## Regulations on stolen parking permits remain as is

The President's cabinet on February 27, met to clarify the regulations on lost and stolen parking permits. The decision was made to enforce the existing regulations.

Procedures will be made more clear by changing the wording.

Chief Shrum suggests plac-

ing the permit in the lower right corner of the window, scotch tape could be used on the edges. This would at least help with not losing the permit. In the month of February there have been 20 reports on stolen permits. The police office is not taking any reports of damaged permits.

The procedures are: replacement permits are issued only in the case of a destroyed permit.

Lost or stolen permits no longer qualify for replacement permits for the \$5 clerical fee.

Replacement of permits are as follows: A) In order to receive a replacement parking permit, proof of destruction must be submitted to the College Police Department. A permit will be issued for a \$5 clerical fee. B) Persons claiming stolen permits will have to purchase a new

permit for the \$17 fee, or \$42 for an annual staff permit, they will reimburse the victim for all losses. C) Persons claiming lost permits for the \$17 fee, or \$42 for an annual staff permit. D) Permits lost due to extenuating circumstances, such as a traffic accident, will be replaced for the \$5 clerical fee. Documentation of the circumstance is necessary.

The majority of the parking permits that have been stolen off campus are from car washes and for the permits that have been stolen on campus have been taken from open moonrooves and windows.

"To ensure that your permits are not stolen roll-up your windows and moonrooves," stated FCC campus police dispatcher, Bernadette.

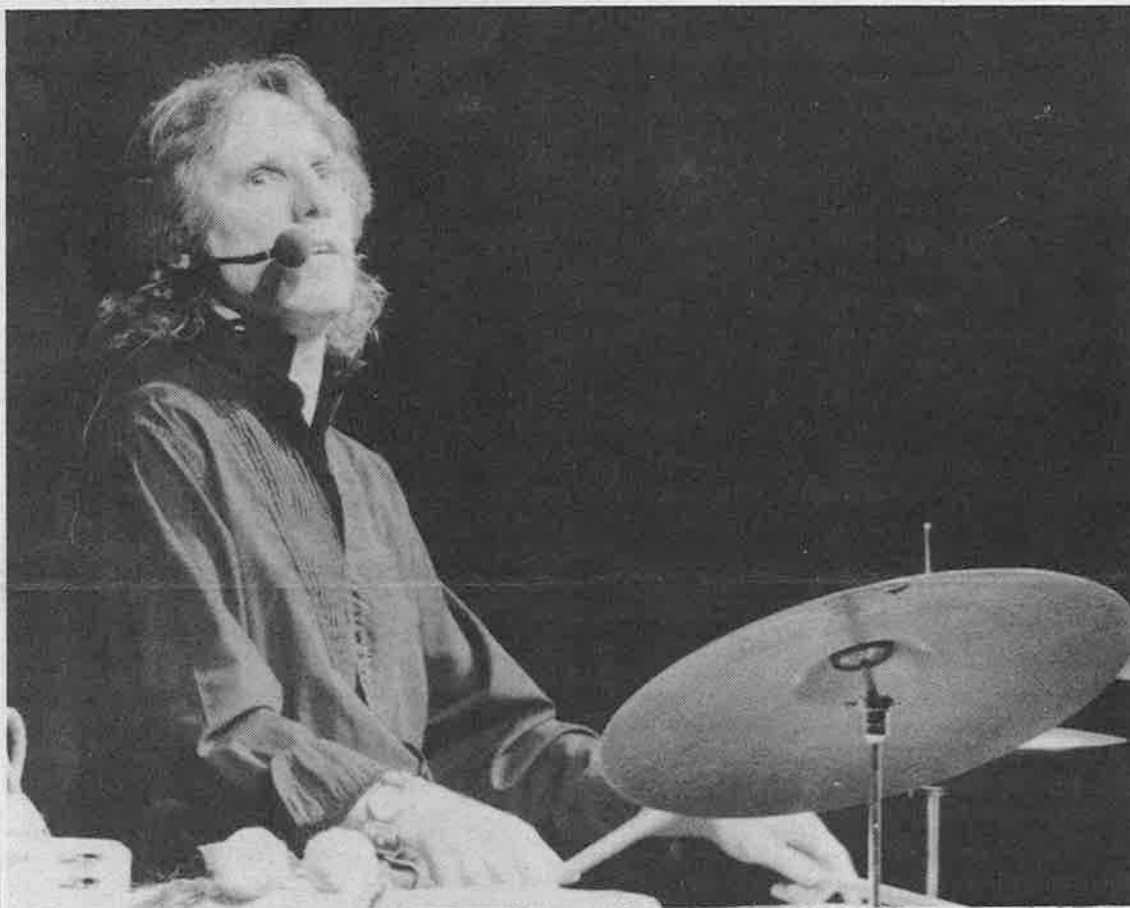

## Fast food on campus

District business officials are moving in the direction of bringing outside food vendors onto campus.

