FCC's Theus bound for Oregon State

☐ FCC's Robert Theus becomes second Ram this year to accept Division I football scholarship

When Robert Theus was in high school, his varsity coach gathered the team during practice and told them, "Look around. Only three of you guys will ever go on to play football at a four-year college." Robert looked around at his friends and teammates and wondered if he would be "one of the lucky ones." He knew that he'd have to work that much harder and vowed from that day to put in the effort.

On Feb. 4, two days before his 20th birthday, The Fresno City College sophomore lineman signed his letter of intent to attend the Pac-10's Oregon State University.

"[Theus] was one of the first players to be recruited and we're happy to sign him," said OSU's offensive line coach and recruiter Jim Gilstrap. "Robert's a fine athlete, as well as a fine person and we're really looking forward to having him."

With his 4.9 (40-yard) speed, National Football League scouts will be watching the 6'4", 270 pounder, running downfield, pulling on end-arounds and leading blocks downfield for the next two seasons.


"I'm excited," said Theus, who will major in communications. "When I get there I expect to be ready. I'm real appreciative about everything... things have been going so good for me, it's truly been overwhelming. Sometimes I just sit down and cry to myself. It's truly a blessing from God."

Makin' moves

As a child, Theus and younger sister Christy grew up in a single-parent household, living in a crime-plagued area of East Fresno. He admits that not having his father around much made him envious of his friends and classmates who shared dad-son relationships.

To stop Theus from getting in to trouble, his mother bussed him across town to Ahwahnee Middle School, hoping the change would do him some good. After-school athletics gave him the opportunity to be around male role

After a year of quarterbacking Hoover High School's freshman football team, upper-division coaches told Theus to be ready to call signals for the varsity squad as a back-up. But as a sophomore, coaches changed their minds and thought he would serve the team better as a tight-end. Although Theus' receiving duties were a plus, all eyes were on him as a big blocker. As a junior and senior, Theus earned NYL All-League honors and was selected to play in Fresno's Annual City-County All-Star

No proposed fee increases

Inspirational speaker opens eyes, ears of FCC community

The motivational speaker's visit to the Fresno City College theater on Feb. 4 made a lasting impression on the student-body, faculty and guests that attended her powerful speech.

In 1986 Lonise Bias watched her son Len graduate from their home state's University of Maryland and exit the National Basketball Association draft as the Boston Celtics #1

Len never played a minute in the Boston Garden. Before dawning the famous kellygreen and white Celtic uniform, Len died from an irregular heartbeat due to a drug overdose.

Four years later, Dr. Bias tragically lost another son, Jay, who was killed during a drive-by shooting.

Dr. Bias choose not to speak about either loss, but instead told the capacity crowd, "I come to challenge you today!"

Her speech entitled "Young People of America," was highlighted by four different points: to love everyone, to build a bigger and better nation, offend no man and their own religion, race, color, or background, and found her first applause as she exclaimed, "I care nothing about what you all think of me."

Bias stated that the losses in her life have taught her valuable lessons and that she is happy to have the opportunity to speak, especially during African-American History Month.

"I love my people," said Bias. "We have been through some hard times, but we're going to come up and do better."

Bias went on to tell the crowd, "You're not prepared to write the year 2000 yet. Get used to hard times and difficulty. It only builds you up... I chose hard and painful challenges to maximize my potential and learn about life. Get over it!.. I've been to hell and back and I am 25 times the woman I thought I was."

Bias — who received an Honorary Doctrine of Education from Anna Maria College in Paxton, Massachusetts—has spent the past 11 years traveling with her husband, speaking to a wide variety of groups.

FCC's African-American Studies professor Kehinde Solwazi was one of the many impressed with Dr. Bias' speech. "I wish that we had [speaker forums] every week, mandatory," said Solwazi. "In five years the city of Fresno would be transformed."

