Students won't foot fitness center bill

The school administration has decided not to charge students a fee for use of the fitness center for the Spring 1991 semester.

The Associated Students had expressed its concern since September to Interim President Arthur Ellish about a proposed fee for student's use of the Harold Zinkin fitness center. Many of the students did not want to be charged a fee for using the center.

Ellish has recently assured AS President Simone White that a fee will not be charged. He also told White that the administration would get the money to cover the \$50,000 estimated annual cost of the assessment services the center provides some other way.

"We will certainly not charge a fee," said Ellish. "We believe that the assessment the center gives you is vital and charging a fee is something no one likes to do, but the darn thing costs money."

Ellish says that no propositions dealing with where the money will come from have been made yet.

"It will be given its priority in the

budget process. We will have to start worrying in January about how to cover the cost," said Ellish.

About 400 students and 100 faculty members are using the fitness center this semester, according to Ellish. He expects the number of students using the center to increase to about 600 next semester.

"The number of people who are benefiting from the fitness center indicates that the assessment program is a success," said Ellish. "We would like to be able to provide it in the future."

Ellish stresses that the fitness center program was designed strictly as a cardiovascular workout and that

the assessment is necessary. The assessment measures an individual's physical abilities, strength, body-fat content and blood pressure.

"If we do not get the money to cover costs, then there will be no program and that is something we don't want to see," said Ellish.

FCC MEChA members support a protest of attack on FSU student

FCC's MEChA club supported Fresno State MEChA's protest against what they believe to be a racially-motivated attack on an FSU student and a mood of hostility towards women and people of color on the campus.

Four members of FCC's MEChA were among 150 students who marched on FSU President Harold Haak's office on Friday, October 19. The students demanded to speak with the president about what they believe to be a racially-motivated attack that indicates a larger problem on the campus.

According to FSU student Frank Aviles, he was assaulted by FSU student Thomas Doyle on the campus at 10:30 pm on October 12. Aviles was walking past the campus library with FSU students Salvador Cuevas and Eddy Nicochea when words were reportedly exchanged between them and a group of friends Doyle was walking with before he was assaulted. Aviles immediately contacted the campus police.

FCC MEChA decided to support the protest at Haak's office because they believe that the attack on Aviles and the handling of the incident by the FSU Police and the administra-

tion were racially-motivated.

"There was a lack of responsibility on the part of the FSU Police," said FCC MEChA President Israel Chavez. "Frank was treated like a criminal and victimized by the system."

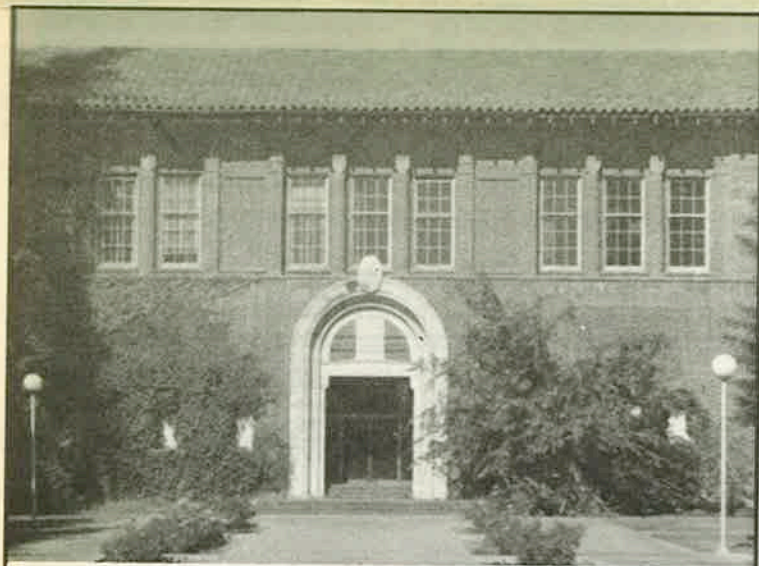
Aviles said he was the only member of the two groups involved in the incident who was detained in the back of a campus police car while police questioned him and Doyle and his friends.

Chavez says that the attack is an example of racial tensions that exist on the FSU campus and he is worried about the safety of FCC students who will be transferring to FSU and their perception of the university.

