Deukmejian Comes to Fresno Honors hay giveaway program

Governor George Deukmejian came to Fresno this past Monday for a public speaking engagement and a \$250.00 a plate fundraiser.

The speaking engagement was the "Hay Fresno, I Cared A Ton" send off. Private citizens donated over 400 tons of hay to be sent to the farmers of drought and flood-stricken North Carolina.

Fresno City Councilmember Rod Anaforian was the driving force behind the 'Hay Fresno' campaign, and told an audience composed largely of individuals who doanted time and hay for this project, "Fresno is the agricultural capital of the California and when there are people in need

even 2,000 miles to the east the people of Fresno respond. I am proud to be a Californian, but even more proud to be a Fresnan."

The Governor then spoke, telling the audience how proud he was of "the people in the greater Fresno area. . . to assist people in other parts of the country in this act of human kindness."

After his speech the governor was presented with a t-shirt (which said "Hay Fresno, I Cared A Ton") by a fifth grader at Erickson Elementary, April Homes.

Monday evening the Governor held a press conference with Retired Air Force Brigadier General Chuck Yeager, the first human to break the sound barrier.

Last Semester-Z's Now it's VW Bugs

Following last semester's theft pattern of six Datsun Z's within a few months, several Volkswagen cars have been broken into on campus within the last month. The thefts are occurring on the Fresno State University campus as well.

Auto stereo equipment is being stolen by entering an unlocked vehicle or by breaking in through the windwing of the Volkswagens.

The campus police have contacted a possible suspect in

these cases.

"I think most of the Volkswagen burglaries are being committed by [this suspect]," commented Campus Police Chief Kenneth Shrumm. "He is specialized in Volkswagens."

The suspect in question was found loitering around a Volkswagen with a broken windwing on campus. He also had radio equipment in his possession that may be identified by victims in these cases.

If the results of lab reports match fingerprints and tool marks from these cases, an arrest can be made.

Governor, Aquino Campus visit cancelled—security?

Governor George Deukmejian and Phillipine President Corazon Aquino were scheduled to appear at Fresno City College Monday but allegedly cancelled their appearance due to lack of security, Associated Student Body President Susan Krikorian was told.

According to Krikorian, the Associated Student Body was sponsoring Deukmejian's visit. The visit was arranged by Ida Parrott. Parrott later telephoned Krikorian to explain why the governor had cancelled. "I spoke with Ida Parrott," Krikorian said, "she told me that unfortunately the governor would not be

here September 15 due to the fact that he would be traveling with Corzaon Aquino and they were concerned about security."

It was later determined by Deukmejian's campaign headquarters in Sacramento that Ida Parrott is a Sanger High School employee that wrote a letter requesting Deukmejian's appearance on September 22 for College Night. Parrott could not be located for comment Tuesday.

"The governor was never invited to Fresno City College on the fifteenth of September," said Kathleen Campini, an official at Deukmejian's campaign headquarters in Sacramento. The governor was invited to attend College

Night on September 22, according to Campini, but declined because of a prior commitment. Campini said that the governor offered to send representatives to College Night, but officials at Fresno City College declined the offer.

According to Campini, Ida Parrott has no connection with the governor's campaign or his schedule.

Although the governor did meet briefly with Phillipine President Corazon Aquino when she arrived in San Francisco Monday, Campini said that Aquino did not have plans to travel with Governor Deukmejian on his campaign swing through Fresno later that day.

US-Soviet Standoff --who'll blink first?

The decision of the Soviet Union to arrest and charge Nick Daniloff with espionage in retaliation for the arrest of Gennadi Zakarhov was an ominous one. It means an escalation of tensions just before the planning phase of a possible summit this year.

Zakarhov was attached to the Soviet mission to the United Nations. But because he wasn't a diplomat, he lacks diplomatic immunity and was arrested for spying.

Now the situation is at a standoff-the Soviets won't allow the American to leave Moscow and we sure aren't going to let Zakarhov go. So now what do we do? Even though the world seems to realize that Daniloff was framed, the Kremlin will not recognize him as anything but a spy.

Here's the deal: someone in the Kremlin overreacted. They siezed an American citizen without thinking, considering the consequences. The person/people in charge failed to realize that the US has no choice but to be strong in this matter. Now they have to be strong too, or else lose face.

So there is a stalemate. In the end, the United States will probably have to back away from the hardline position and go for the even swap. If not, then we may lose an American citizen to a Soviet prison. Unless the Soviets back down, either by releasing Daniloff or by finding him not guilty. The latter isn't very likely.

Overselling Of Parking Up From Last Semester

The business office has sold nearly three times as many parking permits as there are parking spaces on campus this semester.

According to Blair Terry, who works in the business office, 7,362 parking permits have been sold to students since August 18. There are approximately 2,500 parking

stalls on campus.

Apparently the situation has deteriorated since last semester. At that time, the business office had sold 6,542 parking permits.

The business office claims that the over-sale of permits compensates for the high drop-out rate.

New Foster Parenting Class begins

A new class will be offered by Fresno City College through the Foster Parents Training Program beginning October 7.

The four-week, Tuesday night class will be a part of the Continuing Education services and will include two Saturday workshops. Although the course is designed for people already in the foster parents program and potential foster parents, it is available to other students such as child development majors, nursing students and others who work with families and children.

According to Robert Arroyo, Director of the Office of Community Services and Continuing Education, "The idea is to train foster parents in arious aspects of the role that they've assumed."

The program is voluntary

to foster parents.

"The purpose of the program is to help cope with the large variety of situations including problems that confront parents everyday," said Arroyo.

The program is funded by a grant from the California Community College Chancellor's Office through a program in the state budget, and is in it's second year.