Financial Aid Applications will be accepted from January 1,1998 through June 30,1998. Every application will be awared on a first-come first-served basis and subject to availability.

FCC Students Speak Out — A Rampage Survey

On Jan. 22, Newsweek magazine reported that the independent counsel spearheaded by Kenneth Starr is investigating President Bill Clinton on the grounds of possible obstruction of justice proceeding to a case of sexual misconduct with then 21-year old White House intern Monica Lewinsky. If Starr finds evidence that the President indeed asked Lewinsky and fellow White House staff members to commit perjury, it is grounds for possible impeachment.

The Rampage tackled the issue by surveying 100 Fresno City College stu-dents and asking them: "If the allega-tions are true that President Clinton obstructed justice, should he be impeached?" 36 out of 100 students who participated said yes, while 64 students disagreed.

"President Clinton has been accused throughout his presidency of wrongdo-ings," states one FCC student who chose to remain anonymous, "yet no solid evi-

dence has been brought against him." The majority of Democrats polled see this as nothing more than a "façade," a "conspiracy" and consider it "none of our business." One student blames the media for this situation, stating "The press has made our country the laughing stock of the world. With patriots like them, who needs enemies?"

On the pro-impeachment side, many Republican students polled feel this is the continuing saga of the President's inability to tell the truth. "If he used his power to persuade sexual favor, then he should be punished," claimed one FCC student. Another student stated he should be impéached "Because he allegedly done something wrong and is demising America and the foundations and the principles it was built upon." Other students feel that despite the allegations, he is guilty. The majority of students polled felt he is guilty, but will not be punished for his actions.

Yoshino's Restaurant below the Rampage office has the best chicken combination dinner I have ever tasted.

Except for the fact that Rampage Business Manager Sam Yuk asked me if I wanted the rest of his lunch the other day. I would have never made this statement.

To my way of thinking there is nothing worse than eating under-done chicken, but Yoshino's chicken is superbly done.

Food is of an intense interest in my life. I have worked in a variety of food establishments from McDonalds to Klein's Truck Stop in the Fresno area. Restaurants such as Smokey's on Parkway Drive, Shalimar at First and McKinley and Herb's Joint at Fresno and Shaw Avenues no longer exist, but the wealth of experience gleaned from working in those places I still use.

I cried a little when I read in the Fresno Bee that Old Fresno Hofbrau was closing it's doors, possibly forever. It irks me that good places to sit down and eat something are getting harder to find. Cooking professionally has been reduced to opening packages, mixing in a prescribed amount of water and heating the food on a stove or in a microwave. Most of the creativity has been removed from the job.

Fast food has become all the rage as Fresno expands to the northeast and northwest. It's much easier to call out for a delivery of pizza or Chinese and watch a movie on your TV than it is to pack up the wife and kids and take them out to dinner and a movie.

STARVING STUDENTS RICE-A-RONI

- -A good handful of spaghetti, or about
- -4 oz. angle hair pasta
- -2 cups long grain white rice
- -1 cube butter or margarine
- -Whatever left-overs you have half of a chicken or some cubed roast
- -Any vegetable, but potatoes are mandatory
- -4 cups beef or chicken soup stock
- -1 medium diced yellow onion
- -1 medium green bell-pepper

Lightly brown broken-up pasta in a large cast iron skillet in the butter or margarine. Pour in the rice and stir until all the rice has been browned. Turn the heat down on the stove to medium. Add left-overs, vegetables and meat (leave out if you are a vegetarian). Add soup stock and stir. Taste the liquid portion and add seasonings as needed to suit your taste. Cover and simmer for 20 minutes or place mixture in microwavable container and cook at a medium-high setting for 40 minutes. Serves about 6 people (if they're not too hungry).

There were many great events and speakers here at FCC and the community celebrating African American History month.