"Chicano students who want to transfer to FSU need to know that they will be safe there. This incident shows that the FSU police aren't doing enough to make a safe environment," said Chavez.

Chavez, who is in his second semester as president of MEChA, says that the club has supported Chicanos in the past who believe they are victims of racism and will continue the struggle for their cause.

"If someone comes to us, we analyze the issues regarding racially-motivated attacks and look at the facts," said Chavez. "If it is racial, we will be there to support them."

Walid Ayyad escaped from Kuwait on August 23 in order to get the necessary paperwork to get his

family out of the troubled area. Since that time, he has had to endure a difficult waiting game as he and his family in Amman, Jordan helped engineer his wife and children's escape.

To get out of Kuwait, Fatima Ayyad needed a Jordanian passport like the ones her children had. With this passport her and the children could make their way through the Iraqi checkpoints. They successfully accomplished this last week.

Fatima Ayyad and her children are expected to arrive in Fresno any day.

Eye on the environment

Before buying that Big Mac, stop and consider something. The hamburger may taste good, but the packaging will be around longer than this generation's great-great grandchildren. This is the most environmentally damaging packaging known to mankind... styrofoam.

If this doesn't sound serious, then consider a few things: First, 89 percent of the nation's landfills are full. That means that if there were one hundred landfills all lined up, only eleven are usable. And, styrofoam, also known as polystyrene, is non-biodegradable.

Simply put, it will never break down and decompose to become part of the earth. Because of this, it contributes to one third of the trash in landfills, and is a majority of the trash lining the nation's roadways.

Some corporations, such as McDonald's, claim that polystyrene is recyclable. However, if asked where the nearest recycling center is, most fast food managers will draw a blank. 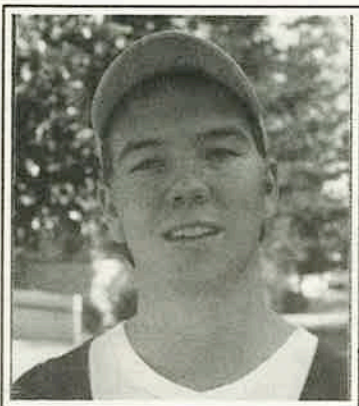

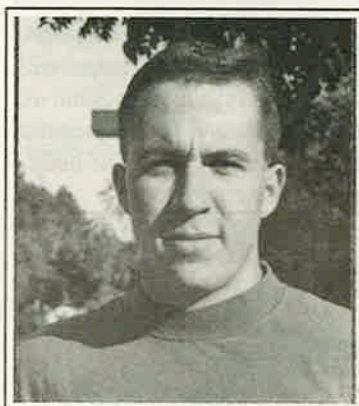

Martin Scorsese's controversial, fictional film, *The Last Temptation of Christ*, was shown on Tuesday, October 30th, in the Fresno City College student lounge. Members of religious groups stood outside the student lounge and read biblical scriptures aloud. Pamphlets were handed out to passers-by in an effort to introduce Jesus Christ to anyone interested.

When FCC students were asked what they thought about the choice of film to be shown, their opinions did not vary much. Most of them said the film was an excellent choice to be viewed at school. Their reasons as to why it was a good choice did vary.

Suzy Ortiz, 27, president of Newman Catholic Student Association and FCC student, was glad the film was chosen.

"I admire them [AS] for deciding to show such a controversial film. We tried to show it in our lounge at the Newman Center, but were

Abandonment of the love glove

After a long and strenuous campaign, the Associated Students succeeded in making condoms available in campus restrooms. The AS passed a resolution favoring the condom vending machines as a weapon in the war on Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS). Now that they've been installed, the machines aren't being used as widely as expected.

"That, by itself, doesn't necessarily indicate anything," said Health Services Director Linda Albright.

The FCC Business Office collects 23 percent of the monies from the machines which sell the condoms for 50 cents each. Accounting Supervisor Ellie Lompney says that about \$40 was turned in to the business office during the last semester. That represents the sale of about 100 condoms each month.