According to Vice Chancellor of Business, Jon Sharpe, nothing has been determined as of yet as to what vendors will be brought on to the campus, and which organization will run the program.

"The district is looking for an alternative to the current operation," said Sharpe.

According to Sharpe, there are many reasons behind the potential change. Shortened cafeteria hours and limited choices on campus are one concern. "We're looking at how to better meet the needs of the students," Sharpe said.

"Maybe the competition will lower prices," said Liberal Studies major, Kevin Knight.

Financial matters are a part of the issue. According to Sharpe, there has been "a bit of

an ongoing concern" as the district is now supporting the cafeteria, which has been losing money.

Sharpe believes that the potential advantages to bringing in outside vendors would be an increase in choices for students, expanded hours of opportunity, and upgraded facilities.

A meeting was held on March 8, in order to discuss requests for proposals. No proposals have been made yet. According to Sharpe, the possibility of having Fresno State take over the cafeteria and bring in vendors similar to what is currently offered on their campus may be a possibility. "Fresno State certainly would be an option," said Sharpe, "[but] there may be other private corporations."

According to Sharpe, everything is still preliminary stages, and no decisions will be made immediately.

Sharpe also stated that if outside organizations are brought in, "Yoshino's will remain as the sole oriental food vendor on campus."

## April is earthquake month

April is California Earthquake preparedness month, and is as good a time as any to ensure that you and your family are Earthquake ready.

The Governors Office of Emergency Services will kick off California earthquake Preparedness Month with a statewide "Earthquake: Duck, Cover and Hold" drill at 10:30 a.m. on April 2, when participating radio stations will broadcast an emergency transmission. Participants will then practice safety actions, such as ducking under a desk.

The first week of April will be devoted to general Earthquake preparedness. The following theme weeks will focus on Business and Industry Preparedness, school Preparedness, and Family and Community Preparedness, with a week devoted to each.

The theme this year is "Prepare! for the Quake," about how to survive the first 72 hours.

According to a pamphlet released by The Governors Office of Emergency Services, "the first 72 hours after an Earthquake are critical," because of the potential loss of electricity, gas, water, and telephones.

To prepare for an Earthquake, the Office recommends a week's supply of food, a gallon of water a day for each person stored in airtight containers, along with disinfectants to purify water if necessary. They also recommend a First Aid kit,

fire extinguisher, flashlights, tools, blankets, and clothing, along with a portable radio as a source of information. Extra batteries are also a must.

"If indoors, stay there..." as stated in the pamphlet. "If outdoors, get into an open area away from trees, buildings, walls, and power lines."

More than 2,500 Volunteers from around the state will be coordinating, creating, and conducting earthquake activities to promote awareness and safety.

Also playing will be Naked Aggression, Ditch Bank, Oakies, Hands Down, and IG88, not necessarily in that order. It will be two or three

