# The Rampage Politicians debate issues at FCC

ith the governor's race quickly approaching, some Fresno City College students feel the need to become more informed on the issues of the current political scene in California. On Monday, October 26, four representatives and one candidate for the California Gubernatorial office voiced their opinions and answered questions from the FCC audience in the theater. "I enjoyed listening to the candidates speak about issues that concern my life. Things like minimum wage, jobs, and crime are important issues in my life," said Jon Handly, 18.

The event took place from 12:00 p.m until 2:00 p.m. and included Fresno City's own Dr. Maurice Van Gerpen, from the Political Science Department, as its moderator. Among the representatives for candidates were party semi-officials of the Democrats, Republicans, Libertarians, and Greens. The only actual candidate who attended was Gloria La Riva, the Peace and Freedom nominee. The Natural Law party representative fooled the FCC audience by saying he would

attend but then failed to appear. "I don't know if I'd say my heart was broken, but I certainly do enjoy Natural Law," said Vong Mouanoutoua, 19.

number of businesses representing banks, agriculture and business exports attended the Ninth Annual International Business Conference October 15 at the Centre Plaza Holiday Inn, presented by the Fresno City College Export Center. The conference featured keynote speaker Richard Sklar, the United States ambassador to the United Nations.

According to Candy A. Hansen, the director of the FCC Export Center, the conference is designed to encourage businesses to export and strengthen the economy in California through international trade. "The conference has brought opportunities in terms of trade leads and networking (especially) when you get people together from different companies and different countries are learning from each other about the information and opportunities (of exporting)." replied Hansen on what the conference brought to the parties who attended.

The conference started at 8:00 a.m. with an address by Hansen followed by Export Outlook for 2000 with speaker Ann M. Veneman, secretary of the California Department of Agriculture. In the session, Veneman spoke about the importance of trade to agriculture in California. "One of the things we really emphasized was the importance of the global marketplace in today's environment. 96% of the world's population lives outside of the United States, so who were marketing to has to be on a global scale. We believe it's very important to continue to find and open up markets and promote trade which will benefit people here in the valley and it creates jobs when you export and overall it will be good for California's economy." said Veneman.

The conference also included a Export Round Table Session featuring State Center Community College District chancellor Bill F. Stewart as Moderator and corporate guests Richard Deiner of World-Wide Sires, John Rea of SWF Machinery, Jim Sonstegard of International Proteins Corporation (IPC), and Jim Zion of Meridian Nut Growers to

Audience members were allowed thirty minutes in which to ask questions they felt were relevant to the election. Many of the representatives avoided (or were unable to) answer the audience's questions when asked specific platform positions. "I asked a question which I thought was pertinent, but the Republican representative just went on and on about some other issue," said Sandor Nagy, 25.

Gloria La Riva consistently answered the questions posed to her and many that were not. The Peace and Freedom party is committed to socialization and self-determination. Rampantly anticapitalist, La Riva was born in New Mexico and now lives in San Francisco. "I ran for mayor of San Francisco a few years ago, and I also ran for the vice-presidency in 1996," said

In addition to political activism, La Riva is devoted to writing for the Workers World, a largely socialist and antiestablishment newspaper. "The Peace and Freedom Party is consistently ignored by the capitalist media. We have a duty to provide the people of the United States with more than a choice between two evils. Workers World and college newspapers are critical to changing the mindset of most Ameri-

cans," stressed La Riva.

La Riva is also campaigning for the Indian Gaming Proposition 5, which is designed to allow increased sovereignty of Native Americans on reservations. "The Peace and Freedom Party objects to the victimization of Native Americans and the racism which is inherent in the capitalist system." said La Riva.

Like many radical parties, The Peace and Freedom party would like to see grassroots operations at colleges. Most feel that the youth is the opportunity for change that is desperately needed in American society. "We currently have the problems in society which can spur and motivate the youth of this country to change the mindset of the capitalist system. Education, crime, poverty, oppression, all are issues which are inadequately dealt with in the farce of capitalism. Remember that opportunity for the only true change of society comes from the masses," said La Riva.

The Peace and Freedom party may someday establish itself as a pivotal force of American politics and society. For now, they're working on expanding party membership and spreading their ideas. any Fresno City College students find themselves looking for jobs, but most everyone is looking for a good one. With that in mind, everyone must arrange for the placement of applications, the location of the job, and the benefits of working here as opposed to there. Shopping for a good job does not seem to end, but due to a weekly job series televised every Monday night at 7:30p.m. on KVPT (Channel 18) it gets much easier.

