New school year begins with old traditions

"Getting back to the old traditions" could be the motto of the 1984-1985 Associated Student Body Senate.

The Senate has plans to bring back some of the old activities and events. According to Denise Bartlett, ASB president, the ASB will once again hold the Ramburger Round-up. The Round-up was not held last year because of scheduling problems.

This year the Round-up, which was originally held in the fall, will return to the fall and the name has been changed to the Ram Round-

"We are going to combine it with Homecoming, and make it a two-day celebra-tion," said Bartlett.

The Round-up will have the traditional events, such as, organization floats, Homecoming Queen and court, plus a dance. Also included during the Roundup will be the First Annual FCC Turtle Road Race.

Another tradition that has been revived this year is the ASB Photo Identification Card.

"In 1977-78 we had photo ID's but the idea got lost somewhere. Now we've returned to the old card," explained Bartlett.

The cards cost \$5.00 and permits the buyer/holder to attend FCC events, sporting and non-sporting, free. Also the holder is entitled to the use of the Student Center.

Among the ASB's improvements for this year is the Student Center.

We have new video and table-top games, we painted the walls and refurbished the floors," said Bartlett. She added, "It really looks much better, we even have vending machines.'

The ASB will once again show "first-rate films" in the Center, a series that started last fall and received great acclaim.

The movies will cost 50 cents to non-member students and will be free to the approximately 2,750 cardholding members.

According to David Pinuelas, legislative vice-president, the ASB has more members than ever before.

"We are still looking for two or three senators," said Bartlett.

A student can only be a senator if he/she can satisfy four requirements. The student must have an ASB card, must be able to attend the 1 p.m. Thursday meetings, must be enrolled in at least four units and must maintain a 2.0 grade point average.

"Freshmen and sophomores are equally welcome to become senators, it's a good chance to develop leadership qualities, and to become involved in school politics," added Bartlett.

Applications can be obtained at the ASB office, second floor of the Student Center building and must be submitted by September 20.

Why Ratcliffe didn't rock & roll in '84

As a result of construction projects to expand the track inside Ratcliffe Stadium, a series of summer concerts designed to raise money to renovate the stadium has been delayed until next summer.

What was to be a 45-day contract, beginning July 1, to expand the stadium's track from seven to nine lanes turned into a summer-

long project. Darryl Toews, contractor of Asphalt Specialties, said the reason the project took longer than expected was because the job was done in phases. Portions of the work were completed at different times so the construction could be arranged around any concert that happened to be scheduled at the sta-

dium, according to Toews.

A contributing factor leading to the lack of concerts this summer was the State Center Community College Board of Trustees decision in April approving concerts at Ratcliffe, according to Richard Cleland, college business manager.

"Most of the major tour-ing groups put their schedules together in January, February and March," Cleland re-called. "By the time the board (of trustees) gave its approval, most of the groups

had put their touring schedules together."

Country performers Willie Nelson and Alabama made inquiries about using the stadium but had to be turned down because the dates they wanted to play interfered with construction.

"At the time they (Nelson and Alabama) wanted to come (to Ratcliffe) a contract had already been awarded to begin construc-tion," said Cleland. Cleland also stated that

based on the success of the concerts held at the stadium last year, Rally for Ratcliffe lost approximately \$100,000 because of the construction. Rally for Ratcliffe is a fundraiser designed to raise money to renovate the stadium.

"Based on what we did last year we could have made about \$100,000 from three successful concerts," said Cleland.

Dr. Clyde McCully, president of Fresno City College, said Rally for Ratcliffe would have "to delay any receipts from concerts until the next concert season."

"We had hopes of scheduling two to three events at the end of the summer but the work had been delayed,' said McCully, "It is not possible to schedule large scale concerts in the facility while construction is going on.

Aid offered to help pay enrollment fee

Beginning fall semester of 1984, a first ever enrollment fee was imposed on the California Community College System of \$50.00 for students enrolling in six or

In response to the students who would be denied access to education on the Community College level due to the imposition of the fee, the California Community colleges Board Financial Assistance Program established three programs to assist students in paying or waiving the fee.

In all three programs, the

student must be a resident of California, and must be able to prove financial need through the application process.

According to James Johnson, in the Financial Aid office, many students were assisted this semester through the programs. As of Sept. 5. 2,586 individuals for a total of \$121,175.00 in fee waivers and deferrments were given for the fall semester of

"Surely this at least allowed students who would have been unable to register during their original registration time to register on

FCC celebrates its Diamond Jubilee.

In 1910, something happened in Fresno that would change the California educational system. Fresno City College, California's very first community college, was established.

This fall Fresno City College will begin a year-long celebration of its 75th year of service to the Central

Throughout the academic year the college plans to host a series of special events to mark the 75th Diamond Iubilee Anniversary.

Fresno City College started with three instructors and 20 students. The college now enrolls almost 15,000 students on its 103-acre campus

The college offers 90 associate in arts or science degree programs, and transfer majors for students planning to attend four-year colleges and universities. The college also offers "certificate of achievement" programs for specialized vocational training.

Most Fresnans are familiar with the college's campus,

located on East University Avenue, near the corner of McKinley and North Van Ness. In 1910 the original Fresno City College, then called Fresno Junior College, was established at the site of the old Fresno High School on "O" Street in downtown Fresno.

