The six-month nationwide search to find a replacement for the State Center Community College District's chancellor enters its final phase next Wednesday when Dr. Judith A. Redwine officially succeeds Dr. Bill Stewart. Stewart fourteen years

According to SCCCD Board of Trustees president Les Thonesen: "It was the most thorough search that I've ever been on for (the hiring) of a chancellor."

With help from a twenty-two panel committee, approved by the Board of Trustees, the search got un- five and then sent the candiderway.

"The Chancellor Search Committee consisted of community people, board members, the administration, faculty, staff and students." Thonesen said. "Twenty people applied for the position, with the committee narrowing it down to eight. After the candidates were interviewed, the committee narrowed it down to

According to Thonesen, the qualifications the trustees looked for in a chancellor were "a visionary leader, a person with community college administration experience, and someone who will work well with students, faculty, administration, community and business people."

After the five candidates (including FCC president Dr. Dan Larios) were screened and interviewed in an open forum, the trustees chose the

Moline, Illinois college president as their new chancellor. Serving at Black Hawk Community College since 1994, Redwine was "well respected with the students and staff over there, according to the three board members who went to the college," said Thonesen.

Thonesen described Redwine in the interview process as "very articulate, personable and a hard worker." He quickly notes that all five candidates were "excellent" in the interview process "for they all displayed different strengths."

Farrelly's Outside Providence lacks focus, humor

Outside Providence, the new comedy from Peter Farrelly, co-author of There's Something About Mary, chronicles the misadventures of Timothy Dunphy (Shawn Hatosy of The Faculty). Fondly nicknamed "Dildo" by his father, Timothy

struggles to find life after mischief.

With his head spinning from drugs, alcohol, and the constant pursuit of females well out of his reach, Timothy is an immature teen, obsessed with doing nothing, and doing it well.

Making one bad choice after another, Timothy, while high on drugs, crashes into a parked police cruiser, earning himself a senior year at Cornhall Prep School.

Once at prep school, Timothy wastes no time involving himself with the wrong crowd, earning a school record for punishment. His best friend through all this is Jack Wheeler (Gabriel Mann), a pot smoking preppie, whose character is a rip-off of every teen comedy since *Animal House*.

Unfortunately for Timothy, his eyes fall on a beautiful female classmate, Jane Weston (Amy Smart), way out of his league. And as to be expected, he catches a lucky break, and winds up in the arms of young Jane.

Its here, that the film has

no idea where it is going. Many well crafted plot lines have been constructed: Timothy's quirky relationship with his father, his pursuit of Jane, being rebellious with his buddies at school, as well as trying to help his roommate Irving, outgrow the nickname "Jizz".


Yet for some reason the plot turns to Old Man Dunphy's (Alec Baldwin) friend Joey's homosexuality (George Wendt). This scene has absolutely nothing to do with the film, and seems to be an afterthought tossed in to break up the dreary scenery with comic relief.

After a few short intermissions with Timothy's father's friends, the plot abandons all direction yet again and focuses on Timothy becoming a bookworm to please Jane. After receiving acceptance to Brown University, Jane's life is on the fast track and Timothy stops studying as if a chunk of the script blew away with the wind.

In the wannabe dramatic Oscar moment, Timothy's only trusty boyhood friend, Drugs Delaney, dies in a car accident and Timothy must face the reality of death. At the funeral, Timothy is disgusted by his old boyhood friends, whom as a eulogy proclaim how much Drugs could party. Disturbed by their comments, which seemed appropriate for a guy named "Drugs", in fact he probably couldn't have written himself a better eulogy, Timothy takes off into the distance, fleeing back to Cornwall.

Once again, the plot has no direction, so instead of picking up where it left off, the plot starts anew. In the midst of a drug and alcohol filled party, good old Jack Wheeler strikes a deal with the dean, to turn in his drug buddies, for a letter of recommendation to Yale.



With last season's top runner, Michael Kasahun, now at the University of Oregon, the team still looks to attain its goal of





Dear San Sierra,

I was working at a local department store and started dating this guy. Then, I got pregnant by him a few months ago. When I told him I was pregnant, he went crazy. I started showing. He started spending all his time with his friends. When I talked to him, he said that I was "trying to tie him down." He started talking to another girl. I confronted him and he pushed me and then slapped me. I called the police and they came out and took a report. We've fought ever since. He came home one night and told me he didn't want to be with me anymore. He threw me out of the apartment right before I gave birth to our two twin daughters. He won't pay any child support to take care of his kids. What can I do? What are my rights? Thanks, Stephanie M.

DEAR STEPHANIE,

Parents are obligated to provide financial support in raising children. Housing, food, and medical care must be provided for children by law. Your boyfriend may not want a relationship with you, but he is financially responsible to provide for the financial obligations of raising the children. You may want to consider going to court to get Child Support, Custody, Visitation, and other orders by petitioning the court to address the issue. You certainly do have a financia responsibility to take care of your children's needs. But, your ex girlfriend does not have the right to use the children as "bargaining chips." Remember, Child Support is different from Visitation. Sometimes mothers believe that you're purchasing you kids on payments. Fortunately, this is absolutely false.

If your ex isn't allowing Visitation, then, you may want to petition the court to establish a Parenting Plan, Visitation, and Child Suppor arrangements. We at SAN SIERRA can assis you in preparing your documentation if you don't have the budget to hire an Attorney.
