Class space is a problem for students

At least one Fresno City College instructor is troubled by the fact that he and other mathematics teachers have had to turn away students from classes.

The unavailability of seats is occurring during a time when the college is fighting for students—enough to spend \$50,000 for television and other promotional messages to encourage enrollment.

Math instructor Loren Gaither said he had to refuse more than 50 students permission to take his math courses because the classes were full.

"Every math teacher on this campus has had to turn students away from at least some of their classes," said Gaither.

Having to turn students away from classes and seeing the large sum of money spent to bolster student enrollment, Gaither was prompted to write

a letter to the **Fresno Bee** expressing his frustration.

In the letter Gaither said he felt part of the money used to recruit students could have been used to hire additional

instructors.

"I don't see anything wrong with it (recruiting students)," said Gaither. "Provided when we recruit them we don't have to tell them there is no room for

them."

The market for daytime math instructors has been "exhausted," said Dr. Arthur Ellish, dean of instruction.

Ellish said if the college

wanted to employ additional math instructors it would be on a part-time basis and for evening classes.

"There are well qualified math instructors in our community interested in teaching mathematics at FCC," said Ellish, "but only in the evenings."

Ellish said there are several factors contributing to the demand for additional math courses, as well as English courses.

"Both English and math have increased because they have become prerequisites to

Instructor assaulted

An on-campus assault of a Fresno City College instructor ended with the arrest of a non-enrolled woman last week.

Dr. Le Grand Anderson, music department instructor, was involved in class instruction when he requested a woman to leave his classroom. She refused, shoved him and verbally abused him.

According to Anderson, he called the Associate Dean of Students, Robert Fox, who had summoned the FCC campus police to remove her from his classroom. The woman was ordered to leave the campus until she was legally enrolled as an FCC student.

Within an hour, the female had returned. An officer asked her why she was so insistent on harrasing Anderson, she said that she had music abilities that only Anderson could bring out. Again, she was ordered to leave and to not return.

FCC Police Chief Ken Shrum said that the woman was found on campus a third time. She was stopped and held for arrest on charges of battery and disturbing the peace.

This is not an individual case. Many FCC instructors have relayed to Anderson examples of similar experiences.

"A teacher feels he has an

Pay hike ratified by CSEA

A four per cent pay hike for all classified State Center Community College District employees has been ratified by union members.

In addition to the pay increase, which was approved Sept. 12, \$25,000 was apportioned for salary adjustments.

"We were disappointed," said Lawrence Lemieux, president of the local chapter of the California School Employees Association (chapter 379) which represents nearly 300 workers in the district. "The adjustment was better than nothing. It will probably allow us to adjust salaries for about 20 employees."

Though Lemieux stated that the increase was significantly lower than the workers had hoped for, it was probably the best the district could offer.

"With the financial situation of the district," Lemieux explained, "you could have sat there forever waiting for more. The district just didn't have more to give."

Lemieux thinks all of the classified employees of the district are drastically underpaid when compared to other institutions, such as the Fresno Unified School District or Fresno County employees.

"It's just the district's inability to get more money from the state," exclaimed Lemieux, "Until Dukemajian sees fit to increase funding to community colleges we can't expect more."

According to Lemieux, the governor doesn't seem to place much importance on California's community colleges. "He pours money into K-12 schools and into our universities, but

Planning is key to improvement

A program to evaluate the State Center Community College District and make recommendations of its betterment has been established by District Chancellor Bill Stewart.

The program is designed to get employees and students to look at the district in relation to the community to see how it is, or can, meet its needs.

"I like to refer to it as a blue print for success," said Dr. Stewart, "We are going to look at the schools and develop a five-year master plan to improve them."

"It's a means of helping the district get it's act together," explained Max Tadlock, a consultant to the district. Tadlock has organized similar strategic planning programs and has worked with Dr. Stewart at each of his previous colleges.

Tadlock stated, "Our goal is to find out where the district is, what it's doing, why it's doing it, and whether that's what this specific community needs at this time."

The program will also look at the district's resources to see what money, space, and human resources are available to establish the district's potential for improvement.

"Everything is done with an

enormous amount of participation from local folks," Tadlock explained. "It's not going to be a bunch of outsiders coming in and telling the SCCCD what to do, but rather local people researching their own needs."

Tadlock doesn't foresee a major revamping of the district. "Both of these colleges (Fresno City College and Kings River Community College) have good reputations with long standing traditions of excellence," Tadlock claimed.

