## **DOLE HEADLINES**

Elizabeth Dole paid a visit to Fresno on Tuesday, October 1 to tour the agricultural exhibits at the Fresno Fair and to campaign for her husband, Republican presidential candidate Bob Dole.

She began her address with endorsements for local and statewide Republican candidates before launching into her speech, praising her husband and finding fault with President Clinton's first four years as president. She spoke to the farmers in the audience, calling her husband a "friend to agriculture." She spoke of Bob Dole's plan to roll back estate taxes on farms and to protect private property rights by fighting regulatory burdens.

She also spoke of her husband's wartime involvement in the military and the injury that he received in the line of duty. She outlined how much Clinton had cut defense spending and told the audience that Bob Dole would increase military spending. She stated that Dole would bring back the strong military force that we once had, quoting former President Reagan by saying, "You need to be strong enough to keep the peace."

Family values were not left out, and she detailed Dole's plan to help America's families pull ahead financially. To begin with, there would be a fifteen percent across-the-board tax cut with a \$500 per child tax credit. She also stated that Bob Dole would balance the budget so that we don't pass our debt on to our children. She also advocated a deduction on the home office tax.

Next on her agenda were the issues of crime and drugs. She said that under Bob Dole, with the help of state governors, there would be no parole for violent criminals. Prisoners would work a forty hour work week to offset the cost of their incarceration and to provide victim compensation. She stressed the importance of having a Republican president to the Republicans due to the fact that as many as three Supreme Court Justice positions may be vacated within the next four years. These are lifetime appointments made by the president.

The U.S. drug problem was also addressed. She stated that the Clinton administration had virtually ignored the situation, and as a result drug use in America has skyrocketed. She promised her audiences that Bob Dole would wage an all-out war on drugs, using the U.S. military if necessary.

On the issue of education, she endorsed opportunity scholarships that would allow low and middle income families to send their children to private schools. The desired outcome of this would be that the competition would force public schools to provide a higher quality education to their students.

According to Clayton Smith, the Chair President for the College Republicans here on campus, her overall message was "extremely positive and very optimistic." She encouraged valley Republicans to "roll up your sleeves and go to work" on getting her husband elected president. She cautioned voters against paying too much attention to polls, adding that if Dole took California he was in the clear for the United States presidency. She charmed the audience with her southern grace and left the stage with a confident air totally appropriate to a potential First Lady.

Welfare reform is a dirty word to some people in the Valley. It is long overdue, other residents may claim with a sigh of relief. Eloise Anderson, the California Director of Social Services recently spoke at the FCC Forum to address the controversial issues surrounding the new welform reforms. "What does the safety net mean", Anderson asked. The current program allows a parent (usually a female) to receive benefits until the youngest child turns 18. The reforms that will be implemented by the Federal Government in 1997 will change the program drastically, women will only be entitled to benefits for 5 years in the lifetime of raising children. An audience member asked if the reforms will cause families to become homeless. Anderson stated "Women chose to stay on AFDC because it allowed them to stay home with their children; which is what it was designed to do, not because they don't have anything else". Anderson advocates that when welfare is cut, former recipients will go to

work. Why not? It is a negative assumption to think individuals aren't capable of doing this.

Considering the fact that 27% of the federal budget is spent on welfare, 15% in the state of California. "There are more people on aid here, than 21 states have in poplulation" Anderson revealed as the audience gasped.

In the 1930's the federal program which is known as welfare, was initially set up to help widows with children. In 1930, only 4% of children were born out of wedlock, as opposed to 30% of children born out

of wedlock in 1996. Anderson explained this, noting society and the roles of women have changed over the 60 year period. The modern conviences which we take for granted in our daily life, have allowed women to work outside the

Over the last 60 years, the welfare program remained stagnant while society progressed. While people tend to resist change and while those changes may be uncomfortalble, it is necessary for the welfare program to be updated to address the needs and issues of the 1990's.

Can you imagine having barely obtained your B.A., being offered an executive management position for a major corporation which had previously only hired persons with a M.S. in business administration? It happened to one young man in Kansas City, Missouri. He was at a SIFE competition when the CEO of GNB Technologies said, "I want to hire him!"

SIFE is an acronym for Students in Free Enterprise and "it is quickly becoming the premier organization on campus," said William (Bill) Syvertsen, faculty advisor to SIFE.

SIFE is a partnership between higher education



#### The F.C.C. Art Club is a student based organization on the campus of Fresno City College. Our mission is to expose members, students and the community to the many facets of art,



Butterfield's: Go for the brew instead of the food I've been to Butterfield's about 100 times. Ninety-nine of those trips however were straight to the bar. So this was the actual first time I've eaten dinner here. The bar and grill (located at 777 E. Olive in the Tower District) is famous throughout the valley for it's exquisite beer that is made right in front of your eyes.

Butterfield's has earned a reputation as one of the top west-coast micro-brewries. Butterfield's offers a wide range of food choices for lunch or dinner with prices ranging from \$6.95 to \$12.95. I decided on linguine and clams with a side ordegarlic cheese bread for dinner. The service was really good. The waitress was friendly, attentive, and never let me sit at an empty glass or a clean plate. The food, however, was less than impressive. After eating my salad and cheese bread, I wasready for the main course only to get a plate of pasta that was of mediocre size and taste.

But don't think I left Butterfield's disappointed. After dinner I sat at the bar andrelished the taste a Raspberry Wheat Ale while watching the live jazz band that wasplaying that night.

This is where Butterfield's shines. The atmosphere is casual and laid back with an excellent selection of fine beer and live music.

The beast in unleashed, the Best of the Beast that is. Castle Records completes their onslaught of Iron Maiden reissues by creating a collection of their greatest hits.

Though the regular single cd version will be released Oct. 15, already for sale is the special edition double cd set, limited to 75,000 copies. This set contains 27 remastered Iron Maiden classics, including four collector's tracks. Exclusive to this package is new studio track "Virus" which will not be on their next studio album and the first live track featuring Blaze Bayley on vocals, "Afraid to Shoot Strangers." It also contains two tracks taken from the Soundhouse Tapes sessions, "Iron Maiden" and the previously unreleased "Strange World."

Complementing these two picture discs is a sixty page hard cover book. Inside are over 200 photographs portraying the journey and changes the band has endured for over 21 years, accompanied by a thorough timeline. In addition are lyrics, a comprehensive discography, and the Iron Maiden family tree which shows the evolution of the band, including the origin and continuation of every person who once was or currently is a key member.

Suggested retail price is \$31.98. Though this price is steep, money is not an issue for any true fan. But for those who are just passive listeners or have tight budgets, the cheaper regular edition will arrive soon. And it will be worth the wait.

Fresnans, with bated breath, showed up to take in the ice as withdrawals from Tark's Tank were vaguely diminished.


The crowd of 6,002 watched an incredible defensive dual. The fans were treated to a 0-0 gut check in sudden death overtime.

The first weekend of October the Fresno City Rams football team reached .500, after 4 games in the 96 season by beating San Jose City College 50 - 19. The Rams stopped a two game losing streak evening up their record at 2-2. The Rams' defense allowed 19 points in the first half, and then they shut down San Jose's offense by not allowing them to score in the second half. The past two games, against Grossmont and Butte, Rams offensive unit scored only 6 points. 