The month began with an opening ceremony Feb. 2, 1998 at 10:00 a.m. in the FCC

theater. Many of the instructors allowed their students to attend this great event during class time. Dr. Isaac Okim, an instructor of African History, opened the program with an electrifying talk on Ancestral Libations. What do Smokey and the Bandit and Tommy Boy have in common? They were comedies that allowed intelligence and logic to take a back seat to stupidity and went on to make millions of dollars. Established film critics refer to this trend as "the dumbing down of American movies." The latest movie to cash in on the "non-intelligent genre" is SpiceWorld starring those five imports from England: the Spice Girls — five feisty females from London who march to the beat of their own drum and signify their names by the personalities they represent.

The girls consist of Posh Spice (Victoria Adams), who is known for her low-cut Gucci dresses and ladylike persona, Ginger Spice (Geri Halliwell), known for her acid-tongue candor and sensual personality, Scary Spice (Melanie Brown), known for her pierced tongue and freak-of-nature personality, Sporty Spice (Melanie Chisholm), known for her tomboyish antics and her fascination with soccer, and Baby Spice (Emma Bunton), the youngest member and the only blonde of the group. Their motto is "Girl Power" which stands for the freedom and liberation of women to believe in themselves, be proud of who they are, never allow a man to make you feel beneath them and that true friendship never dies.

The basis of the film deals with the "Fab Five" (did I actually print that?) touring around the world performing their hits like "Wannabe" and "Spice Up Your Life." This catches the eye of a Hollywood producer (George Wendt)

painted on it, which contains a dressing room for the girls and a secret roomrun by the band's overprotective manager (Richard E. Grant).

As for the film's wisecracks, try this: When Posh can't decide what dress to wear for the next engagement, Sporty taunts her by stating "What you can't decide on is whether you're choosing to wear the little Gucci dress, the little Gucci dress, or the little Gucci dress." "Exactly!" replies Posh. Baby intercedes by stating "I think you should wear the little

Gucci dress."

Some of the film's funnier moments take place in their "Flash Forwards" (as opposed to flashbacks). For example, what would happen if the Spice Girls became mothers, why Baby Spice is always treated like a baby, and what would happen if a court injunction kept them from recording any more songs (which features an amusing cameo by Stephen Fry as the judge). Other amusing moments include a photo shoot which features the girls imitating one another and a military dance scene that spoofs Full Metal Jacket and M*A*S*H. Listen to the girls as they perform a self-indulgent cheer that parades "Girl Power" and a Wonderbra.

If SpiceWorld has any intangibles, it's largely due to the film's non-credible villain (Mark McKinney), who's more of a foaming spitter than a deranged psychopath. As stated before, this is a movie with a plot NOT INTENDED FOR CLOSE SCRUTINY!

Throughout the movie, the girls' acting is basically one-note. Their characters are about as fleshed-out as the Monkees. Posh is prissy, Ginger is outspoken, Scary is inquisitive, Sporty is a tomboy and Baby is a child.

The supporting cast includes Alan Cumming, Meat Loaf and Roger Moore and cameos by British imports Elton John, Bob Geldof, Bob Hoskins and Elvis Costello.

SpiceWorld has about as much class and subtlety as a Rocky and Bullwinkle cartoon and it's uneven but never boring. There's enough zip in this movie to satisfy fans who believe the Spice Girls are the best actresses since Bacall, Hepburn, Hayworth, Streep and Goldberg. For others, it's an OK 90-minute time filler. To celebrate Alternative Tentacles 100th record release founders Greg Werekman, John Yates and Otto Furbrain, along with bands and friends of the AT label, created the Virus 100th compilation album.

By the looks of the album you would think that it is a tribute to the defunct Bay Area punk icons the Dead Kennedys, mainly because all the covers are of Dead Kennedys songs. Werekman, Yates and Furbrain think differently. "It's a tribute to music born in the spirit of independence. We feel these 16 artists on this compilation, as well as the Dead Kennedys, have made original music without compromising to the latest trends or economic goals of the music industry around them."

