Zoom to defy the FCC at FCC

First Amendment radio station to broadcast from campus without license

The question at the Mixed Media Club meeting was "would Zoom Black Magic dare to broadcast from Fresno City College on Free Speech Day, Monday, May 7?"

"If our equipment is ready we will," said Walter Dunn later that afternoon. Those who know him don't think he is bluffing.

Dunn, better known as the Black Rose, is the owner of Zoom Black Magic radio station. Three times the Federal Communications Commission has raided Zoom and confiscated the broadcasting equipment and each time Dunn has managed to get back on the air with his unique blend of jazz, rap, pop and gospel music mixed with discussions of important contemporary issues.

He estimates that about \$18,000 worth of equipment has been seized in the raids including some that had been borrowed from friends.

"How can we possibly get this piece of equipment?" he once asked "Mr. Ebony" his disc jockey and right hand man.

"Just ask God for it," replied Ebony. "If it's right it will come together — if it isn't we don't really need it."

They must be doing something right because it keeps coming back together every time the government thinks Zoom has been silenced. Whatever is truly needed is obtained but there are no huxuries. Zoom broadcasts out of a little trailer with a leaky roof using equipment most radio stations would throw away.

"We started with just one-tenth of a watt sion than the newspapers have now. broadcasting to a one mile radius," said Dunn. "We chose ZOOM as our call letters so they couldn't accuse us of impersonating a licensed station." All FCC licensed stations in

the United States have call letters starting with KorW.

Dunn doesn't plan to apply for a broadcasting license. He sees it as a constitutional issue.

"It's not a race issue," he said. "It's a people issue. It's about people being free to speak out withoutgovernment interference."

A free press has long been considered one of the cornerstones of liberty. Newspapers are protected by the first amendment of the Constitution, making them exempt

from licensing and control by government.

"If I had to choose between a government without newspapers or newspapers without a government," said Thomas Jefferson, "I would not hesitate to choose the latter."

But newspapers are no longer the mainstay of the press. Radio and television each have larger audiences and more power of persua-

"If the two biggest components of the media are not free, how long can liberty endure in America?" asked Dunn. He rejected the idea that free speech can exist on licensed stations.


> "It can't be considered free if you have to ask the government for permission," he said, "and it isn't free if you have to pay a fee.

In the early days of radio the Federal Communications Commission was created because "there weren't enough frequencies for everybody." Dunn maintains that with today's technology that argument is no longer valid.

With modern faze loop technology and digital

tuning there is no limit to the number of stations that could broadcast in the same area, he explained Market forces would limit them much sooner than lack of space on the dial.

"We may have home made equipment but it's definitely state of the art," he said.







It is time for the Associated Students to become a strong coalition that represents you, with honesty and integrity. Let's get Back to the





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

People who are interested in the martial arts usually have to pay a fortune to get professional instruc-

Or a person can get a subscription to Black Belt Magazine or watch countless Bruce Lee-type movies and call themselves a mar-

Perhaps the best route to go would be to join the Fresno City Martial Arts Club.

Men and women of all ages can learn everything from karate to eskrima from instructor Al Smith.

Smith not only heads the Martial Arts Club but also teaches self-defense to the handicapped, instructs an introduction to the martial arts class, teaches an Adaptive Physical Education class to the disabled and teaches self defense to women.

Smith got into the martial arts when he was 12 years old. The first form he studied was judo.

"My dad has a black belt in judo. I studied under him for three years," said Smith.

While growing up, Smith studied Korean-style karate and also got a black belt in American kickboxing and Shotokan karate. He also holds a "guro" or black belt in Eskrima. which is a Filipino weapon.

Smith came to FCC in 1978 to work in the Enabler Program. The Health, Arts and Sciences Department learned of his background in the martial arts and persuaded him to teach some classes.

Smith soon started his own business and opened two of his own martial arts studios in the Fresno area. After two and a half years, he closed both studios and opened another in a different location.