When the AS first proposed the controversial condom vending machines about three years ago, then campus president Dr. Ernest Leach held off a decision until a State Center Community College District Commission developed a district-wide policy on AIDS.

Since condoms are not 100 percent effective, even when used properly, the administration wanted the attack to be on a broader front, including education. A course on the medical and social factors of AIDS was first offered at FCC in the fall of 1987, and continued to be given each semester by the Social

Sciences Division. But a spokesperson said the 2-unit course being offered this semester will not be repeated in the fall because of a falling off in enrollment.

Students can also get pamphlets and information from the Health Services office in the Student Services Building.

FCC student Marilyn Mitchell has worked as a Public Health Investigator for the Fresno County Department of Health AIDS Program for nine years. She says she'll speak to anyone about AIDS. Mitchell first worked in the general area of STD's and began to specialize in AIDS in 1985 when it became a growing problem.

STD's are Sexually Transmitted Diseases, including AIDS, which are transmitted by the exchange of blood, semen or bodily fluids.

AS President White expects literature on STD's to be installed in both men's and women's restrooms soon, to supplement the condom vending machines. White was unsure of whether the machines had been installed equally in men's and women's restrooms. "A disservice is being done (if not). I'll bring it up in my report in our Senate meeting," she said.

Why the vending machines are not being used more is uncertain. The fact that FCC is a commuter campus and has no dormitories may be a factor. As one female student said, "People come to class and then they leave right away."

White, a liberal arts major, spoke about the possibility that students are not seriously concerned about contracting AIDS. "It doesn't hit home unless you know someone who has it. Until it does, people don't worry."

Fresno is a far cry from Laos

From violent terror in Laos, a young girl escaped and found her way to the tranquility and freedom of the Fresno City College campus.

Jittapaun Salinthon, 29, escaped from her home in Luang Prabang, Laos in 1980.

Salinthon says it's the honesty and comradery that she misses most. Drugs and burglary were not a problem in Luang Prabang.

"Here, I lock the door, chain it, and do not open it. I feel I can not trust people."

However, Salinthon says she prefers the opportunities and freedom that the United States has given her.

When Salinthon left Laos, the People's Democratic Republic of Laos was at war with the communists, led by Kaysone Phomvihane.

The city was quiet during the day, but when the sun went down, the fighting began, said Salinthon.

"I got used to the noise from guns and bombs, and the sound of people

dying," said Salinthon.

Salinthon and her family escaped from Laos by crossing the Mekong River in her parent's boat. She was 20-years-old and pregnant at the time, and she hid in the bathroom as they crossed.

"I was nervous and scared, but I was also lucky," explained Salinthon. "Many people died trying to swim across the river, but my parents had enough money to pay for our escape."

She spent six months as a refugee in Thailand, and then she was sent to another camp in the Philippines for an additional six months. From there, Salinthon and her family went to Santa Ana, California, and then to Modesto for a year.

While in Modesto, Salinthon attended Modesto Junior College. It was there that she learned to speak English.

In 1983 she and her family moved to Fresno. She attended FCC as a Secretarial Science major.

According to Salinthon, making friends and learning the language were the most difficult things

for her to do.

"A lot of people do not care about the South East Asians. They think we are trying to take something away from them, but this is not true," she said, "I have worked hard for what I have."

Salinthon graduated from FCC with an Associates degree in Secretarial Science in 1988, and is now working full-time as an office assistant here on campus.

Salinthon says schools in the US have a much easier "system" than Laotian schools. "In a history class in Laos, a teacher might ask you a question like 'What happened in 1960?' Then you would write everything you remembered from the book and hope you wrote what the teacher wanted." Also, there are no true and false questions or multiple choice, all were essay.

"Education is very important in my country. We must wear uniforms and act appropriately at all times," said Salinthon. "Things are much more relaxed here. An Associate degree in my country is precious, and would be enough to get a high paying job."

"There is opportunity in America, and yet people still drop out of school. I appreciate the opportunities I have been given," she said.

"I love my country, but there is nothing left for me there. This is my home now."

Salinthon eventually plans to attend Fresno State, but she is in no hurry. She is content with what she is doing now, and proud to be an American.