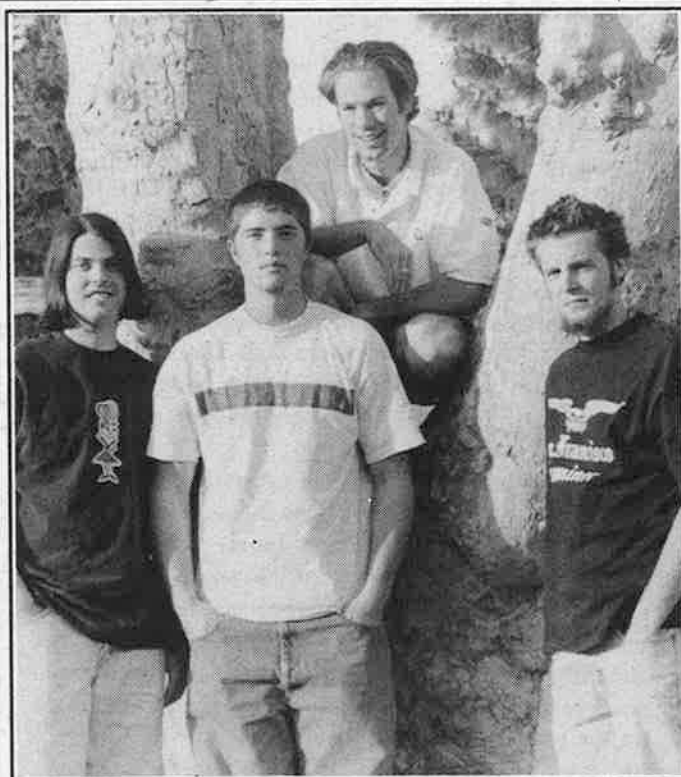

# Pianist Graces Philharmonic

The Fresno Philharmonic hosted Bella Davidovich, a Pianist originally from USSR. Her performance was graceful and elegant. I found myself drifting from scale to scale riding the rails between lucidity and conscious awareness. I became aware of how harmonic her playing is to the restless soul, enabling it to relax and cleanse oneself of tension.

The Fresno Philharmonic was more than complementary to Mme. Davidovich music. Mme. Davidovich was one of the Soviet Unions's pre-eminent artists, as well as one of the few women to be admitted to the inner circle of Russian cultural life. Entering the country more than a decade ago, and established herself as a keyboard artist. The debut at Carnegie Hall in Oct. 1979 to standing room only, was a

beginning to her career hurling upwards. With each year reaffirming to her devoted fans as to why they are there, she is truly one of the greats. At the age of 18 she entered the Moscow Conservatory, studying with Constantine Igumnov and Jacob Flier. 1949 winning the Chopin Competition in Warsaw, then going on to play with the Leningrad Philharmonic for 28 consecutive seasons. and a member of the Moscow Conservatory.

Mme. Davidovich is currently a member of The Juilliard School faculty.

This was my first time enjoying the greatness of the Fresno Philharmonic, much less Orchestrated Concert Music at this level. I thank God for giving man the intellect to create music and the ability to bring it to this forum for me. My love of music rages from Led Zeppelin, Black Sabbath and Iron Maiden to Tool,

Merlin Mason and Tori Amos, so go figure. If you've never been to a live Orchestrated Concert, then I highly suggest that you go see the Fresno Philharmonic.

Their music was powerfully brilliant. The violin and cello set the rhythm for the musical voyage. To begin with, the steady grind of the bow section may cause one to invision oneself of riding into battle upon his or her trusty steed and with cohorts armed for battle. With the rumbling of the trumpet percussion and bass trombone, seeing your foes approaching, and with an enormous, overwhelming grudging crash of the whole Orchestrated Concert, You meet your enemy on the field of battle.

Ten years ago, the world as we knew it was trying to do the Superbowl Shuffle.

After 60 teams with broken hearts and a million fans trying to lick their wounds after their team was eliminated from the tournament, four teams now focus and practice to keep their dream alive.

After embarrassing the Utah Runnin' Utes by more than 30 points, the Kentucky Wildcats followed that win up with a dismantling of the Wake Forest Deacons by 20 points.

Against Utah, the wildcats led 36-17 midway through the first half. They had little trouble keeping the full court pressure on by increasing their lead up to 33.

All American Tim Duncan of Wake Forest was hounded all afternoon by Kentucky's swarming defense. This resulted in a 38-19 advantage for the wildcats at halftime. The Cats maintained their lead and won 83-63.

Massachusetts Minutemen will meet Kentucky in the semi-finals on Saturday in a rematch of their first game of the season which the minutemen won 92-82.

The minutemen were in overdrive from the tip off in both games. They destroyed Arkansas from the beginning and never looked back.

Against Georgetown, Massachusetts took the early lead but the Hoyas stormed back and only trailed by Allen Iverson, who had 17 at half time.

Guard Carmelo Travieso tightened up his defense and made Iverson a non-factor. Massachusetts showed why they are ranked #1 in the nation after the first half. They came out of the gate with a 9-0 run and then ran away with an 86-62 victory.

In the other semi-finals, the Syracuse Orangemen are facing

the Mississippi St. Bulldogs.

Syracuse upset the Kansas Jayhawks and beat the Georgia Bulldogs in what was arguably the most exciting game of the tournament to reach the Final Four. Center John Wallace knocked down the game winner to give the Orangemen the win that set up their showdown with the Jayhawks.

Syracuse led all but five minutes of the game and managed to hang on despite going 3-7 from the charity stripe down the stretch in the 60-57 victory.

Mississippi State knocked off Big East champion Connecticut and then Cincinnati who played probably their poorest game of the season.

Massachusetts and Kentucky are the favorites to win the tournament but don't be surprised if Syracuse and Mississippi St. continue to pull off the upsets.

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