This feature dedicates itself to getting the information to the heart of its viewers. With six segments and 5-6 minute interviews, the show proceeds to bring a hefty new feel to a sometimes standard format. Hosted by Colin Dougherty, the show provides telephone numbers and web site addresses. The vision of producer Bob Tyrcha is to talk about specific job openings in a casual fashion. If you miss the show on Monday, you can also catch it on Sunday afternoons at 1:30.

The October 26 show will focus on "Census 2000," and in the segment, viewers will be given information concerning all of the things that are needed to be counted. Specific items were noted, anything from cars, people, and even homes. "Everything needs to be counted," said Rick Michael George office manager for the Santa Maria Census department. Along with

# etober is Breast Cancer Month

One in eight women will develop breast cancer

in a life span of eighty years.

"Chances for breast cancer increase with age," said Marge Henry, Breast Cancer Educator for the Cancer Center at Saint Agnes. "After age 20, women need to do self monthly breast exams. If you are between the ages of 20-40 you should have a clinical exam every three years and every year after 40."

Nationally, breast cancer is the second leading cause of death for women, second only to lung cancer. In 1998, 19,005 women in California will be diagnosed with breast cancer. In Fresno County, 375 women will be diagnosed and 95 will die. (Source: American Cancer Society.)

Women with first degree relatives, such as mothers, sisters, aunts or grandmothers, have a higher chance

of developing breast cancer," said Henry. Factors for breast cancer include a family history of the disease, diet variations, early age of menstruation, late age of menopause, never having children, and giving birth at a late age. No one knows for sure what causes breast cancer in some women and not in others.

What we do know is that it affects all ages and races.

1 in 9 white, 1 in 11 African-American, and 1 in 20 Hispanic and Asian women will develop cancer. (Source: California Department of Health Services.)

The thought of breast cancer terrifies most women. They are forced to make decisions they'd rather not make. It changes the course of their lives and the lives of those around them.

"All the women in my family have died from some kind of cancer," said Melissa Schultz, local bartender. "My mother recently found a lump. It was the thought of losing the most precious person to me, my mother. It robs you quickly, very quickly."

Early detection is the best defense against breast cancer, and will increase your survival rate. If detected early, five-year survival rates are very high. Stage 0 women will have a normal life span. Five-year survival rates are as high as 95% when cancer is in Stage

When cancer falls into Stage II, survival rate are close to 70%. (Source: California Department of Health

This year, about 180,000 cases will be diagnosed and 44,000 women will die of this disease. Early detection could have saved these lives. "If you don't have any of the risk factors, that doesn't mean you won't

(IPC), and Jim Zion of Meridian Nut Growers to discuss world trade, the future of the economy in exporting goods and the possibility of tailoring products to accommodate cultural references and differences. On global layering, Dernier states: "Fifty years from now, the U.S. will not be the leading agriculture export. Milk could be exported from Eastern Europe in the next 100 years.'

After the session, the conference held a luncheon featuring speaker Ambassador Sklar, who sat alongside Mayor Jim Patterson. Serving under President Clinton, Sklar spoke about exporting in the valley and the true meanings of the U.N. which has more to do with economic standards in addition to providing peace and security for foreign countries. "The economic purpose of the U.N. is to make helping countries make themselves attractive for the private sector investor, for example, a secure environment, good governments, rule of law, respect for private property, open media and democracy." according to Sklar.

The U.N. has an organization (International Labor Organization) that does everything to operate the World Intellectual Property Organization, which is the defender of U.S. patented copyrights in Geneva. We are still the greatest producer of technological innovation in the world." Sklar adds on the U.N.'s economical benefits. The ILO for many years was essentially from the U.S. standpoint, a tool for the AFL-CIO (Labor Union Organizations) to deal with the unfree labor unions in Eastern Europe. Now, the ILO has a totally different role, American businesses care about wages overseas and not just to find low-income sources of business. We want to see the income level of those

workers rise, so we can produce more here, so our workers here can be employed, so we don't want to export jobs.'

Sklar also states that the U.N. is composed of 15 leaders representing various countries on discussing "war and peace" issues on the countries with an uncertain future. "Nothing (in the world) can happen without us (having final say)." Sklar adds. "From the time of the beginning with Russia, we reached impasse, allowing the Russian and the Chinese leader to work on every issue. There's a lot of debate and a lot of fuss, but it works and works well.



