knipper criticized the current ASB for not bringing the major issues of the campus to the students.

"The only way you can generate any student power on this campus is to promote the issues in time for the students to act on them," said Rivera.

"A few individuals shouldn't decide what happens on this campus. The ASB should inform the other organizations about what is going on," said

Knipper, who earlier in the year resigned from the senate, said, "The reason I chose to work with MEChA and not the ASB is because the ASB doesn't get anything done.

Duncan Scott, who was running without an affiliation, said "I haven't heard of anything from the ASB in the year and a half that I've been here (at FCC)."

Current ASB President David Pinuelas said "The issues have always been brought to the students. Many of the senators belong to different factions and organizations and

information is disseminated in that way.

President Pro Tempore, Steve Steuart said, "there is a definite communication gap between the students at large and the student senate.'

"We've been fighting student apathy for so long that we became a little fatigued," said senator Dan Betancur.

Commissioner Elections Kelvin Ashford said the weather and poor turnouts during the debates will not affect the elections.

"Many of the candidates took it upon themselves to advertise," said Ashford.

"Also the new rule that

allows voting without an ASB card will bring more students to the polls."

Chancellor is ill Inside

April 8

State Center Community College District Chancellor Ray Cattani collapsed at a meeting April 1 in Los Angeles. After being hospitalized in Inglewood, he was flown to U.C. Moffitt Hospital in San Francisco, where a tumor was found and removed from the right temporal area. Cattani withstood the operation well. Kenneth Wheeler, Vice Chancellor for Business was named interim chancellor in

Cattani's absence.



An artist who paints by mouth

Clayton Turner has struggled for 34 years to reproduce the beauty of western art as he perceives it.

Not once during those 34 years has he held a pen or paint-brush in his hand.

Turner, 47, was paralyzed from the neck down when he was 14 years old. He is a handicapped artist, grasping the pen or brush in his mouth.

During his artistic career he has had drawings exhibited throughout the United States and Lichtenstein, his artwork having been recognized as being some of the most painstaking and authentic Western art material done in modern times.

For Turner, the metamorphosis from dependence to self-reliability was not easy. "I can remember... how tremendously pleased I was in just finally being able to write my name," he says, in recalling the struggle. "I had no help; I did it myself." As his writing ability slowly grew, he would write letters to relatives, and gradually, the attempts at artwork started.

His path to success was often punctuated by bitter mistakes. I had drawn a beautiful, large saguaro cactus, but had not put in any sort of background," he recalls. When he later attempted to draw in the background, the drawing was ruined.

However, the disappointments did not stop Turner, and he went on to develop a distinctive and compelling style of work that can be seen, among many other places, at his rustic Western style farmhouse-gallery near Fresno.

The gallery reflects his love of the West. Cactus plants are visible in the front and back walkways. A covered wagon is in the back awaiting restoration. There are wagon wheels nestled in the grass. The many antique chairs, chests, tables and lamps that are inside complete the setting and blend with the many paintings and drawings on the walls.

Turner is also an accomplished short story author. His work has been published in the Arizona Quarterly, a publication put out by the University of Arizona. He is currently seeking a publisher to compile an anthology of his stories, accompanied by his own illustrations.

He can look up at the walls of his gallery and see a progression through the years. "Some of the first things I did, when I look at them now, would need so much improvement," he says. It can even be seen in his first triumph: writing his name. The clear, broad, elegant strokes that make up his signature now are a world apart from the first attempts. "If you put a pencil in your mouth and tried to write for the first time your efforts would be the same as mine were," and he proceeds to demonstrate, first the finished name, and then an illegible bunch of scrawling. He has admittedly come far.

"Every artist's work reflects a growth pattern. It is part of the struggle."

The years of hard work have made. Turner ever aware of the problems and needs of other disabled artists and other handicapped people. "I want to continue being a representative of disabled people."