He went on to say, "The real question is how to keep up with the different changes around us. How do we keep in balance with the rest of the world?"

Eight committees are to be established to do the research. In the areas of educational program and instruction, student services and development, community-campus relation, staffing and development, financial resource development and facilities, marketing, quality of life, and trends and demography.

Tadlock contended that the program would give the direction needed for the SCCCD to reach the level of excellence many feel it can. "If you don't know where you're going it doesn't matter what road you take. Once you know where you want to go you can pick the correct road and accomplish anything," concluded Tadlock.



the community colleges seem (like) nothing to him."

Lemieux sees this as a serious problem for community colleges and urged everyone connected with the college to write their representatives and the governor urging them to increase funding for community colleges.

"It has been estimated that

every letter that reaches Sacramento represents about 500 voters who are upset," said Lemieux. "If everyone wrote Sacramento, our legislators would see that something's wrong with their policies."

Lemieux concluded that the union was going to keep a watchful eye on the state budget and hope to gain necessary 10

to 12 per cent pay increase to put district employees on the same level as their counterparts from other institutions.

ASB Pep Rally



Valley Scots bring Highland heritage alive

With a little imagination and a lot of Scottish tradition, a small corner of Eastern Madera County became the Scottish highlands Saturday.

Called the eighth annual Fresno Highland Gathering and Games, this gala was hosted by the Scottish Society of Central California. The group has put on the event for the last three years.

Set against the lush surroundings of the Coombs Ranch alongside the lazy San Joaquin

River, more than 3,000 visitors and competitors danced, sang, drank and enjoyed a beautiful day filled with folklore from Scotland.

On hand for this event were 46 clans, or family organizations. Representatives from all national clans were at the gathering, visiting and competing against each other. Included in the day's games were some traditional Scottish events that are very uncommon to the American sports fan.

Highland athletes don't play ball sports. They throw telephone poles!

That event, called the caber toss, involves seeing how far one can throw a very heavy pole about a third as long as a telephone pole.

Another event is the weight throw for height. In this rather unusual game, the object is to throw a 28 pound, or 56 pound, weight with handle attached, over a pole-vaulting bar!

If these events sound like something not meant for the timid, they are not. Bob Berg, chieftain of this Gathering and Games confirms that highland

athletes are indeed not lightweights.

"These games started when the clans long ago wanted to see who had the toughest men," explained Berg.

The honorary Gathering and Games Chieftian, Hugh Moore, summed up the happenings of the day in his opening speech.

"We Americans of Scottish descent retain an overpowering affection for our homeland far greater than descendants from any other country," said Moore. "This affection has stimulated development in the United States of many new organizations devoted to our Scottish heritage. There are more than 125 of these games around the country each year."

Ram football ready for winning season in '85

The Ram football jinx against Bakersfield continued last week as the Rams were beaten 24 to 17 last Saturday night in Bakersfield.

"We've never beaten Bakersfield in Bakersfield," said Head Coach Bill Musick. "The only time we have ever beaten them was in 1977 in Fresno."

In spite of the loss, Musick is eagerly looking forward to the remainder of the season.

Part of this optimism has to be due to a tough defensive unit. In a recent scrimmage with San Francisco City College the Rams held the offense for 14 plays without a first down.

"I feel it should be a very good defense. I've got a lot of talent and a lot of veteran players," said Musick. "They looked very good against San Francisco; they seemed to be good at reading (the offense)."

Spearheading the defense on the line are returnees Joe Autry (6'2", 245 pounds) and Orlando Leavell (6'3", 227 pounds). Also starting will be freshman Andrew Steward (6'6", 235 pounds) from New York and sophomore Sio Paulo, (6'1", 275 pounds) a transfer from Mira Costa.

The linebacking chores will be handled by Paul Johnson (6', 190 pounds) and Gordon Hill (6', 205 pounds) on the outside, and Alan Juniper (6', 225 pounds) and Louis Jones (6', 215 pounds) handling the inside duties.

Tyronne Simpson (6'2", 210 pounds), who ran the 40 yard

dash in 4.5, will be on one corner, and Richard Fain (5'11", 173 pounds) from Edison High on the other. The free safety will be Bill Costa (6'4", 180 pounds) from Fresno High.

The offense will be without Roby Santos, last year's starting quarterback, who opted for a four year school. But Musick is very pleased with the performance of his new quarterback, Maurice Egan.