Goo Goo Dolls dizzy up success with sixth album

arlier this year, the movie City of Angels was released, and with it a hit soundtrack. Copfies flew off store shelves. A major reason for the rush was the appearance on the CD of the Goo Goo Dolls' alternative ballad "Iris," which topped the charts immediately and is even now still receiving much airtime on both radio and MTV.

Now, a few months later, "Iris" is making another appearance, this time on the Goo Goo Dolls' new album, Dizzy Up the Girl. The album also contains another single, "Slide," which itself is gaining popularity on the radio. Lines from the song like "What you feel is what you are and what you are is beautiful" exemplifies the lyrical skill of the band, with the sweet honesty that has seen them through six albums.

The first Goo Goo Dolls album, self-titled, was released in 1987. # Fine performances free Beloved

The impact of what the heritage of slavery in the United States brought to African Americans is unnerving. Toni Morrison, the acclaimed author and Nobelprize winner, developed the story of a former slave who was haunted by the brutality and merciless hardship of a white America.

This amazing story was magically transformed into a film directed by Jonathan Demme. A true gem to all who watch her, Oprah Winfrey produced Beloved and stars in it. Winfrey delivers a triumphant and bold performance, portraying a former slavenamed Sethe. Beloved takes place in Ohio after the Civil War. Sethe (Winfrey) is an escaped slave who is haunted by the hell that slavery ruled over her.

Because of her horrendous past, Sethe vows to herself that her children will never live the life she did. She keeps her family isolated from the rest of the world. But soon, young Denver (Kimberly Elise) is faced with the need to get out, and take on whatever lies ahead.

Sethe, along with having escaped slavery, has a haunting memory that can't seem to leave her. It is an unnerving and eerie moment in the film when the truth of what Sethe did to save her children comes out. It is the compassion and undying love that a mother has for her children that would drive her to do anything to keep her children form enduring hell.

Danny Glover impeccably plays the easygoing

Sethe, who after eighteen years surprisingly walks back into Sethe's life. Sethe and Paul D soon form a relationship and find comfort in each other while they reflect on their days in "sweet home." The day comes when Paul D must leave Sethe, but even then she tells him that his absence won't make her fold. Glover gives Paul D a charm and sense of serenity, and there is an uplifting solitude that he brings to Sethe and Denver's life.

I was taken back and frozen when Thandie Newton appeared as Sethe's daughter Beloved, the most challenging role of the film. Newton took on this arduous task, breathing life into the whole essence of Beloved. Her performance was simply spellbinding. At one moment, Newton's face would be wrinkled and transfixed into a mold of anger and confusion, as if she were mentally disabled, and then all in one second she transforms herself into a beauty, much like a flower that should never be picked. I see an Academy Award being "belovedly" handed to Newton in March.

Everyone will have their own opinions about Beloved. There are instances when the film takes a few twists and turns that may leave the viewer a bit baffled, although reading the novel by Toni Morrison may help to understand it more. This film captures the horrors that leave everlasting scars upon the slaves of that period in time. Times have changed, and it is good to recognize it and be grateful. But it is also good to never forget what hate and ignorance did do, and the toll it takes on those afflicted. This film recognizes and carries out this message through an awesome and highly encapsulating cast.

What happens when a big theater eats up all the audience?

riving north toward Yosemite, you can choose to veer off Freeway 41, contingent on the mesmerizing purple and red neon Edward's Cinema complex. Wholistically contained around the 21screen theater floorplan, it is best described as a glimmering advancement to applaud a perfect Hollywood atmosphere.

Crunched beneath a typical Saturday's foot count of more than 10,000 patrons is the 50,000 square ft. carpet montage. The screens are curved so the movie is looking at you, no matter where you sit, maybe signifying that you are the most important person in the room.

Eric McCarthy, General Manager at Edward's, listed the self-imposed priority of drastically improving the customer relationship, even until total satisfaction. Even with the over exaggerated rumors that Edward's has the error ratio of 9:10, the statistical reality is quite minimal, 5-10/700.