"Listen Up: The Lives of Quincy Jones"

In the span of his 57 years, musician Quincy Jones has accomplished enough for several lives. Or so it seems when you're watching his film biography. Eras—especially the Civil Rights era—are glimpsed as though through the window of a passing train. The fleeting quality of the images is one of the film's strengths as well as weaknesses.

A parade of notables appear briefly with a few words about Jones. Barbara Streisand gives a short, loving tribute. Jones' daughter Jolie, from the first of his three marriages, shares insights and memories. Film director Sidney Lumet, for whom Jones composed his first love score, appears on screen often to speak of their artistic collaboration. Some other famous faces—Ray Charles, Dizzy Gillespie, Billy Eckstein, Frank Sinatra and Miles Davis—echo an earlier Big Band era when musicians did one-night gigs in large and small American cities.

Jones recalls playing with Lionel Hampton's band, which he joined in 1949: "We played 70 one-nighters in the Carolinas." As he spoke, his brow wrinkled. He shook his head slightly, remembering, "We'd go through these towns like enemy territory."

The discrimination against black musicians created problems on the road. "We always had a white driver because that's the only way we could eat," Jones recalled. Often the musicians were denied rooms in the same hotels which had booked them to play. Or, they'd confront a sign on the wall of a barber shop saying, "We don't cut colored hair."

But Jones, who was among other things, the first African-American vice president of a major record company, didn't let the bitterness gnaw at him. "It's about recycling energy, converting hate into love," he said. "It's a bitch but it's your only salvation."

In the opening scenes, his own harsh childhood stares at him from battered doorways as he walks through his old Chicago home. Pain flickers in the deepset eyes of his lean face as Jones remembers his mother—how he hardly knew her, especially after she went to a mental hospital. And how the only source of privacy in the crowded two-room apartment was a closet.

"Music did take you away from all that," Jones said.

And music had been his life, with over 30 film credits (he composed the music for "The Pawnbroker," and television's "Roots,") and years of arranging and composing (he produced three hit Michael Jackson LP's.) Now, he's developing television shows.

In 1974, he had a life-threatening ailment. But Jones seems fully recovered from the cerebral aneurysm he suffered then. A graphic scene of an operation on his skull at the time.

Jones provided the music for "Listen Up," including some segments of rap that interweave the talking heads like a kind of Greek chorus. A couple of thoughts on leaving the theatre: How wonderful that this revealing film was made

during Quincy Jones' creative life, and how moving that the struggle of black musicians who've contributed the truly American art form—jazz—was a cross Jones also bore. And what a miracle that his talent soared above it. This documentary shows where Jones has been, through all his lives.

"Welcome Home, Roxy Carmichael"

Winona Ryder (Great Balls of Fire and Heathers) and Jeff Daniels star in "Welcome Home, Roxy Carmichael", a movie about the power of self-delusion. It was directed by Jim Abrahams (Big Business) and written and produced by newcomer Karen Leigh Hopkins.

The Roxy of the title is only a minor celebrity—her boyfriend wrote a hit tune with her name in it—who is returning to her little, obsessed hometown of Clyde, Ohio to dedicate the Roxy Carmichael School of Cosmetology and Drama. Roxy remains a mystery throughout the entire movie, although we are constantly reminded that she loved the color pink, eats m&m's, and always kept a supply of Almond Rocha.

The hometown folks anxiously await Roxy's arrival complete with a committee, sales, and even a Welcome Home Roxy Ball.

Ryder plays Dinky Bosetti, an odd high school girl who snubs her adoptive parents and spends most of her time dyeing everything she owns black, and talking to a zoo of strays she keeps on a riverbank. At school, the kids laugh and throw rocks at her. This doesn't matter

however, since Dinky has decided that Roxy is her mother and is coming to get her. Ryder's character is basically intolerable because of her bratty and smart-aleck ways, and halfway through the film, you're kind of glad they throw rocks at her.

Daniels plays Roxy's old boyfriend before she left Clyde fifteen years ago. He's married with two children now, but finds himself obsessed with lingering questions of what might have been that puts his marriage in jeopardy. Roxy must have been one impressive lover, since she even had a lesbian affair. The lesbian was played nicely by Dinah Manoff (Empty Nest), who's character is still trying to find a comparable partner since Roxy's departure.