Later, Fresno City College shared the campus and faculty of Fresno Normal School, which became California State University, Fresno. In 1948 Fresno City College returned to the original "O" Street campus, which it shared with Fresno Technical High School. By 1950 the Technical High School had been phased out, and Fresno City College began looking for a larger and more adequate site.

In 1956 Fresno City College purchased the old University Avenue campus of CSUF. Since then the college campus had been completely revitalized with the addition of 17 new buildings, including a new science and engineering facility, the college theatre, business buildings, and six technical and industrial buildings.

FCC now enjoys one of the most up-to-date compuses in the state.

The campus still retains some of its older buildings. Most notable is the college's old Romanesque library. The 51-year-old library features an ornate reference room with a 35-foot high heavily-timbered ceiling, brass chandeliers, and elaborate terra cotta decorations.

The building's historic architecture belies many of the improvements added to the library, including a full-production television studio, a tutorial center, computer instruction, typesetting and graphics services, and the Learning Center. The Learning Center boasts 95 student stations equipped with cassette tape decks, synchronized slide projectors, record and videotape players, and microcomputers.

On Saturday, May 4, the college will host a major open house, which will feature tours and exhibits in the various campus divisions.

Ram athletic department trusts its future in Luck

On July 20, the Fresno City College administration believes it hit a stroke of "Luck" for the schools ath-

letic program.

It was on this date that FCC President Clyde C. McCully received a signed contract from Dr. Emery F. Luck of Elgin (Ill.) Com-College, thus munity making Luck the new Ram athletic director.

Luck was officially offered the position by McCully and the school's board of education on July 10. Luck replaced Hans Wiedenhoefer, who retired at the end of the spring semester.

The 57-year-old Luck comes to FCC with a vast amount of experience and success. His past performance sheet reads impressively.

Luck was a player-coach on the western team of the world famous Harlem Globetrotters from 1950-58. As head coach of the University of Illinois fencing team, he guided his squad to a Big Ten conference championship. Last year at Elgin CC, with Luck as the director of women's athletics, the

school's female athletic teams pulled off a hat trick, taking league championships in volleyball, basketball and softball. Luck managed the triumphant softball

In 1970, Luck was hired as the assistant basketball coach at Northern Illinois in DeKalb. Three years later, when coach Tom Jurgenson retired, Luck was named head coach.

Unfortunately for Luck, at the same time NIU named him head basketball coach, the school officials decided they wanted to go, in Luck's words, "Big Time Football". NIU's decision to go "Big Time Football", a status NIU has never obtained (the school is on the verge of being kicked out of the Mid-American conference), resulted in a tremendous cut in recruiting budget for basketball.

This and other problems caused by NIU's singular concern for football prompted Luck to leave the school after three seasons. His team's records were 8-17 (1973-74), 8-15 (1974-75) and 5-21 (1975-76).


After leaving NIU, Luck went into the housing business. But after the bottom fell through there, Luck went to Elgin.

Besides being the womens athletic director (1981-83) and softball coach (1980-83), Luck's past duties at Elgin included being director of operations last season, golf coach (1980-83) and assistant basketball coach (1980-84).

Along with his athletic director duties at FCC, Luck is also teaching two physical education classes, racketball and body building. If FCC has a golf team this spring, Luck will coach that squad.

Attendance at Ram sporting events, and better planning when it comes to supplying out-of-state and out-of-district athletes with financial aid, are the first two things Luck would like to improve at FCC.

Luck said he hasn't set any goals for himself in his initial year as athletic director at FCC. "Right now I just want to get my feet on the ground and see what's going on around me," said Luck. "After I find out just where our program is, then next year I can sit down and say I'd like

Coach Bill Musick begins his sixth season as the Ram's head coach, and his team faces a very tough test tonight. FCC has never won at Memorial Stadium and the only victory in the 15-game series which dates back to 1952, was a 31-27 thriller in the rain at Ratcliffe Stadium in 1976.

Plagued by eight turnovers, the Rams lost a tough 17-13 decision last year at Memorial Stadium. The last turnover, a fumble with 1:16 to play and the Rams on the Renegades 23-yard line, was a heartbreaker.

time," said Johnson.

There are three ways to gain assistance through the programs; a fee waiver, fee credit, or a Board of Governors grant.


One of the programs, the fee waiver is available to students who are receiving Social Security benefits, or Aid to Families with Deper dent Children. The fee cre lit is available to students who meet certain income levels, and are enrolling in fewer than six units. The Board of Governors grant is available to students who enroll in six or more units who have also applied for a Pell Grant and have filed a Student Aid Application form for California.

Even with these efforts to assist students in the enrollment process, enrollment figures for Fresno City College are down by about 5.6 percent for this year. These figures are important because it is by the Average Daily Attendance (ADA) the funding bases for FCC are tallied on the state level.

Dr. Clyde McCully, FOC president, said the Fresno campus' enrollment this fall is 13,576 students, down from 14,382 last fall. This is 806 fewer students, as of the second week of instruction.

Dr. McCully noted that while enrollment is down slightly, students are taking a somewhat higher load of class units. He said that recently initiated plan for short-term classes this fall should help the college make up its enrollment deficit.


