Road Improvement Tax Measure Endorsed by ASB

The Fresno City College Associated Student Body Senate voted October 16 to endorse Measure "C", the road and transportation improvement measure on the November 4 ballot. The endorsement came after a presentation by Russ Sloan, Executive Director of the Fresno County and City Chamber of Commerce, the measure's principal backer.

If approved by the votgers, Measure "C" would increase sales tax countywide to help finance new road construction and rehabilitation of existing roads. Under Measure "C" sales tax would increase from six percent to six and one half percent for a twenty-year period.

According to Sloan Measure "C" is the "single most important issue the voters in Fresno County will vote on for the next 10 to 20 years." If Measure "C" is

approved, according to Sloan, virtually all of the road construction projects now on the drawing board for Fresno County will be completed in 20 years. This includes completion of freeways 41, 168, and 180. If measure "C" fails to pass said Sloan, the best we'll get is the widening of 180 west of Fresno."

According to Sloan, Measure "c" is expected to generate \$25 million the first year and \$14-15 million per year thereafter. The cost to residents of Fresno County, explained Sloan, is expected to be minimal. For example, a family earning \$35 thousand per year would face an increase in annual sales tax of \$35 to \$50.

"We're in a no-win situation," stated Sloan, "we're never going to get the money from the state to do this (without Measure "C"). We either do nothing or take matters into our own hands."


Last semester

'She's Gotta Have It" is about a 25ish graphic artist named Nola Darling (Tracy Camila Johns) who is having an affair with three different men at the same time. They are Jamie Overstreet (Tommy Redmond Hicks) a bookworm; Greer Childs (John Canada Terrel) a male model who has just made the cover of GQ; and Mars Blackmon (played by the writer/director/editor of this film, Spike Lee) a bike

messenger who talks like he's on methamphetamines. The three men all know about each other and they obviously don't get along. Nola can't make up her mind and this leads to all kinds of very funny comic situations.

Spike Lee, who is known as "the Black Woody Allen" is a master filmmaker. Made on a mere \$750,000, "She's Gotta Have It" is a wonderfully funny and sexy film. Chief Replies to Previous Letter

Dear Rampage Editor:

In reference to the unsigned letter to the Rampage Editor on 10-10-86, I would like to take the opportunity to relay some facts that the writer evidently does not

I assume that the person is referring to a 240Z stolen on 09-25-86 from Lot L between the hours of 1125 and 1300 hours. The vehicle was abandoned a short time later on the K.F.I.G. radio station parking lot at 732 N. Van Ness. An employee of the radio station phoned the Fresno Police Department on 09-30-86 to report the vehicle on the parking lot. The vehicle showed no signs of forced entry. The ignition switch showed signs of internal damage. The victim states that AM/FM stereo, speakers, tape box with tapes and racquetball racquet were removed from the vehicle.

The victim came into the College Police Department shortly after discovering the crime. He first talked to the department secretary. A telephonic alert was put out to Fresno Police before the College Police officer finished taking a crime report. The officer taking the report is a full-time academy trained peace officer with five years of experience. The officer checked the campus and surrounding areas for the vehicle. He explained to the victim what steps had been taken and that a formal alert on the law enforcement communication system was being made. It was also explained that the next step was for some agency to catch the suspects in the vehicle or find the vehicle abandoned. Neither the victim or his fiance offered their views to

this department. The District Police Department is staffed with eleven full-time sworn peace officers, who handle criminal and traffic problems at Fresno City College, Kings River Community and the Vocational Training Center. The officers have the same academy training and peace officer powers as any other peace officer in the State of California. Seven of the officers are headquartered at Fresno City College and four at Kings River Community College. Twenty-four hour seven day a week patrol of both campuses is maintained with the eleven officers. The staffing ratio for most police departments is one officer per 1.2 thousand population.

This may vary slightly with the community. With the College District population being approximately 18,000 it should be easy for anyone to see the department is un derstaffed.

Even though the police officers do issue parking tickets, the student cade unit conducts the majority o parking enforcement. I would be ideal, as suggested to put an officer in each parking lot. But, the depart ment competes for a share o the District revenue as doe every other District organiza tion. The suggestion is no practical or financially possible. For 1985-86 fisca year the department made 9 arrests and recovered \$86,048.00 of property fo students, staff and the District on the Fresno City College campus. The types of crimes committed vary from semester to semester. Th Rampage is doing a bette job of reporting problem this semester which gives th campus populace a chance t assist us in restricting criminal activity. However it does not mean crime i rampant on campus.

Rams Face COS

The Fresno City College football team will play the College of the Sequoias tomorrow night at 7 p.m. in Visalia.

The Rams are coming off a 14-10 loss to Kings River Community College in FCC's homecoming game last Saturday.

Running back Fred Coleman had an outstanding game for the Rams, rushing 17 times for 114 yards and one touchdown, a six-yard run in the third period. Jim Kirk kicked a 51-yard field goal in the second quarter for FCC.

Head Coach Bill Musick was happy with Coleman's performance, but also a little surprised.

"Yes, it surprised me a little bit. I was very happy for him (Coleman). He works very hard," Music said.

The quarterback situation

is still not settled for the Rams. Jim Lowe started for Fresno, but Frank Hine came in during the second quarter and played the rest of the game. hine started the first two games of the season for FCC.

"Frank will probably start our next game," Music said.

The loss offset another strong performance by the Ram defense, despite several offsides penalties called on the defense, FCC totaled 22 penalties for 154 yards.

"They (the defense) played well, but they could have played better. The only reason their offense could move the ball was because we jumped offsides so much," Musick added.

During last Saturday's game, Kings River quarter-back Chris Rangel was knocked out of the game with a thumb injury. Earlier in the year, Kings River's starting quarterback Ron Santos was severely injured in an automobile accident.

Clemens turned the above average Red Sox into the American League Champion Red Sox, but because of his winning performance in game seven of the American League Championship Series against the Angels, he was not able to start in game one of the World Series.

This will hurt the Red Sox because their first game starter, Bruce Hurst, could conceivably pitch in three Series games, while Clemens, a much more dominant pitcher, will start two at the most.

New York has four quality starters, as opposed to three Red Sox starters, so it really doesn't matter who starts for them. Whoever it is, they will be solid.
