
## Setter from the Editor

### TODAY FCC THEN FJC... 1910

Fresno City College first opened its doors in the fall of 1910 under the roof of the old Fresno Technical High School building at Stanislaus and '0' streets. Three instructors welcomed 20 students in the first class on opening day.

The college, labeled 'FJC', later became known as the first junior college in the United States as it acquired its status by the members of the California Historical Landmarks Advisory Committee on Friday, September 17, 1965. - Fall 1965, FCC Bulletin



## **DEDICATION** AS FIRST JC

1965

It was September 17, 1965, the day Fresno City College became dedicated as the state's first junior college. Arch Bradshaw, then FCC's President, unveiled the landmark with Richard McCarthy, chairman of the California Historical Landmarks Advisory Committee.

The historical landmark was founded on the corner of Stanislaus and O streets and today is listed as California Landmark no. 803 in the committee's listings. Also present in the photo are Ronald Primavera, student body president of 1965 and Stuart M. White, superintendent of the State Center 'Junior' College District of the same year. State Center Junior College District is known today as the State Center Community College District.



## **EXISTING** LANDMARK AT PRESENT

Legend of Zapp's Park A 20 acre park that sprawled between Olive and Blackstone, near our campus today.


## 76 YEARS AGO ... A BEGINNING


Students who attended Fresno Junior College at Stanislaus and O streets were not far away from the campus and its activities at Fresno Normal.


Both locations were a distance away from the central city where a majority of the population existed then.



Ratcliffe Stadium was built in 1926 and dedicated to Fresno State Normal School as the 'main' events stadium for all of the sports programs that were offered. It was renamed 'Ratcliffe Stadium' to honor the first coach of football for Fresno State, Emory Ratcliffe.

Being the home of many atheletic records and fond memories, the stadium stands alone against the traffic of modern day life along Blackstone avenue, as it has for over a half a century.



The above photograph illustrates what the front 'cover'of the program for the annual West Coast Relays looked like back then. The photo to the left is also a picture taken during the 1958 West Coast Relays, a very popular event with spectators. In the early days, activities such as this were 'the' event of the week, and many attended with school spirit and pride.

1950

## JOE LOUIS EALLS COMEBACK BOUTIN

1950

After thirteen years as a champion, Joe Louis last night lost his try at a comeback to Ezzard Charles. The fight in Yankee Stadium went to Charles by unanimous decision of the three judges after a gruelling, bloody fight that unexpectedly went a full thirteen rounds.

Both Louis and Charles had their left eyes badly battered early in the fight, even though they were fighting cautiously. In the seventh round both were fighting on half vision and points seemed to be about evenly divided.

Louis made his best showing in the eighth round, when he nearly floored the Cleveland boxer. From then on Charles seemed to forget his caution; both men were fighting hard. The next few rounds had Joe Louis breathing heavily; twice he was on the ropes. Both he and Charles were covered with blood, as they concentrated on each other's heads.

In the eleventh, fans came to their feet as Charles staggered Louis in his own corner, but Charles failed to press his advantage. By the thirteenth, it was apparent that it was Charles' fight. Louis fans stilled hoped for one of his smashing rights, but it did not come.

The judges' decisions were 12-3, 13-2, and 10-5 for Charles.

It was in June, 1937, that Joe Louis won the championship from Jim Braddock with a knockout in the eight. Louis is 36, considered old for a fighter to make a comeback.

## ENROLLMENT GOES UP STEADY

1950

The total enrollment of the Fresno Junior College reached 1,239 early today announced Mr. Maurice Reetz, Dean of Instruction. With the addition of the new president, Dr. Thomas Blakeley, and ten new faculty staff members offerings have been increased this year in all divisions. There are also 24 new trade extension instructors.

Six hundred seventy-four students registered for the regular day classes compared with 667 JC students and 121 high school students last October.

The trade extension classes, which meet at night, have an enrollment of 446 students.

The pre-enrollment classes, also meeting at night, have 73 students enrolled in automotive mechanics, auto body and fender repair, and welding.

The junior college also offers courses to 56 half-time students from the city high schools. Last year 61 students attended these half time





## TOM SEAVER...A LEGEND

Tom Seaver was arguably the best baseball player to ever play at Fresno City College. After careers at Fresno and at USC, Tom played major league baseball primarily with the Cincinnati Reds. He had short campaigns with the Red Sox, White Sox and Mets before retiring from baseball. At

In 1992, Tom Seaver was voted into the Baseball Hall of Fame with the most number of votes in baseball history. His father spoke of the induction from his Connecticut residence,"this was a thrill that could never be repeated. It was something that we had looked foward to for years. Even in Little League he had good stuff.'


### RAMPAGE MEETS A LEGENDARY HALISEPTERSE COACH




