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Rams crush Pirates, maintain good season

FCC beats Modesto 119 to 84 By Ted Valverde

Fresno City College chalked up another victory On Saturday Jan. 25. The Rams took an early first period lead at 37-24 with 7:54 to go. By halftime, F.C.C. built the lead to 57-30.

Fresno's oncampus gym was about 3/4 filled with excited fans cheering for the Rams. There were a few scary moments when players from both teams took hard fouls and hit the floor, but theredidn't appear to be any serious injuries.

The Rams proved worthy of being ranked #2 in the state by crushing the Pirates with a final score of 119 to 84, improving their record to 19-3 on the season.

The #2 ranked Rams stayed in a first place tie at 5-1 in the Central Valley Conference with Porterville and 19-3 overall during the past week.

On Saturday, Jan. 18, Fresno City beat The College of Sequoias 77-62 behind Cory Powell's 17 points. Powell played for the injured Ron Selleaze.

The Rams followed that win with an impressive 76-49 victory over West Hills on Wednesday, Jan. 22, led by Fresno State bound Rafer Alston's 17 points, which included 5 for 5 behind the three point line.

FCC finished the week with a victory over Modesto College.

Larry Abney, another Fresno State bound athlete, scored 14 points and Ron Selleaze contributed 13 points and five rebounds.

The Rams then found holes in the Pirates' defense and went on to win the game with the help of Alston's 21 points and season high 21 assists.

Fresno City will continue their play tonight towards the league playoffs in a CVC bash against Kings River Community College at