Although most of the acting is quite bad, Thomas Wilson Brown (Honey, I Shrunk The Kids) gave a good performance as a boy who falls for Dinky, and Laila Robins is likable as the sympathetic guidance counselor who befriends her.

Witness to a Halloween nightmare

Joseph W. Burrus, 32, known as "Amazing Joe" was buried alive by 8 tons of wet cement Halloween night at Black Beard's Family Fun Center.

Fresno City College student Lourie Dickson witnessed the event. "As soon as the assistants finished pouring the cement on his plexy-glass coffin, you could see the cement bowing," said Dickson. "At that point the assistants frantically tried to dig a hole next to him to get to the coffin."

"Everybody (spectators) was kind of quiet because they weren't sure exactly what was going on," she said.

Burrus had enough oxygen to survive for 30 minutes, however, the rescuers needed 45 minutes to get him out. It appears he died from suffocation long before, according to witnesses.

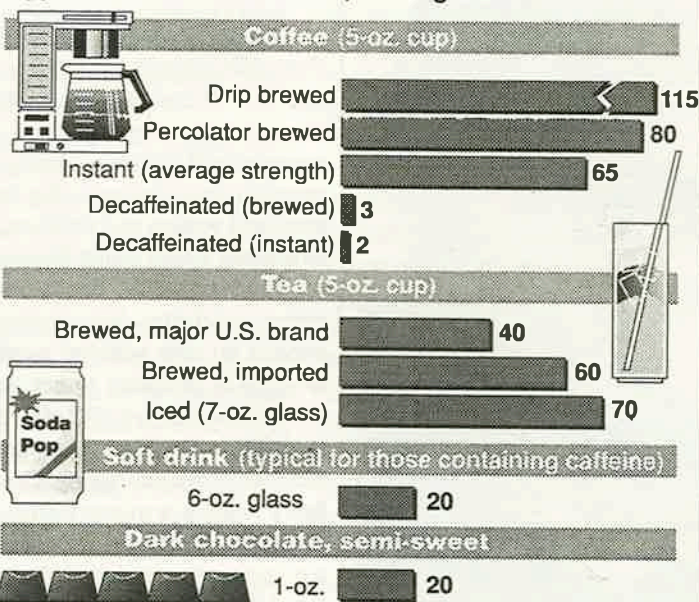
"He was already out of his neck chain and shackles when they pulled him out," stated Dickson.

In an interview before the stunt, Burrus said, "I consider myself a master of illusion and escape artist. I believe I'm the next Houdini and greater. To me, that's what an escape artist is: to put myself in an impossible situation and get out of it."

matter how objectionable.

"Fresno State, in my opinion, used The Last Temptation of Christ as a focal point. It was a public relation gimmick. There weren't any lectures explaining it and it was the only film shown which made it one-sided," said Reyna. "The programs Committee thought a religious forum would disseminate information. We did not decide on that movie to cause havoc. It may not be a popular stand, but it's current."

One student, James Wilder, 22, did not want to see the movie because of the inconsistency of the script in the movie with the scriptures written in the Bible.

"If the source used to make this film was the Bible, the film is inconsistent. If the writers are going to have a character dream, it should be consistent with the character," said Wilder. "If it's a murderer, he'll dream of murdering people. If they they take information from the Bible, it should be accurate."

"The Bible says that Jesus is capable of the things in this movie. Why would FCC show a self-contradicting movie? Like, why show a film entitled, 'Hitler: The World's First Hero?'," said Wilder.

After the movie on Tuesday, CL Yarbrough, the president of Campus Crusade for Christ said he had not protested the showing of "The Last Temptation of Christ."

"I'm not against them having shown this film because it gave the chance to talk to students and introduce them to the real Jesus Christ," said Yarbrough.

When asked what he thought of the film, he replied. "It's a distortion of the film. Although it's explained in the beginning of it that it is fiction, it's way off."

"What I worry about are people like the Asian students, who might not know who Jesus is. They can be misled or turned off by this film. If people want to know a person, read the biography. Matthew, Luke, John and Mark in the Bible are pieces of Jesus Christ's biography."