"My studios were making money but I also had a lot of bills to pay. But when teaching, I was making money without all the bills," Smith said. "It was easy to see which one was more lucrative."

The Martial Arts Club holds a competitive tournament every year in April with a large part of the proceeds going to the Adaptive Physical Education Department. A portion of the proceeds also go to the club itself.

Smith teaches eskrima, karate, boxing and has guest instructors teach everything from tai chi cham to the use of various weapons.

Smith, who hopes to study anthropology next fall at Berkeley, said, "Everyone should learn self defense or a martial art. It teaches self discipline that will be useful not only now but all through life."

The Martial Arts Club meets every Thursday evening at 6:30 in the gym.

Will the FCC raid FCC? Will there be free speech in the Free Speech Area?

"We operate without bleeding over into other bands which is more than can be said for many of the licensed stations, he claimed."

Ebony claims that limiting competition to protect the powerful commercial stations is the real purpose of the FCC.

"Most media is about selling garbage," he said. "It's clowns selling little kids hamburgers and bombarding the masses with subliminal urges to purchase worthless garbage."

"Zoom is needed," said Ebony. "Could Zoom exist if there wasn't a void that needed to be filled?"

"The fact that we can set up and broadcast for a few grand and give our music away free is a real threat to the established stations," said Dunn. "We don't sell ads. We are not involved in a joint maritime venture with the Department of Commerce."

According to constitutional scholars it was only through declaring radio and television "joint maritime ventures" that allowed Congress to bypass the constitutional safeguards and regulate them. By declaring Zoom a First Amendment Station" and refusing licensing under maritime law Dunn has removed the legal pretext under which the FCC operates.

"We are men who believe in the US Constitution and we believe that humanity has been abused by a few greedy people," said Ebony.

"Are we wrong because we believe in the principles set forth by the founding fathers?" asked Dunn.

But the FCC has taken and is still holding Zoom's equipment. Dunn wants it back but has been unsuccessful in getting the agency to re-

"Most lawyers are afraid to take on the FCC in court because they're not trained in constitutional law and they want to keep their plush positions as part of the bar association," said Dunn.

"They're part of the profit crowd not the prophet crowd," quipped Ebony.

So a lack of legal counsel has kept Zoom from recovering its property despite obvious errors in the search warrant, the fact that some of the equipment seized wasn't broadcasting equipment or listed on the warrant and constitutional issues questioning the FCC's jurisdiction.

"But they're the government, said Dunn. "They've got the guns and power to do whatever they want whether it's legal or not."

One of the things the FCC raid did was to terrorize Dunn's dying mother.

"There was no need for them to tear apart her room," he said. "It wasn't even close to the broadcast trailer and they already knew where the equipment was. All they accomplished was to scare her so bad that she fretted from then on (the rest of her life) worrying that they'd come back and take us all away to

jail."

The FCC attempted to fine Dunn \$2,000 for operating Zoom without a license. Not having the legal power to levy fines they sent him a notice of "apparent monetary forfeiture" which he ignored saying "it's not apparent I owe them anything. Even to answer could be admitting something I'm not guilty of."

"Zoom is needed because the 1990s demand change," said Ebony. "More rights are being legislated away daily."

"The valley needs Zoom Black Magic TV," said Dunn. "It will be on channel 14 when we get it together."

"It's not just Fresno, my man," said Ebony. "There's a First Amendment Network springing up throughout the country."

Movie director Allen Moyle recently produced a motion picture, Pump Up The Volume, about a radio station in Harlem that operates without FCC licensing.

"We went to the pre-screening in LA," said Dunn. "They still haven't made the final cuts." He said it was real interesting but he wished it covered the free speech issue more thoroughly. "It's really just covering one aspect," he said. "Maybe Pump up The Volume II will cover the rest."

What's it like being the focal point of liberty on the air waves? The Black Rose described it as like being on a roller coaster and not being able to get off.

"It's not about you anymore," said Ebony. "It's much bigger than any of us."

"Zoom is the people's and (we) just can't quit no matter how much we might want to," Dunn explained.
