## Midwestern Girl Makes Good:

### Q & A with new SCCCD Chancellor Dr. Judith Redwine

When Judith A. Redwine initially entered the chancellor's office on September 15, she did so prepared for the awesome challenges of her new position. Meeting with staff members from the Board of Trustees, visiting the campuses she will oversee, and satisfying press appointments, including those by the Rampage.

Until her selection as Chancellor, Redwine served as President of Black Hawk College in Moline, Illinois; and as Vice President/Chancellor of Indiana Vocational Technical College (now, Ivy Tech). She also was Academic Program Officer for the Indiana Commission for Higher Education and a faculty member and administrator for South Bend's Indiana University.

In preparation for her duties as State Center Community College District's Chancellor, the "newest kid on the block" spoke to the Rampage of past responsibilities and why she vied for the chancellor position. She also has words of advice for FCC's students.

RAMPAGE: Congratulations Dr. Redwine on being selected SCCCD's new chancellor. Having served Black Hawk College as president for the past five years, tell us a little bit about your former college.

REDWINE: Black Hawk College is a comprehensive Community College that serves as a successful transfer institution. We featured a variety of vocational technical programs; we also had continuing education and business and industrial train-

ing. We've put a tremendous amount of effort into addressing the needs of people who are currently employed, but whose skill capacities will need to be upgraded if we are to meet the demands of the new

dent of Black Hawk when I received a call from Jim Tatum who spearheaded the search for the ACCT (Association of Community College Trustees) with the SCCCD. Jim called me on numerous occasions and

millennium. This college also features an international trade and training center, transitional programs for students who are in some sort of transition in their lives. The programs ranged from High School for Kids at Risk to Adult Basic Education; English as a Second Language and Women in Technology, just to name a few. In those ways, Black Hawk College is very much like the SCCCD.

RAMPAGE: When did you first get word of the opening for the new chancellor position, and given your success at Black Hawk College, why did you decide to vie for the position?

**REDWINE:** I'll admit that I was happily minding my own business as presi-

tried to encourage me on various positions, and so when this position became available I asked what he thought I can bring to it. He indicated that the needs for this position were a "good match" for my gifts. I came to Fresno for the interview and each time I

came, my recognition of the "good match" really grew. When Mr. Tatum determined I was a "good fit" for this district, I realized that this was the next place for me to work.

RAMPAGE: What have you been told about the SCCCD's predecessor, Dr. Bill Stewart, and in your estimation, how good a job do you think he did, and what are your primary goals as chancellor?

REDWINE: Dr. Stewart has done a tremendous job and that is recognized not only locally, but nationallly. He is well recognized in his development of managing the business and administrative sides of the district. He left the district in very fine shape financially and that is to his credit because you can't say that about every other California district. In the Midwest, I've been repeatedly told: "Don't go to California for they're financially strapped." Bill, however, was a good manager and left the district in good shape so it is an honor to be following in his footsteps. As for your second question, it is a little too early to talk about my goals, but what I can tell you is what has been "held" for the new chancellor. A number of key positions (in the district and

college centers) need to be filled. In addition, it will just be a matter of listening to people and sensing where the rocks are in people's shoes, and seeing what we can do to address those issues.

**RAMPAGE:** Tell us some little known information about yourself.

REDWINE: (laughs) I'm learning to play golf. I'm excited about that. I have one daughter and she works for the Ford Credit in Dearborn, Michigan where she's a financial analyst. She's getting married in December, and I will be somewhat involved in that.

RAMPAGE: What words of encouragement or advice do you have for the students attending the schools of the State Center Community College District?

REDWINE: Keep on keeping on, it is tremendously important to develop one's capacities and generally speaking, we do that through education. Recognize that education doesn't end with a degree whether it's a high school diploma or a college degree. We all need to continue to plan to learn. So, education really never ends, fortunately.

"Touch Campus", a student information computer, has been installed at Fresno City College to give students volume of information about their college in one convenient location. Installed in May, it is the first of several computers to be set up around FCC by the year 2000.

"Touch Campus", located in the student services building on campus, carries the FCC web site, which students can access for information regarding classes, sports, maps of the campus, school departments, and the campus schedule of events.