McCarthy made it clear that the community involvement programs have been vastly unreported, that is, what Edward's personally gives back to the community. Churches, help groups and other non-profit organizations write to Edward's on a continual basis, requesting support for a function to bring their people

Even through a respected positive media presence, keeping the excitement and charisma that a \$20,000,000 illustration based entertainment arena in prime condition is absolutely mandatory. The business curtails to your enjoyment, you should have an overwhelming good feeling until the minute you leave. Maintenance keeps things attractive, here people are looking for a reason to disapprove and voice their opinion.

at Fresno City College. Echaniz works at the UA Theater on Villa, which was the former district office before Broadway Faire came about. After a tour of the facilities, he introduced me to the only 70mm film projector in Fresno. This was an attributing factor to profit potential, due to the fact that Star Wars was made available in 70mm film negatives, and no one else had the capabilities of displaying what could have been marketed as twice the clarity of any other theater in Fresno.

Among Star Wars obsessed fans, it would have been a large turn out, but they opted not to go that direction. Theater #8 has the potential to be the absolute best in Fresno, due to the number of speakers, the power of the amplifiers and the sheer volume abilities. Fit with THX, it is not a cheap system to maintain. THX has monthly dues, and an initial setup that is a little high priced, but some say it is worth, experiencing the mind of George Lucas.

Even though the Edwards Theater has dramatically reduced the number of people, most theaters seem to agree that the Concession Stand has improved. Fewer people in line makes it that much more attractive, and the cleanliness and quality seem to be raised, more time to focus on excellence. However the United Artist theaters closest to Edwards, didn't survive, not solely based on sales, but mainly questions concerning reno-

The Barstow/Blackstone UA-4 had been planed for closure, but they went ahead and tried to establish a discount movie house. They tried it for sistant Manager John Echaniz, a student here a couple of weeks, but it still needed improvements

for easier handicapped accessibility, and it proved too expensive, and too close to Edward's. The Northgate shopping center UA, was a popular independent film location, specializing in foreign and rare films, but the lease was up, and it also would have cost too much to improve. Since UA Villa is in Clovis, the Clovisians seem to return here or to Sierra Vista simply out of convenience.

Sierra Vista Mall has some big advancements and plans for the existing theater, and the addition of a 12 screen, stadium seating based movie house within the mall, and be the only mall in the central valley with that luxury. All theaters including the Edward's cinema, experienced a 20-30% drop in attendance, predictably and not alarmingly due to the Big Fresno Fair. Business at Sierra Vista's UA, is equal to the Villa location.

Michelle Chavez assistant Manager for the Sierra Vista United Artists Theater said, "Broadway Faire stole Northgate's and Barstow's clientele... Edward's confirmed a loss that was already there." The Sears addition has sparked incentive to build the additional theater just 15 minutes North of where the highest millionaire per capita in Fresno exists.

Since the closest movie theater to the south valley is Manchester UA, they anticipate it to remain open, even if rumor has it that a private theater is built within Manchester Center Mall. As in conclusion with Villa, Sierra Vista's concession stand has improved per capita as well.

An outsider to the improvement oriented progression minded theater, would be the West Star Cinema known to Fresno as MANN; Festival,

Regency and Fig Garden. They have chosen not to publicly announce any refurbishment, have cut hours, and seem to be waiting for freeways and other theaters to get it out of their system.

Neil Barbo, Assistant Manager at Regency Cinema, wouldn't acknowledge rumors of a 12 theater state of the art cinema inclined to compete with Broadway Faire. And would further not comment on whether they planned on renovating the Regency Theater, or close it down. He claimed that the Big Fresno Fair did not really affect the business, and after what I had heard from all other theaters, it makes me wonder why there was no drop?

The only improvement that has been made, was a couple years ago. Just before Star Wars: A New Hope was released, they added surround sound. As much to be expected the concession stand increased, per capita, and is third in the state of all Mann Theaters. The real heart breaker is when they blamed the lack of quality films in the genre, but it is a factor that is par-

Having just finished the novel by Alice Hoffman on which the film was based, I was excited to see how the silver screen would revamp the magical tale of two enchanting sisters. Tormented as children for being witches, the sisters swear off witchcraft as adults and go their separate ways. Gillian runs away to elope as soon as she is old enough, and goes through men like there is no tomorrow.

Sally stays in her hometown and soon falls in love herself and marries-although her husband's life is cut short by a traffic accident, and she finds herself alone to raise her own two little girls.

Gillian soon finds trouble with the current man she loves, an abusive, alcoholic Transylvanian-cowboy named Jimmy (Goran Disnjc). She enlists the help of Sally to get away from him, but he kidnaps them and threatens Gillian's life. Victories over Sierra and West Valley assured the Rams a berth in the State Dual Meet Championships where they will meet the Southern California Champion on November 14.