"Maurice is coming along very well. He has just as good of an arm, but is more mobile than Santos. He has a good attitude, is a hardworker and a quick learner," Musick said.

Joining Egan in the backfield will be tailback Fred Coleman from Dos Palos and either James Young or Devin Christensen at fullback. The wide receivers will be John Coffee (a former Valley high hurdle champion) and Eric Carr (a triple jumper for the FCC track team).

Kent Nash, a 6'5", 230 pound sophomore from Madera, will be starting at tight end.

The offensive line contains four sophomores: Dale Phelin (6'11", 235 pounds) and Pea Hill (6'3", 270 pounds) at the tackles, and Quin Bowman (5'8", 247 pounds) and Mike Francis (6'5", 265 pounds) playing guard. Freshman Kevin Bernell (6'4", 235 pounds) is at center.

The place kicking will be handled by Jim Kirk, formerly of Clovis West, and the punter will be either Kent Nash or freshman Alex English.

Depth in positions is a plus for team

The Fresno City College soccer team is looking forward to a successful season this year after a series of close losses last year placed them in a disappointing fourth place in their conference.

"We have much more depth in the terms of quality replacements than we have had since 1978," said coach Bill Neal. In 1978, the Rams finished first in their conference. The team will need that depth as they face a tough league schedule.

"I think our conference (the Coast Conference) is much tougher than the Golden Gate or North Coast (conferences)," said Neal.

The teams strikers will be lead by freshman Michael

Helms at center forward, with Francisco Lopez and Deron Thompson filling the other forward positions.

Playing at mid-field will be Mitz Motoyoshi in the center with Tony Garcia on the left and Richard Parsons on the right. The defense will have Thomas Stallworth at stopper, Edward Manes and Emilio Vargas on the right and Ed Munguia on the left. Andy Doris, the team captain, will be at sweeper and Brad Thompson will play in the goal.

Returnees from last year's squad include Luis Martinez, Sigifredo Mendoza, Robert McGough and Jose Velesco.

Rounding out the squad are Hector Lara, Alvaro Vasquez, Sengaroun Salinthon, Ramon Navarro, Joe Lechner, Frank Castro, Robert Van Binsbergen and Dale Lakin.

In the first test of the young season, FCC finished fourth overall and first in the consolation bracket in a tournament at Consumnes River College in Sacramento.

In their first match they played Consumnes River to a tie, and lost in the overtime on a tie-breaker consisting of an exchange of penalty kicks.

They went on to defeat Ohlone College of Fremont by a 3-2 margin, then they outdefensed Mission College of Santa Clara 2-1.

"I feel we played excellently in the tournament," said Neal. "We had six players go down to injuries in the first game, but our quality of replacements enabled us to play well anyway. Sam Sallithone, Luis Martinez and Sigriedo Mendoza really came through in the clutch for us."

many other courses," explained Ellish.

He added that students are also taking more math and English courses because they are "more willing to address their own weaknesses."

Students are realizing they will be better off in the future if they take these courses, Ellish said.


One proposed solution to the demand of over subscribed classes is to have instructors shift their class loads starting next spring, Ellish said.

An example of shifting class loads would be to have an instructor who teaches four physics classes and one algebra class, teach three physics classes and two algebra classes. Ellish said there may not be a demand

for the fourth physics class and the instructor would be filling additional seats by teaching a second algebra class.

In the area of math, Ellish said the demand for expansion is in remedial math courses.

"We have instructors who aren't particularly keen on

teaching remedial courses," said Ellish. "Sometimes it is not as easy to teach remedial courses."

Gaither added that it takes a dedicated instructor to agree to teach a remedial course. According to Gaither it takes a lot of additional time and effort to teach such courses.

"One would have to be a missionary at heart," explained Gaither. "It takes a special kind of teacher to be successful in that area. A person with a master's degree (in math) would be more interested in teaching calculus."

Gaither added, "A lot of instructors feel that teaching remedial classes is not part of the instruction of the campus."

Some instructors feel students should attend an adult school to get that type of education, Gaither said.

In Anderson's case, he has been harassed by this same woman for a year by telephone calls and appearances at his office and home.

"I am concerned for myself, as well as for my family," said Anderson.

He described her as a student who is "unable to respond to instruction" by him or any instructor.

Anderson, who recognizes himself as one who is capable of strict discipline, does not know how to handle this unfortunate situation.