FCC's Associate Dean of Students, Deborah Ikeda, said that for 25 cents, students will get a printout of information sought.

According to Dean Ikeda, "future "Touch Campus" services will include registration, class schedules, and grades."

Purchased with Federal Grants at a unit cost of \$15 thousand each, six to seven more "Touch Campus" computers "are slated to be installed on campus by the year 2000", according to Ikeda.

#### Word to the Wise: Wash your Hands

Simple hand-washing may seem rather unsophisticated compared with today's big medical advances, but it works. Handwashing reduces the rate of bacterial and viral infections by one-third to one-half, and gastrointestinal infections by up to 80%. "Frequent hand-washing is one of the best ways to prevent the spread of infectious disease," says the Centers for Disease Control.

You should wash your hands before, during, and after food preparation; before eating; after using the bathroom; and after handling pets, animals, or waste of any kind. For best results, apply soap, then rub your hands together vigorously and scrub all surfaces for 10-15 seconds, being careful not to neglect your fingertips. Finally, rinse and dry your hands.

### Dr. Oba T'Shaka speaks at FCC

San Francisco State University's professor of African American Studies, Dr. Oba T'Shaka recently visited the campus of Fresno City College. He came to discuss topics related to his book, Return to the African Mother: Principle of Male and Female Equality.

FCC's instructor of African American Studies, Kehinde Solwazi, and the Pan African Student Union organized the tour by the visiting professor during which he addressed a packed audience at the FCC Theater.

Speaking to a captive

audience, Dr. T'Shaka lamented what he called the erosion of the American family, with special reference to the African American between 1968 and now. He then took issues with the advent of television and loss of African-American cultural identity as the basis for the problem

"The essence of your culture comes from your family," he emphasized. Noting the value of each child having knowledge of backgrounds of both parents, the visiting professor quickly stressed the idea of "twin lineage" in raising children.

"Father and mother should be equal, and compliment each other in

raising their children," Dr. T'Shaka said. "Men and women are at their best when they support each other".

On other issues, the guest speaker spoke of the popularity of the new rap and hip-hop music culture as a form of classic African-American culture, and expressed enthusiasm about the prospect of black artists launching their own music labels and production companies.

The African-American Studies Department and Pan African Student Union have historically arranged visits by educators of high standards to the FCC campus.

## A pair of Reggae groups bring "sweet music" to Fresno

Every now and then, world class reggae bands bring their shows to Fresno, thanks in part to the local promoters Wendy Russell Productions and the Vibr' eyes Crew. The show on September 13th, at Fresno State was about as "irie" as it gets, with Morgan Heritage from Brooklyn, New York, and Israel Vibrations from Kingston Jamaica.

Morgan Heritage consists of five talented and spiritual offsprings of reggae great Denroy Morgan. Raised Rasta from day one, they have been musical all their lives thanks to their divine guidance of Jah and their father. In 1992, they played Jamaica's Reggae Sunsplash Festival and were the only band to play the festival two nights in a row. In 1999, the group released their fifth album Don't Haffi Dread'm which coincides with their tour. Morgan Heritage, an imperial reggae family, are musically gifted and spiritually present, as their grooves cascade off the stage that your body can't help but to dance.

For over 20 years, Israel Vibration have been putting out uplifting, socially conscious, and positive reggae since their formation. The three original members called Apple, Wiss, and Skelly, met in the Mona Rehabilitation Center in Kingston, Jamaica as children afflicted with polio. All three eventually were kicked out of the various schools they later attended, mostly on account of embracing Rastafari. Together they survived hard years singing on the streets to survive and eventually landing a contract and recording their first album in 1978. After a brief breakup in the early 80's, the band reformed in 1988 and recorded six more albums.

Reduced to a duo, with the departure of Apple in the early 90's, Pay the Piper is the duo's latest album promoted for their tour. On stage, Wiss, Skelly and their band Roots Radics know exactly how to uplift the audience as they sing their praises and dance in their unique style. Their music is clear that they have a very strong faith and commitment in Jah Rastafari. As they sang, their faces looked like a heavenly bliss.