Last year's program included eight Saturday seminars with featured speakers and panelists.

This year the teaching will be done by the staff of the Family Communications Center.

"It's been a much needed program, and it seems to have been institutionalized by the state budget," said Arroyo.

The state budget allows one million dollars for the program that involves 55 community colleges offering the classes.

I remember back in the Summer of 1979 when I went to the show to see "Alien" with my friend Barry Robertson. Directed by Ripley Scott, "Alien" didn't scare me, it unnerved me. It ended with Flight Officer Ripley (Sigourney Weaver) destroying the alien and the mother ship Mostromo and going into hyper-sleep with the can Jones.

Fifty-seven years later, Ripley is picked up in another ship (this is where the sequel "Aliens" picks up) and is offered the chance to return to the hideously grim planet (known as LV 462) and find out why colonists have stopped sending messages back. A broken transmitter or more aliens?

Along for the ride back are 20 space Marines, a human looking 'droid named Bishop (Lance Henriksen) and a representative of 'The Company,' Carter J. Burke (played by part-time actor/part time stand-up comedian Paul Reiser.)

"Aliens" was directed and produced by the husband-wife team of James Cameron and Gale Anne Hurd. Cameron learned his trade at Roger Corman's New World Pictures and then went off on his own to direct "Piranha II" and then with his sife wrote an original script called "The Terminator."

Rated R for Strong Language and Violence, you should see this film before it leaves town. This movie scared the living hell out of me and I loved every minute of it.

FCC Rams lose in opener

Using the strong and accurate passing of quarterback Eric Rainer, Grossmont College defeated Fresno City College 31-9 in the season opener for both teams.

Rainer, using the speed of wide receivers Todd Parker, Tony Kemp and Jerry Rodgers, threw for two touchdown passes in the game, played at Grossmont High School in El Cajon.

On Grossmont's first possession of the game, Rainer used a mix of short, quick passes and inside runs to move the ball to the Rams 30-yard line. From there, Michael Turek kicked a 47-yard field goal for a 3-0 Grossmont lead.

After the team punted, the Rams fumbled the ball on their own 10-yard line. Three plays later, Dennis Burley ran it in for another Grossmont score.

On FCC's next possession, quarterback Frank Hine marched the Rams down the field before tossing a 17-yard touchdown pass to tightend

John Forrester. During that drive, Hine also completed passes of 35 and 19 yards.

Rainer countered with a 43-yard toss to Kemp for a 17-7 lead.

Grossmont then regained possession as Donald Rupp intercepted a Hine pass in Ram territory.

Rainer then proceeded to throw a pass right into the arms of FCC defensive back Mark Crawford who ran the ball back to the Grossmont 40 yard line.

FCC could do nothing from there and had to punt.

Rainer tossed a 63-yard pass to Kemp on their next drive but went nowhere after that and had to punt.

The Rams took over deep in their own territory and after a couple of plays, running back Ken Christiansen took a hand-off and ran 46 yards to the Grossmont 27-yard line. Jim Kirk missed a field goal to end the drive.

Rainer came back and tossed a 67 yard touchdown pass to Parker for a 24-7 Grossmont lead.

FCC could do nothing on

their last possession of the first half and went into the locker room trailing 24-7.

After the Rams kicked off to open the second half, FCC defensive back Ron Steele intercepted the second pass from Rainer.

The defensive effort for each team picked up after that as each team punted three times.

FCC began the fourth quarter with Kirk again missing an attempted field goal, this time a 50 yarder.

After a Grossmont punt, the Rams gave the ball back with another interception.

From there, Grossmont went nowhere and had to punt. On the punt, however, the center snapped the ball over the kicker's head and out of the end zone for a safety making the score 24-9.

The final score came with 13 seconds left in the game when Roger Dutra scored on a 1-yard run for Grossmont.

The Rams will face San Jose City College tomorrow at McLane Stadium in Fresno. Game Time is 1:30 p.m.

Deukmejian spoke of his support of President Reagan's so-called "War on Drugs," and that as Governor he will do all in his power to make California a drug free state; "We'll never rest until every criminal, drug-pusher and hoodlum in our state gets their daily iron supplement — in the form of iron bars."

The governor elaborated on the national and state drug problem and accused Los Angeles Mayor Tom Bradley (his Democratic challenger in the November election) of suddenly "discovering" the drug problem. "All I can say is, it's a good thing he (Mayor Bradley) has a background in track and field, because he is going to have to run very far and very fast to escape the sorry record he has compiled as mayor."

But the wrath of the Duke was not exclusively for Mayor Bradley, adding that "...expecting the mayor to lead that fight (on drugs) is like expecting Rose Bird to uphold the death penalty."

The governor then yielded the floor to his honored guest, General Chuck Yeager.

General Yeager fielded questions from the press and when asked what his connection is to the Governor,

said: "I agree with the way the Governor is running the state, and when I was asked to accompany him on this trip I was honored and I agreed." Yeager, however, admitted that he hadn't met the Governor until that day.

With less than two months left before California's gubernatorial election, the Governor's press secretary, Kristy Flynn, told reporters that she expects "the Duke" to be elected again.

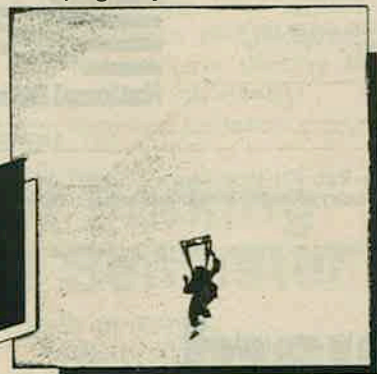
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
