

Parking on campus is an issue of debate among many students. While the availability of spaces is the cause of many complaints, parking permit disputes are becoming more and more common.

However, Moses did agree that each Officer has his own standards, and that some are more forgiving than others. While Moses will sometimes make exceptions for students who have a valid reason for not having a visible permit. others follow the guidlines meticulously. This often results in students recieving tickets even though they have a permit.

"It's unfair to those who have already paid for permits and they just go ignored," stated Mann.

After a power outage, rumored to have been caused by the electrical playfulness of a squirrel, FCC students were evacuated from their classes Friday, May 10 around 9:15 and were told to "go home."

The college Chief-of-Police, Ken Shrum, explained, "We have electrical problems and we're not sure if it's safe from fire." He said that the problem started in three main buildings- Student Services, Science building, and the Forum Hall. But he says that all of the buildings are effected because they have electricity.

When the transformer, which is located outside of campus, to the electrical circut blew, "it caused a sudden power decrease which acted like a power surge," said Shrum.

Although all classes were evacuated for the rest of the day, some teachers continued their classes outside. Physics and Math instructor, John Peterson, gave his Physics 4A class the option of taking the scheduled exam outside to replace one of their lower test scores. "It's a win, win situation for the students," said Peterson. Jermey Ervin, one of Peterson's students liked the arrangment. "I did better than I did on a different test."

The evacuation posed a more complicated problem for Peterson's other class held later in the day. "I'm going to change the nature of the final for that class." He rescheduled a smaller class to meet later that day off campus.

For those of you that are leaving FCC...good luck. Have fun.



Friend doesn't want to be just friends



Artists' dream to get paid for talent

The artistic world is no longer thought of as just paints and canvases, or large pieces of marble shaped into differing forms. Recently, a resurgence has occurred in the popularity of paneled art.

Fresno native and current resident of Independence, Missouri, David Finger, became interested in comics at a young age. After reading Transformers # 1, Finger slowly built up his comics collection to its current total of about 2,000. His collection consists of comics from Batman to G.I. Joe to X-Men. He now reads mostly dark and gritty books such as Shi and Lady Death.

Finger hasn't submitted art to any of the major comic book companies because he doesn't feel that his "art work is good enough yet." He is continuing to improve his talent by taking a College Master Art course through the International Correspondence School.

His interest in comics is also spurring him to succeed with his artwork so that he can eventually publish a title based on characters he has created.

Keith Holven, a graduate and valedictorian of Central High School, is studying the art of animation at the Academy of Art College in San Francisco. Holven attempted to enroll into some of the more prestigious art schools in California but was thwarted due to their portfolio require-

Holven also hasn't submitted art to any comic com-



panies, but that is due to his lack of interest. His staple is animation and hopes to get a job as an animator at Disney once he graduates.

Shop owner of both Fresno and Clovis' Heroes Comics and Cards, Dave Allread, thinks that it is hard for young artists to get noticed. "Only about 25 editors look at art...no matter how big the company," stated Allread.

Comic shops can also serve as a place for young artists to get their work sampled. When asked how often people come into his shop looking for artists, Allread said, "Once a month lately. And in January, two people get jobs."

Breaking into the comics business is not easy. "It's hard," Allread said, "that's the reason for little companies." According to Allread, at most, 20 percent of the art

gets looked at even if it is submitted correctly.

Wayne Barber of Wonderland Comics said, "At any level it's difficult; so many want to do it." In Barber's opinion, the main problem is that hundreds of thousands of aspiring artists want to get in.

Holven believes that "with an established title, it's easier to get in if you are a clone of the current artist. Unique styles sometimes scare the editors of a comic that has been around for awhile."

There are a lot of Jim Lee clones out there," stated Holven. He thinks that animation is a lot easier to get

"There are a lot of small companies out there, trying to compete with Disney," said Holven, "so that keeps salaries and the competition up."

Fashion trends of the Victorian Era

Fashion was as important to the Victorians as it is to society today. In the Victorian Era, fashion played a defining role in portraying a person's social status, moral character, and basic personal-

ity. The same statement could be made today about current fashion. Whether as an artistic display, or for utilitarian purposes, clothes are an extension of who we are and speaks of the times we live in.

The Fresno Metropolitan Museum's display of "Waists of Time: Fashion Trends of the

Victorian Era" traces the evolution of style through examples of nine vintage gowns.

The dresses on display will include examples of full skirts of the 1840's and the virtually obscene crinoline or caged skirts of the Civil War period. Further examples will include the bustled look of

the Watteau toilette of the 1870's and finally the s-curve at the turn-of-the-century. "We are all very pleased with the final appearance of "Waists of Time." It is always fun to look back in time and imagine what people were like. Through the vintage fashion in this exhibit, we get a privileged peak into the lives of 19th century people," stated Kimberly Cline, Registrar/Curator of the Met.

All of Victorian styles

All of Victorian styles had one thing in common—the emphasis of the cinched waist. In examining the corseted waist, "Waists of Time" will address the social history behind this fetish of Victorian fashion. In order for visitors to better understand the importance of the corset in Victorian Fashion, a few different types of corsets will be exhibited in conjunction with their corresponding styles of dress.

The corset may look like an instrument of torture to our twentieth century eyes, but it was a defining element in the role of women in Victorian society.

The size of a women's waist was a source of immense pride for some and the object of ridicule for others. By employing facts, humorous anecdotes, and period advertisements, this exhibit presents health issues, social concerns, and opinions on fashions of the time.

This exhibition will be on display in the 600 square foot Wishon Watson Gallery of the Fresno Metropolitan Museum from now until February 1st 1997.