Powerful roots music like these bands play is more than just music. They provide a mix of worship, the praise of social awareness, great dancing beats, and a chance for the community to come together in unity and diversity. Living legends of world music like these groups are not to be missed, especially when they are practically in your own backyard.

## Rams win first two games on road; first home game next

At his second press conference on September 13, Fresno City College Rams coach Tony Caviglia named freshman defensive back Sean Soares, sophomore quarterback Wes Thomas, and defensive linebacker Lamar Owens the outstanding players of the week. The conference followed the Rams 40-17 victory over the Laney College Eagles on September 10 in Oakland.

"We wanted the atmosphere to be very businesslike, we wanted our guys to realize that this was not a leisure trip, we came to work," said Caviglia on the trip to Oakland. After trailing 7-0 in the first quarter, the Rams switched quarterbacks, going to Wes Thomas in the second quarter after Ryan Weatherson started. "I felt very confident, I was waiting for my opportunity and was ready to go," stated Thomas. He had 49 yards rushing with two touchdowns, the longest from 18 yards.

Owens, from Erie, Pa, contributed six tackles and two sacks on the defensive front for the Rams and Soares, whose "ability to return kickoffs are great", according to coach Caviglia, states that the key to playing special teams is "to make what you have, go with the block and make things happen for your on the field for such a short time."

The Rams were once again spearheaded by Maurice Morris, who netted 303 all-purpose yards, including an 85-yard kickoff return for one of three touchdowns in the game.

On September 18, the Rams traveled to Redding and defeated the College of the Siskiyous Eagles 34-17 behind the quarterback duo of Weatherson and Thomas. Weatherson completed 10 of his 20 passes for 133 yards and a 40-yard touchdown pass to Jimmy Whitfield.


Thomas came off the bench and completed 6 of 7 passes for 152 yards and two touchdowns, one of which a 55-yard pass to Morris.

On September 25, the Rams play their first home game against the Gavilan College Eagles at 7:00 p.m., then it's back on the road to Hayward on October 2 to play coach Caviglia's previous team, the Chabot Gladiators.

# FCC Wrestling, Coach Arballo grapple for another state title



Brady: I was a teenage Greg", his memoir of Brady stories, originally published in 1992. the book was recently re-released as an expanded and updated "Special Collector's Edition". The re-release coincides with his new CD, "The RE-TURN OF JOHNNY BRAVO", as well as the Brady's 30th Anniversary Celebration.

When introduced, Williams was greeted to a chorus of catcalls and whistles. Fans who saw the original show were accompanied by the younger generation who fell in love with the Bradys. "This adoration is flattering", said Williams, who was more than willing to give the appreciative audience what they wanted. Over the course of his ninety minute presentation, Williams spoke about his relationships with fellow cast members Florence Henderson (Mrs. Brady) and Maureen McCormick (Marcia Brady), which were "quite a bit more than platonic". Clarifying that he had sex with Henderson "only once", he also gave a detailed account of his relationship with McCormick, which saw its inception on the romantic beaches of Hawaii and was later seen as "visible flirting". "If you watch the later episodes, you can see the attraction between Maureen and myself," said Williams.

In deciphering the illusion between his character Greg Brady-the wholesome, and the young Barry Williams-a youth driven by hormones, he presented contrasting insights into the personal lives of the cast who were otherwise portrayed as the all-American family shown weekly on TV. Aside from Will-

iams' insatiable love of women, the character who played Mike Brady on the show (Robert Reed) was in fact homosexual, differing from the all-knowing sage father and husband who always knew the right answers to any of the familiy's concerns.

In comparison and contrast, Williams stated, "The Bradys stood for something. They were square and wholesome and represented how we thought everybody else lived, or at least how we wished and aspired to live." Williams presentation ended on a high note,

as he led a hand-picked group of fans from the audience through a choreographed dance from the show.

Williams left words of advice for all aspiring young actors. "Fresno offers a great place to train and learn the tools of the trade, but any serious student wishing to seek fame and fortune needs only to head south roughly 250 miles. Los Angeles is the epicenter of the entire industry, and a relocation is required it movie and film happens to be in your occupational future".