Being a long time fan of the Dead Kennedys, I was skeptical about who could do these songs as well as them. While listening to it, I found out that it's not the song itself that makes this album, but rather the style each band gave them.

For those still loyal to "death metal," you will find the glorious fury of earaches, Napalm Death, applying their whirlwind drums, brutal guitars, and harsh vocals to "Nazi Punks" If that doesn't fulfill your needs, Brazilian band Sepultura apply their raging power of

Musick leaves record of excellence



In 1966, FCC football assistant Bill Musick accepted the position as the Rams head wrestling coach with the intention of filling in for one year, as the school searched for a qualified candidate to replace the successful Hans Wiedenhofer. Thirty-two years and 247

wins later, Musick leaves behind a solid foundation and even bigger shoes to fill.

On Jan. 22, FCC Athletic Director Ron Scott and administraofficials tive joined Musick during a school press conference to inform the media that the long time coach was resigning — although the decision was being made over the course of the 1997 season, traveling with the team.

Musick will continue to teach classes in the physical education department and will still carry

an important role with the wrestling pro-

The Madera native wants to experience life away from the everyday rigors and demands that come with maintaining the high-levels of competition.

"I thought about it over the past couple of years," said Musick, a graduate and former football player at Fresno State. "Things you think about when you're driving at 2 AM, in the fog, coming home [from tournaments]. I was 12 years old, last time I was able to do anything in the fall. Now I have some grandchildren to spend time with and

During his tenure with the Rams, Musick won 17 team conference titles, 12 Northern California championships, four state titles, while compiling a winning percentage of .832, (247-50-5).

Praise, from his friends and colleagues, is a subject not hard to find.

"When you think of wrestling, you think of coach Musick," said Scott. "He's a credit to the coaching profession."

FCC's Dr. Daniel Larios considers Musick "the best wrestling coach in California."

Besides the great team success, Musick has helped 25 individuals win state titles in their respective weight divisions and many have found similar success at Division I schools.

For the first time in school history, 1997 saw four City wrestlers bring home individual state championships: twotime winner Paris Ruiz, Tom Gohde, William Brown, and Jonte Davis, all sophomores and ready to enter fouryear universities.

Former Ram state champion and City assistant coach Robert Arballo is an expected candidate for the vacant head coaching position - which is to be made open publicly before March. Musick will be on the selection committee to hire his successor. Applicants for the opening are expected to be ranging from a local to national interest level, once the job is offered for full-time status.

"Who ever takes over the job...the house is not going to be empty," said

"There's a lot of people on this campus and everybody's important. From the secretary in admissions, to the sports equipment manager, to the dean, everybody's important. I love this school...It's a great school to work at."



slow start losing 7 of their first 10 games against tough tournament competition, the Lady Rams have caught on fire against the rest of the Central Valley Conference.

FCC, the defending conference champion, rides a perfect 11-0 CVC record into the last week of the regular season which ends on February 21, at College of the Sequoias.

Butler has one well while taking over the point duties; Ventura-transfer Summer Sawtelle and sophomore Miriam Sanchez have also rotated important minutes during the winningstreak; 6'3 freshman center and crowd-favorite, Katie Scott is improving, with time coming off the bench.

The Rams final regular-season home game is Wednesday, February 18, against Merced College.


The Women's Regional Tournament opens play March 3 - the Rams are expected to be seeded, around the middle of the pack.



The lack of able bodies in '97 called for Theus to shift his big frame to another spot, this time on the defensive line. Settled in? Hardly.

The '97 Ramteam was putting up inconsistent formances. Position switches, players quitting and key injuries led to a disappointing 3-7 finish, where Theus thought he was lost in the middle of the shuffle. "One day I was getting so frustrated I thought about red-shirting," said Theus.

After two years of playing three positions and special teams, Theus had to reinventhimself in the eyes of college recruiters who now not only didn't know "what he was," but "where he was."
